LOGGERS TO STAND TRIAL FOR ASSAULT

Ten Orofino Lumberjacks Freed on Total Bond of \$30,000

ONOFINO, Idaho, Dec. 3 (AP)—Ten loggers attained their freedom on a total bond of \$30,000 here today after they were ordered bound over to district court for trial on charges of assault with intent to commit murder in a clash with striking lumberjacks last August 5.

The 10 were accused specifically of shooting two of five strike pickets who were wounded in the melee about 2 1/2 miles from here. Probate Judge E. B. Steele set bond at \$1500 for each defendant on each charge. He set no date for the trial.

The logging operators posted the bond. Verdicts of the clash were contradictory. The strikers' witnesses testified they were fired upon as they drove back toward town late in the day.

Fire Canceled

Fire of the strikers' group were convicted last August 14 of battery in connection with the clash, and fined \$200 each. At their trial, non-striking woodmen testified the strikers beat them shortly prior to the shooting.

The defendants: A. D. Brown, Harold James, J. Frank Dick, Fred Clark Pinkie, Ward Tribble, Stanley and Manley Purdy, Harrison Anderson and Glen Bullman.

Governor C. Ben Ross decreed martial law in Clearwater county the morning after the clash was over. The troops remained about three weeks, and were withdrawn after the eight-week I.W.O.-led strike ended.

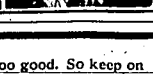

Brothers in Jail After Long Hike At Point of Gun

RENO, Nev., Dec. 3 (AP)—Marched for 10 miles at the muzzle of a shotgun, two young men were delivered to the Washoe county jail today by Frank Blondin, arrested, 75-year-old Nevada prospector. Blondin accused them of killing two of his horses.

The prisoners are Herbert Heas, 22, and his 21-year-old brother, Jess, both of whom have been residing at a Reno saloon.

Blondin's deputies said the two did not deny shooting two horses, but asserted the animals they shot were wild horses they had killed for coyote bait.

The brothers were held in jail for investigation. They arrived at the county jail in Reno early today.

"No," said Blondin, "I'm not tired. That's no walk."

Blondin, a native of France, has lived alone on the desert near Pyramid Lake since 1900.

Lawyer's Opinion Shatters Plan to Give Castor Oil

SPOKANE, Dec. 3 (AP)—A legal opinion today shattered Police Judge Frank Yuse's plan to punish drunks with castor oil.

Assistant corporation counsel Louis Conway, who previously was thought to have been favorable to Yuse's plan, wrote:

"The only lawful punishment that may be legally imposed are those provided by the ordinances of Spokane and the statutes of the state of Washington."

Certainly, Conway said informally, the ordinance does not provide administration of a half-pint of castor oil.

And that, Yuse remarked, seemed to settle the whole thing.

He had planned to allow men and women convicted twice in 30 days of drunkenness the alternative of taking large doses of castor oil or serving 10 days in jail.
