Prime Minister Repeats In Private Conference With Ruler, Ultimatum Against Marriage With Divorcee

Monarch's Decision to Be Told Cabinet

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 4.—Britain's slim, blond monarch tonight accepted the challenge for his government to choose between his throne and Wallis Warfield Simpson.

The ruler of the British Empire made his momentous decision in an hour-long session with Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin, but it will not be given to the pages of history until Baldwin reveals it in parliament probably Saturday.

The American-born woman for whom Edward VIII precipitated one of the greatest crises in his royal history must now choose to go to a secret hide-away in France. A usually unobtrusive figure, she left the king's side only upon his assurance he would not abdicate.

Edward was closeted with Baldwin tonight for the third time in three days and the fourth this week, to hear repeated assurances from the public relations his prime minister uttered earlier in the day.

While the entire world at large hung on every syllable, Baldwin in unmistakable language warned the king, in effect, to erect his will over that of his government and his dominions if he wished not to sacrifice the crown to his fatherless as the price.

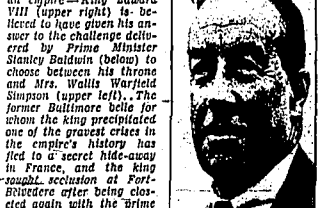
The light-footed prime minister served notice to the monarch that he was as irrevocably determined as ever to force the willful sovereign to choose between his throne and the woman he loved, but pointed out that he wished and his right to retain the scepter of the British Empire.

Of the question of the so-called morganatic marriage by which Mrs. Simpson had become the king's legal wife but not his queen was out of the question. Baldwin said, and he pointed out, made no provision for such an alliance.

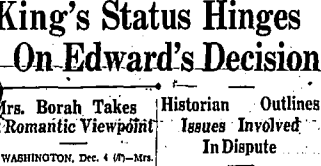

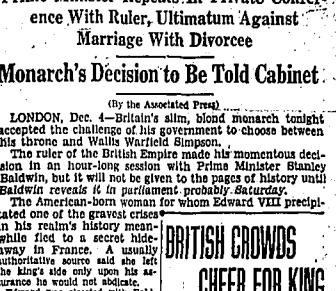

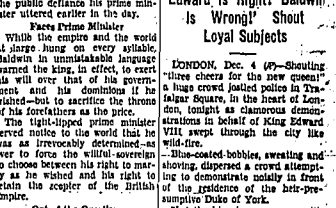

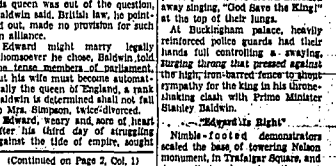

# SOUPS vs. CHILLS

"Soup's on!" And mighty good it tastes these days as the thermometer begins to drop near the zero reading. Soups come in all kinds, thickness and flavors. There are clear soups to serve with dinner and then they range all the way to the thick mulligans that form a complete luncheon.

And if you like to experiment, there's no better place than in the soup kettle. And speaking of kettles, there's something every housewife should have these days—a soup kettle—for soup and nothing but soup!

An iron one, perfectly smooth inside, is best, but a porcelain, granite or aluminum one may be used. It must have tightly fitting cover, preferably one with a valve to let off the steam.

In selecting meat for stock choose the shin or the lower part of the mutton. The shin has bone with marrow in it, and a large proportion of gelatine and extractives, which give to the stock its characteristic flavor and firmness. This gelatine gives the stock, when cold, a jelly-like consistency. There are two kinds of stock: brown, made from lean fat beef and bones, highly seasoned, and white, made from chicken, veal or veal delicately seasoned.

### Cream of Pimento Soup

Heat together:  
2 cups milk  
2 cups white stock (strained chicken broth may be used)  
Cream together:  
1 tsp. flour  
4 tsp. shortening. Add the heated liquid gradually to the stirring constantly. Then add 4 oz. bottle, or can of pimentos, highly chopped  
1 tsp. grated onion  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper

### Bean Soup

1/2 lb. navy beans  
6 cups water  
2 onions  
1 cup chopped celery  
1 tsp. chopped parsley  
1 tsp. chopped salt pork  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
Wash beans, add water and soak 12 hours. Add rest of ingredients. Simmer 2 hours in covered pan.

is coming to the boiling point, wash and cut up the vegetables into small pieces. As soon as the vegetables are done, add them to the boiling water in the pot. Add also the peas and barley, salt and pepper to taste, and allow the whole to simmer for about 4 hours, or even longer. This makes a meal by itself and improves with reheating.

