

FIRES MENACE WIDE OREGON TIMBER AREA

2,000 Tired Fighters Battle Flames Advancing on Several Fronts; Threat Termed Worst in History

(By the Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—An "unprecedented" fire threat tonight confronted the rich forests of western Oregon, choked to death by a prolonged fall drought.

With 2,000 tired fighters on the lines and flames advancing on several fronts, State Forester John W. Ferguson said the timber country never before faced such a menace.

State and federal forest service officials both every effort to control scores of minor blazes flaming through the western half of Oregon and the timber of southwestern Washington.

Not a drop of rain was in sight for a country which normally is dripping wet at this time of the year.

Disaster feared Forest officials were fearful of a repetition of the Bandon disaster of September 29, when two towns in southwestern Oregon were wiped out with a loss of about \$12 million. All depends upon the freakishness of wind and fire.

An Associated Press survey indicated some 500 acres of brush and timber last week were ablaze in Oregon and 300 in southwestern Washington, more than 200 CCC boys are on firelines and several officials said their prolonged labors had left them exhausted.

Rivers and lakes in many sections were at their lowest marks in years. The Willametta river at Portland, where ocean tides could discharge and more freight, was a foot below sea level, the lowest mark in 46 years.

His death came on his annual visit from his French country home to this gambling city in which he is reported to have held a considerable fortune.

A trader in big stakes in armaments, shipbuilding, banking and oil dealing, Sir Basil never played Monte Carlo's game of chance himself.

New Menu After Holidays

Did you have a real Thanksgiving feast with turkey and fowl? We'll bet you did, and we'll also wager that a complete change in menu from the holiday fare will be welcome.

How does a crisp winter salad and a hot steaming steak appeal to you as the main ingredients for a good dinner tonight? Hot buttered peas, fluffy mashed potatoes and baking powder biscuits are grand with the combination and a fruit gelatin dessert will taste delightful after fruit cake and mince pie.

Here are some salad suggestions:

WINTER SALADS

As a health measure, as a picnic note to the meal, salads rate high in importance when winter days are here. There are many ways of lending interest and variety to this course.

Cold Slaw

Remove the outside leaves of a firm young cabbage. Cut in quarters and with a very sharp knife cut in slices. Let stand in cold water one-half hour. Drain and mix with enough mayonnaise to moisten well. Chopped pimento or chopped green peppers may be added, if desired.

Mixed Fruit and Walnut Salad

- 1 slice pineapple
- 12 pitted dates
- 1 orange
- 1/2 cup broken walnut kernels
- 1 banana, sliced
- 2 cups seeded white grapes
- Cooked salad dressing
- Lettuce

Cut pineapple, dates and pulp of orange into small pieces. Add walnut kernels, sliced bananas and grapes. Mix well. Add salad dressing to moisten and serve, individual in lettuce cups or in a salad bowl.

Jellied Tomato Salad

- 2 1/2 cups tomato pulp
- 1 small onion, sliced
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. gelatin
- 3/4 cup cold water
- 1/2 tsp. lemon
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Cook together gently for 10 minutes the tomato pulp, onion, salt and sugar. Meanwhile soak gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Strain hot mixture, add gelatin and stir to dissolve. Add lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce. Pour into large or individual molds and place in refrigerator to harden. Turned on crisp lettuce and garnish with mayonnaise.

Cabbage Salad

- 1 medium can red kidney beans
- 3 cups cabbage, coarsely shredded
- 3 tbsp. cucumber relish
- 2 cans tomato ketchup
- 3 tbsp. mayonnaise
- 1 tsp. salt

Drain kidney beans. Drain and chill and add remaining ingredients. Serve on a bed of crisp lettuce.

Frozen Fruit Salad

- 1 package cranberry cheese
- 1 cup cooled salad dressing
- 1 cup sliced pineapple
- 1 cup whipped cream
- 1/2 cup marshmallow cherries
- 1 green pepper
- 1 cup nuts

Mash cranberry cheese and blend with salad dressing, add pineapple cherries (cut in pieces) chopped green pepper sliced nuts. Fold in whipped cream and turn into tray of triffles until. When frozen serve on crisp lettuce leaves.

