(By the Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—Prospects of early peace between coastwise shippers and maritime unions in the 14-day coast strike were blasted tonight when the local of the Licensed Deck Officers' Union rejected an offer of settlement proposed by employers.

John S. president of the local of the Masters, Mates and Clerks of America said the proposal, made at a conference yesterday, was voted down 22 to 10.

O'Grady said he had not heard from other coast locals, which also voted on the employers' offer, but he expressed belief the vote would be similar.

The rejection came when it appeared peace agreements were within reach as the coastal operators and the strikers' unions, and federal officials sought to effect temporary negotiations between strikers and offshore lines.

Another proposal The radio telegraphists also studied a similar proposal offered by the coastal operators, which like that made to the officers, involved an immediate settlement.

Acceptance of these two offers would put the coastwise operators and strikers in position to resume operations, since the four other interested unions previously reached tentative agreements with the longshore lines.

Government officials' privately praised the efforts to get the unions and deep sea companies around the peace table.

The rank-and-file strike of Albatrosses, which had been in progress since the 1st of November, was ended by a three-day strike which refused to pass picket lines to work the freighters.

(By the Associated Press) CROYDON, Eng., Dec. 9.—The most disastrous airliner crash in England's history brought death today to 14 persons aboard a K. L. M. Dutch line passenger ship which tipped the roofs from two houses and fell in flames four minutes after it left the runway at Croydon Airplane enroute to Amsterdam.

Three escaped from the twisted wreckage. The air ministry tonight ordered thorough investigation after the K. L. M. line announced it did not know the reason why the ship went down almost immediately after the take-off.

He said that Mrs. Simpson had signed no documents, thus transferring rights that financial matters had come up for consideration.

Final Decision Still Rests With Monarch Impasse Unbroken (By the Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The British public early today was prepared for abdication of Edward VIII as the hour approached for the expected announcement in common of his historic choice between his throne and Wallis Warfield Simpson.

Final decision still rested with the king, but there was no indication of any move toward a decision which Baldwin was to make before parliament when it meets at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Unless the monarch at the eleventh hour contrives some hitherto unannounced plan to resign, the British throne and the 150-year-old monarchy would pass to the 35-year-old Prince of Wales.

It was kept in mind, however, that all talk of abdication was based on apparently well-founded reports that Edward VIII was determined to make Wallis Warfield Simpson his wife, come what may.

There was always the possibility, however remote, that he might accept the offer of the crown and sacrifice her love for a more advantageous life.

His friends, however, said the king was no indication that he would countenance such a finale to a romance which shook the world's largest empire.

Official parliamentary opinion was that the decision rested with the king and his ministers over Mrs. Simpson still was unbroken, and had the government decided to consider an ultimatum demanding his decision when the halls of parliament were closed.

Alone WITH temporarily resigned himself to the possibility of a divorce, Mrs. Simpson enjoyed the freedom of the world and when she has remained through the crisis caused by a king's love for a woman who had been married.

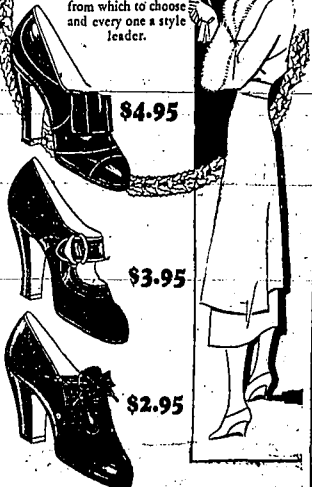

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ROSS DROPS FIGHT ON PROPERTY TAX

Governor Blames Other Members of Equalization Board

BOISE, Dec. 9 (AP)—Governor C. Ben Ross abandoned today his plan to test in the courts the validity of a \$750,000 tax on valorem property assessed by the state board of equalization last August.

The governor, who is a member of the three-man board, was absent from the session because of illness.

At a recent meeting of the group he said that the action he intended to take would not be in the best interests of the state and he was asked to stand by the other members. Secretary Harry C. Parsons, State Treasurer Myrtle P. Zimling, State Auditor Franklin Olinard and Attorney General Bert H. Miller were present.

The chief executive, who will retire on January 4 after six years in office, expressed inability to understand why the action should be made.

"The cost of prosecuting the case would be upwards of \$100,000, I am told, and the funds are not available for that purpose," he said.

"My only intention when I brought this matter up a few weeks ago was to attempt to eliminate this unnecessary burden on the people," he said.

Ross argued that the board failed to observe provisions of certain excise tax laws providing for deduction from the value of property.

"I have always been in support of the methods of raising funds through taxation and I am not at all opposed to the existing and legal methods of producing revenue," he declared.

"Knowing the tendency of public officials to raise adequate funds to carry on the expense of their respective offices in keeping with their own idea, I look upon special precaution to guard against any thing that might happen when the equalization board met last August and made this \$750,000 figure."

"When the board met last August I asked, specifically that it include this provision: 'The state board of equalization shall deduct such total amount (as this law provides) in determining the ad valorem tax for state purposes on real and personal property.'"

No Property Tax

"The income tax included a similar provision, and the beer tax had in it, it is expressed in the intention of this act that the revenue derived hereunder shall reduce by corresponding amount the direct tax which the state board of equalization would otherwise make and apportion to the counties of the state."

"If the board had followed the law and had made the deductions it calls for the board could not have made any levy at all on the real and personal property for the year 1937."

"I am at a loss to understand why the people of Idaho should unnecessarily be burdened by the equalization board to the extent of \$750,000 when the auditor's own records show in his biennial report that the general fund carries over from 1933-1934 ad valorem tax will be \$774,000 for use during the coming year and that the estimated amount on next January 1 will be upwards of \$638,216, the amount on hand last September 30."

AUBURN, Calif., Dec. 9 (AP)—Mrs. J. A. Cummins of Twin Falls, Idaho, arrived here today and identified the body of a man who died in a place known as the "Red Room" of her brother, George W. Clawson, 50, former Twin Falls resident.

Clawson was found last November 20 by police at Roseville, California, wandering on the streets in a dazed condition with a deep wound over his left eye.

Brought to the county hospital by Constable Daniel Mulligan of Roseville, Clawson was denied a visit by his sister.

Released Admission At the jail Clawson was pronounced "a very sick man" by Dr. O. Mackay, county physician. Dr. Mackay made a second attempt to obtain Clawson's admission to the hospital, but said Superintendent William Wiley denied the appeal.

Clawson was attended in his jail cell by Dr. Mackay, Sheriff Elmer C. Gurne and prisoners until his death.

A coroner's jury found death was caused by a cerebral hemorrhage and brain concussion.

Roseville police and physicians testified Clawson was not intoxicated. Autopsies have not ascertained how he received the fatal injuries.

Mrs. Cummins said she was consulting an investigator and will consult Sacramento attorney. She declared she contemplated legal action against sacramento county and hospital authorities as the result of her brother's death on December 2.

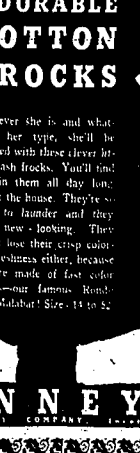
