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#### FOG, SNOW COVER NORTHWEST STATES

SEATTLE, Nov. 28 (AP)—Fog disrupted transportation from Alaska to Oregon today.

Twenty-one deep sea vessels waiting at the Vancouver B. C. harbor for fog to lift so they could take berths for loading and unloading. Longshoers were able to shift to new berths.

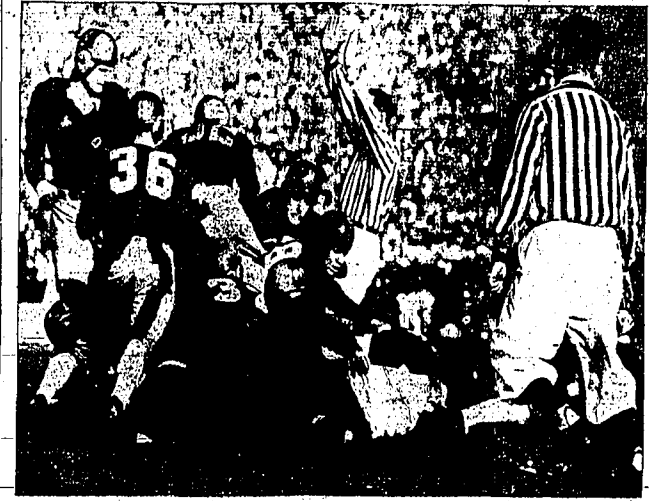
Colorado College Defeats B. Y. U. Tigers Win Over Utahns With Touchdown In Third Quarter

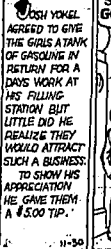
