SEARCH ENDS FOR MISSING ALASKA PLANE

Radio Message Brings Report of Safety of Airliner's Passengers—After Storm Turns Flier Back

(By The Associated Press) JUNEAU, Alaska, Nov. 25.—The federal radio station at Juneau tonight received a message saying that Pilot Claret Brown's tri-motored transport airplane with 12 other persons was "safe and sound" and that the ship would resume its flight "as soon as weather permitted."

The report of the plane's safety came with a severe storm, the worst in 12 years, howled across southern Alaska and forced a lone searching pilot to return here after an unsuccessful flight to hunt the airliner.

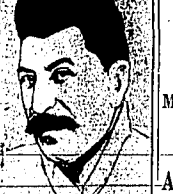

TEACHERS FOCUS ON LEGISLATION

Methods of Raising \$2,000,000 More for School Fund to Fore

BOISE, Nov. 25 (AP)—Speakers for Idaho's 4,500 school teachers are coming to Boise Friday to thrash out their professional problems and offer advice to the 24th state legislature on a multitude of educational questions.

George E. Bowman, superintendent of Burley schools and president of the Idaho Education association, will preside at the organization's 45th annual two-day meeting.

Three hundred official delegates will attend. John I. Hillman of Boise, executive secretary, estimated.

Speakers billed include John W. Condit, state superintendent of public instruction; E. M. Van der Vliet, superintendent of Pocatello schools; Dr. R. D. Russell of the University of Idaho; Miss Ethel Hansen, director of music in Seattle, Wash. public schools; Dr. R. H. Snyder, president of Albion normal, and Dr. John B. Nicks of the University of Idaho southern branch at Pocatello.

Two Millions Short

Methods of raising approximately \$2,000,000 more annually by state taxation or other means for the public school income fund to complete the school construction finance plan will be one of the main subjects for discussion, Hillman said.

Defeat of the sales tax in the November 3 referendum cost the fund \$150,000 annually, he declared, and now only about \$1,000,000 is available.

The fund is used to assist in standardizing the courses of education and the cost of education in all districts.

Other problems to be considered:

Proposed legislation to insure perpetuation of endowment lands and funds.

Proposed legislation to allow school building programs to be financed with funds accumulated prior to the launching of a building program and without bond issues.

Administration problems in education and finance.

Chartering of Schools

Provision for a complete survey and charting of the state board of education.

Elimination of overlapping in the teacher-training courses of the state institutions.

Special training for elementary and high school principals and superintendents.

Three-year minimum normal school education for elementary instructors.

Proposed legislation to take the office of county superintendent of schools out of politics.

Study of teachers' salaries and means of establishing more equitable remuneration.

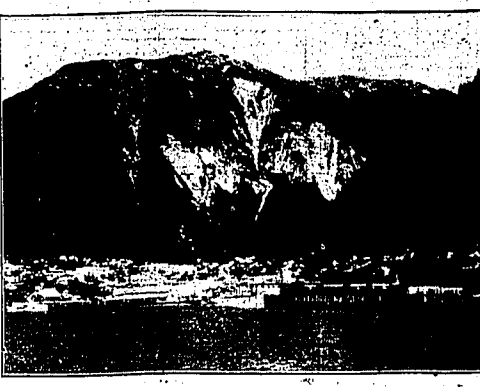

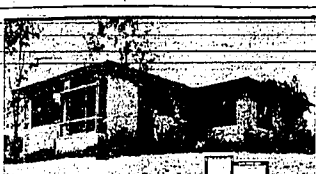

munist party was devoted to an attack of Fascism and assurance that the Communist party would continue to be the only party in Russia.

Speaking on the day when an anti-Communist agreement between Germany and Japan was announced in Berlin, Stalin told the congress the new constitution gave moral support to all those fighting Fascism.

"This constitutional project," he said, "is an indictment against Fascism, for it says Socialism and democracy are invincible. The international meaning of this constitution cannot be exaggerated. It is the first step of Fascism through-out the world."

He said the constitution, which Stalin is generally credited with having written himself, was a new weapon in the hands of the people in fighting "Fascist barbarism."

The change of state directors on the national board are the following: J. H. Foster, Everett, Calif.; E. B. Ketchum, Reno, Nev.; D. A. Bundy, Ogden, Utah; Charles Stalford, Cheyenne, Wyo. Directors for other states were retained.

Avoids Meritism

Avoiding a definite recommendation on future reclamation meritism issue, the association adopted the legislative committee's proposal for retention of the Hatch act.

The association declared itself "unalterably" opposed to the change in the Hatch act.

Resolutions adopted recommended that payments from all projects constructed under the bureau of reclamation and with emergency funds automatically revert to the reclamation fund.

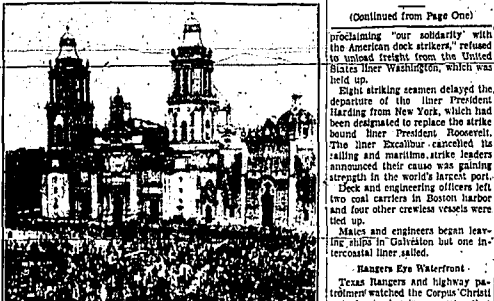

One Hundred Forty-Seven Thanksgivings

One hundred and forty-seven Thanksgivings, each duly proclaimed by the president, have passed since George Washington changed local custom into a national institution by writing the first Thanksgiving proclamation, October 3, 1789.

One hundred and forty-seven years have passed, but they have brought few changes either in our gratitude or our "piousness and applications for future favors. With the possible exception of the expression of gratitude for the "kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation, there is no change in the "Washington document which is put as, almost today as it was when written.

Washington was thankful for "the many and signal favors of Almighty God, among which he included the manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; the degree of tranquillity, union, and plenty which we have since enjoyed; the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; the many and various blessings and good gifts which He has bestowed upon us.

Washington did not stop with the listing of his country's achievements. Here knee better than how much it lacked. He besought God to "pardon our national and other transgressions." It asked aid that the government might be "ordered a blessing to all people; and that "religion, virtue, and obedience to the laws be the basis of the temporal prosperity as He always knows to be best.

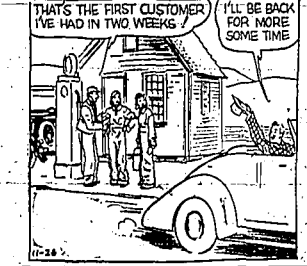

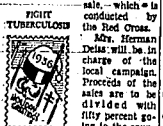
