FARM INCOME OF NATION INCREASES

Department of Agriculture Reports Gain Over Previous Months

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The "law of collars" into farmers' pockets from date of their products was reported today by the agriculture department to have mounted to \$688,500,000 in October, well above both the September total of \$752,000,000 and the \$600,000,000 figure for October, 1938.

At the same time the department said the general average of prices for farm products November 15 was 120 per cent of pre-war levels, down a point from a month earlier but 13 points higher than a year ago.

Government payments to farmers last month were reported at \$250,000,000, compared with \$190,000,000 in September and \$262,000,000 last October.

Chief changes in farm prices this month were a 3 cent increase in eggs per dozen to 22.5 cents, and a decline in fruit prices attributed to bumper crops of oranges, grapefruit and lemons.

Prices of wheat, hogs, and cotton declined from a month earlier, but still were higher than a year ago.

Things the farmer buys averaged 127 per cent of the pre-war level, or 8 points higher than a year ago, it was said.

John Wenger Sentenced for Theft of Lithographing Plant

BOISE, Dec. 2.—John "Ray" Wenger, criminally notorious at age of 22, returned tonight to state prison—after 22 months' absence—to begin serving a 3½-to-4-year sentence for grand larceny.

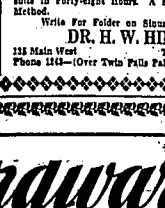

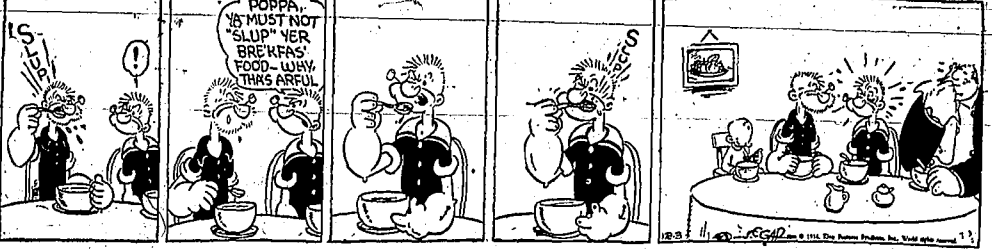

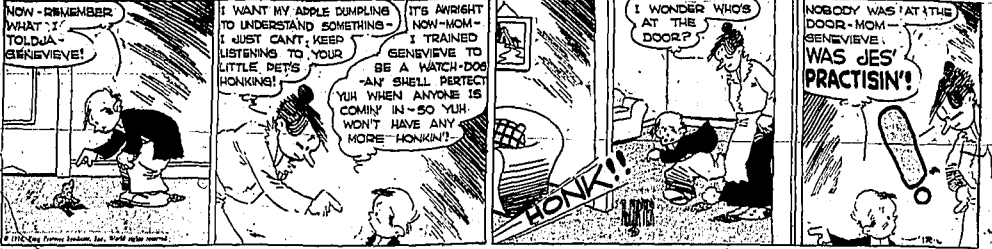

WORKMEN REPLACE OBSOLETE PIPING

Four Thousand Feet of Wooden Mains Will Be Removed

Four thousand feet of Twin Falls wooden water mains will be replaced with cast iron pipe by a WPA project which gets underway this morning. J. M. Molyneux, city water superintendent and engineer of the street department, said Wednesday. Completion of this work will leave the main supply line as the only wooden main in the city.

The pipe to be installed is already on hand, Mr. Molyneux said, and is four and six inches in diameter. Some of the mains to be replaced were installed in 1911.

Workmen Which Will Be Employed

Workmen which will be employed on the new project will come from the labor which since last spring, has been engaged in the construction of sidewalks and curbs throughout the city. This work is being done by the city.

Since the start of the curb and sidewalk work, last April, eight city blocks of cement sidewalks have been completed, the superintendent points out. During the same period, blocks of curbing, primarily on avenues, was finished in addition to sidewalk repair work and construction of sidewalks to private residences.

Under the setup the WPA turned the labor, the city's supervision and private individuals who were benefited stood the cost of materials. The Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsored the improvement.

During the life of the project an amount of from 25 to 50 men were employed. These will be absorbed in the water main improvement program. The curb and sidewalk program will be continued next spring as soon as weather permits, Mr. Molyneux said.
