SUBWAY PROPOSED FOR TWIN FALLS

Mayor Announces \$140,000 All-Federal Grant Project

Twin Falls is about to receive a \$140,000 subway under the railway crossing on Broadway street as a gift from the United States government, Duncan McD. Johnson, Twin Falls mayor, announced last evening.

The mayor's announcement followed a conference in Boise on Friday with J. H. Stennett, state commissioner of public works.

Assurance was given that the subway project will be given favorable consideration, and a party of engineers is to be assigned to the making of a final survey beginning next Monday, the mayor said.

Constructed of reinforced concrete, through solid rock, the proposed subway will afford a 32-foot roadway, with elevated sidewalks six feet wide, on either side of the roadway. Approaches to the subway will leave ample space for business institutions in the vicinity, according to the plans outlined.

Cost of the project, which is estimated at between \$120,000 and \$140,000, is to be covered by a federal government grant.

Federal funds would be made available for the project because of its value from the viewpoint of safety and as a work relief project, the mayor said.

Located in the subway project for several months past, the mayor said, were Mr. Stennett and Max Johnson, division highway engineer.