- 1 cup pineapple juice
- 1/2 cup pear juice
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon sugar

November offers such a variety of fruits and vegetables, it is little wonder that a busy homemaker finds it difficult to keep up with the new food products appearing on the market. For general use, the best winter potatoes are the large ones, with deep-set eyes. The entire portion of large potatoes can be kept beyond that of small potatoes. While the sweet potato is supposedly better for baking than the egg, for most other uses either variety may be used satisfactorily.

- Arbitrarians

Arbitrarians, like avocado, are generally sold by piece. Both are very delicious. It is important to choose are very large and others extremely small but either size is tender if fresh. In baked avocados, first boil until tender. Drain. Remove chokes, spread leaves. Fill center with dressing or chopped butter. Bake with cream in moderate oven (375-400°) 25 to 30 minutes. RULES FOR COOKING IN HIGH ALTITUDES

High altitude can raise havoc in cake baking and in the preparation of foods containing baking powder and sugar. In most cases, however, little change need be made in recipes in altitudes less than 5000 feet, and no change need be made in but-cake, cream, puffins, muffins and fruit cakes as they are not affected at 5000 feet.

Water boils at 212 degrees F. at sea level, but for each 500 feet ascending, the boiling point lowers one degree. At this rate, water boils at 188 degrees F. at 7000 feet.

Titleholder Triumphs Over ZZZ Janazzo In 15-Round Battle

NEW YORK, Nov. 27 (AP)—Chicago's Barney Ross (19-0) defended his welterweight title here tonight by defeating ZZZ Janazzo, 15-round fighter from Madison Square Gardens. Weights were 143 1/2 for Ross and 145 1/2 for Janazzo.

Janazzo's first title start since regaining the crown from Jimmy McEmin in a year ago last May, Ross came out with a lead and held it throughout the fight. Janazzo had a disappointing turnout of only 8484 customers in the paid \$22,830 to see the contest.

"The Associated Press card credited Ross with a knockdown in the first round, but he was not called on. Janazzo was penalized two rounds for low punches."

A decision, greeted by mingled cheers and howls from the fans, was given by referee Johnny Wynn and judges Charlie Lynch and Marty Morone.

There were only two knockdowns with Janazzo the victim each time. The second knockdown came in the fifth round when Janazzo was hit in the right eye by a jabbing right hand to the deck for a count of one. In the sixth round, Janazzo was knocked away from a Ross rush, Janazzo caught a short right on the bottom and went down for a count of two.

Ross has agreed to make his next start against Cetero Garcia, Los Angeles Filipino, within 60 days. Janazzo, who has a 10-0 record, is expected to be back in the ring in a bout to produce a challenger for the champion.

It is expected that Garcia, a contender, has chances as Ross will be matched with his old rival.

Ross took the aggregate at the end of the fight and was declared a virtual ally in the distance to walk off with the first six rounds.

Janazzo may have been trying to dodge the highly touted, Ross fight, but he was determined to stay 15 rounds with the champion. Anyway, he finally retired to open up with the real fight. Ross' superior outfighting him throughout the evening until the seventh round.

But once Janazzo got used to being in there with the champion of the world, he came out of his shell to make a fight.

Ross shows up with the strain of his first 15-round bout and a half apparently being to tell on him. He showed up noticeably mid-way in the battle and Janazzo, scoring better with his left and long right, captured the seventh and eighth, held the champion on even terms in the ninth and then went on to win the tenth.

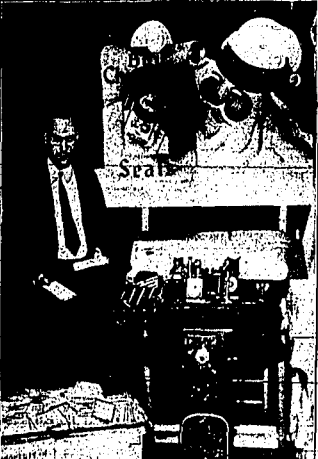