### Quick Onion Soup

1 large Spanish onion  
2 cans consommé  
1 can bouillon  
Grated Parmesan cheese, or other good cheese  
French bread, sliced and toasted or  
Rust's  
2 tsp. butter

Cut the Spanish onion into slices, a little less than 1/2 inch thick, and cross cut the slices. Put the butter in a frying pan or pot and when sizzling hot put in the sliced onion. Cook them and let onion slowly cook for ten minutes, turning the onion over once or twice. The onion should now be browned, but cooked soft; then add the canned soups and allow to cook for five minutes. Season to taste, but do not add any seasoning without first tasting, as some canned soups and other soups are quite highly seasoned.

To Serve  
If served from a tureen at the table, then place in the tureen the hot slices of French bread or the rusks, and over them pour the soup. If served directly into plates, then place the pieces of toast into hot plates and pour in the soup. Serve with grated Parmesan cheese, hot rounds and garnish with tiny sprigs of parsley.

## TASTY CANAPES ADD TO HOLIDAY PARTIES

Christmas season is approaching and the holiday parties are already beginning. These mean some sort of light refreshment, and here are a few very pleasant and hand to hand that go deliciously with the Christmas season.

- ### Canapés
- 1/2 cup diced ham
  - 1 tablespoon chopped pickle
  - 12 tiny canned mushrooms
  - Combine the ham and chopped pickle and spread on canape toast rounds or crackers. Remove the stems from the mushrooms and saute in fat for 5 minutes. Top each canape with a sauteed mushroom.
- ### Bardine Canapés
- Spread small square crackers with creamed butter, covered with thin slices of raw onion and lay two sautered mushrooms across the cracker. Sprinkle with lemon juice and chopped parsley.
- ### Crab Meat And Onion Canapés
- 1/2 cup crab meat, drained and flaked
  - 1/2 cup pickled onions, finely chopped and drained
  - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
  - Salt and pepper to taste
  - Few drops tabasco sauce
  - Be sure that the crab meat and onions are thoroughly drained.
  - Combine all the ingredients and blend. Spread on whole wheat toast rounds and garnish with tiny sprigs of parsley.

## December Menus Call for Healthy Vegetable Dishes

Vegetables and vegetables. Oh, fight together always, don't they? Well, here's a few very pleasant ways of getting your vitamins these days.

- ### Baked Creamed Cauliflower
- 1 medium-sized head of cauliflower
  - 2 eggs
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
  - 1 tablespoon butter, melted
  - 1 cup cream
  - Trim off the green leaves of the cauliflower and wash thoroughly. Cover with boiling salt water and cook for 15 minutes. Drain and chop very fine. Beat the eggs, add the salt, pepper and melted butter. Stir in the cream and combine with the chopped cauliflower. Pour into a well-buttered baking dish. Set dish in pan of hot water and bake in moderately slow oven (325° F.) for 50 minutes.
  - Another variation is to use hot white sauce and graded cheese poured over the freshly boiled cauliflower.
- ### Corn Chowder
- 1 pound salt pork
  - 1 cup diced celery
  - 1 cup diced onions
  - 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper
  - 1 cup diced raw potatoes
  - 1 cup water
  - 2 cups corn (cooked)

- ### Savory Baked Squash
- Small squash
  - 1/2 cup cream
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
  - 1/2 teaspoon onion
  - 1/2 teaspoon minced onion
  - 2 bacon strips
  - Wash squash, cut in halves. Discard seeds and pulp. Place squash in shallow pan, add 1/2 inch water (this hastens baking of the squash). Bake 40 minutes in moderate oven. (Squash is done when fork soft when tested with fork.) Remove pulp and mash well, add cream and seasonings. Thoroughly refill cup of squash halves. Top with bacon and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.
- ### Sweetened Beans
- 1/2 cup corn, cut from cob
  - 1 cup cooked lima beans
  - 1/2 cup cream
  - 2 tablespoons butter
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
  - Mix ingredients and simmer 20 minutes, stir frequently. Lettore

- ### Roastef Dressing
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
