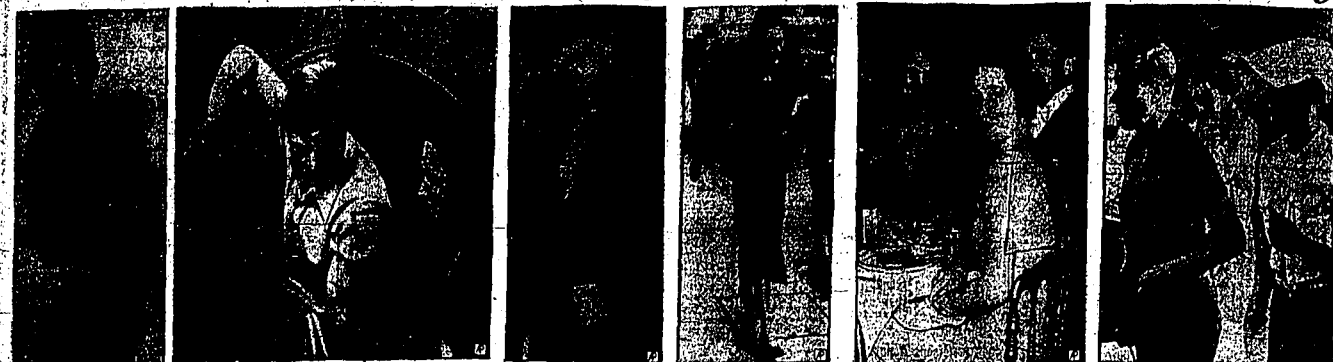

EDWARD SMATTERS MANY PRECEDENTS

Abdication Spectacular Climax to 328-Day Reign

LONDON, Dec. 10 (AP) — King Edward VIII who took his empire today for low brows to a spectacular climax a short, precedent-breaking reign.

In his 326 days on the throne he brushed aside meliorist traditions and the long succession of kings and dash and will will be inaugurated a new Edwardian era.

"It is his motto as Prince of Wales," "I want to be added to the crowd: 'Let's get on with it!'"

Nearly had he smoothed his father's hair in the morning of his birthday on January 20 that the new sovereign stepped as one of the first monarchs to abdicate the throne.

For thirty years the clock in Sandringham had pointed a half-hour past twelve Edward VIII wanted his share in the game to end on his own hand and on time.

One hundred and fifty clocks were set back at the moment of his abdication.

First Flying King

The day after King George V's death, Edward VIII was crowned. He was the first king in British history to travel by air.

He cut the royal mourning period by three months.

He traveled in an ordinary first-class railway carriage instead of a special private train, as royal usages decreed.

The abdicated London by walking right out of the front door of Buckingham palace through the streets to the office of the Duke of Connaught.

He refused to fly, creating the new idea of "captain of the king" during his flight to Paris.

When dignitaries of the world gathered in London for the funeral of King George V, Edward VIII talked with them on international problems.

During the Locarno crisis some time ago he was seen to talk lengthily with John Dorman and French representatives in London.

He abated personal by using the personal pronoun "I" instead of "we" in his address in addressing parliament.

BALDWIN SCORES WITH ABDICATION

Prime Minister's Prestige With Commons Seem at Peak

LONDON, Dec. 10 (AP) — Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin appeared in the house of commons appeared tonight at the highest peak of his long public career.

Members of parliament acclaimed Baldwin as the greatest statesman of the century, praising his statesmanship and his courage in the face of the crisis.

Quickly, the comment in the lobby turned to a discussion whether the prime minister at the foot of his prestige, would seize this opportunity to retire from public life as he has threatened time after time.

Political talk has long held that Baldwin, though a man of high intellect, was not a man of high character, was being "promoted" to take over the reins.

The prime minister was acclaimed as having handled probably the most difficult problem of his kind that ever confronted a man in his position.

The Laborites held a party conference tonight in which, it was reported, they were in a minority.

Baldwin, who opposed his resignation, was said to have considered simply an English gentleman.

Baldwin, in his 29 years of life he decided he wanted to be a blacksmith. When he was graduated from college in 1888 he started as the ballroom of the hotel in the Baldwin family home.

He worked as a smithy and developed a strong dislike which helped carry him through 23 years in public office.

Enduring Energy

Now there is a layer of fat over those muscles and Baldwin has become definitely plump, but still he keeps his friends, like to be called an umbrella; he not only believes in the umbrella, he carries it with him.

Two sons and four daughters were born to Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin. His wife, who was the daughter of a blacksmith, was known in her girlhood as "a tomboy."

Baldwin does not like political affairs and it is his habit to retire to his country house after eating the dinner he prepared for himself.

He has a large fortune of \$10,000,000 and anonymously bought \$100,000 of war bonds and gave them back to the treasury for cancellation. He hoped other war followers would do the same, but few followed his example.

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TAX SLASH SHOWN IN JEROME COUNTY

Ten Per Cent Cut Reported in Assessments Under 1935 Figures

JEROME, Dec. 10.—Real taxes in Jerome county for 1936 show an average reduction of approximately 10 per cent, according to Earl P. Koenigs, county treasurer. The total amount of taxes on the 1935 rolls was \$437,281; the 1936 amount is \$392,445, giving the taxpayers in Jerome county a reduction of \$44,836.

The most noticeable reduction in the county tax for current expenses, charity and indigent, Jerome county school fund and bond purposes, which has been reduced \$46,413.75. This is a county savings of \$100,000 in some of the school districts and a few of the bond districts, although there has been a slight increase, however.

Personal Taxes

The personal taxes, collected by William N. Harwick, county assessor, will also show a reduction in all cases where the valuation remains the same, according to the treasurer.

Koenigs said that the 1936 notices have been mailed to every property owner and that a good collection of current and delinquent taxes are expected in all this time. Of the 1935 taxes that have been extended, over 80 per cent have been collected, although the taxpayers have two months in which to complete payments.

Massachusetts Coast City to Long Beach, California, Designated Route

BAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10 (AP)—A new transcontinental highway extending from Provincetown, Massachusetts, to Long Beach, California, was designated today at the closing convention session of the American Association of State Highway Officials.

The new coast-to-coast route came into being with the designation of a highway extending from Denver, Colorado, to Long Beach, as a part of highway No. 6 which runs from Provincetown to the Colorado capital.

HAGERMAN GRANGERS HIT REPEAL OF TAX

HAGERMAN, Dec. 10.—Hagerman Valley Grange, at a recent meeting, launched an attack against repeal of the state sales tax by passing a resolution urging the legislature to amend the referendum law by providing that no law duly passed by the legislature and approved by the governor shall be rejected unless by a majority vote of all the registered voters in the state at the time of the election.

The Grangers in their resolution charged that "a large share of the benefits of Idaho, supported by many politicians and individuals who have never paid their proper share of taxes and never failed to do so, are being used to ward off a strenuous campaign in the legislature to have the two per cent sales tax repealed."

The resolution pointed out that the rejection vote, although successful, was less than 25 per cent of the total vote cast and said that this situation "makes minority rule in an alarming degree and a potential danger to our democratic form of government."

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REGISTRATION FOR VOTE NEARS CLOSE

City Clerk Warns Taxpayers to Assure Themselves of Eligibility

Only two more days remain in which voters may register for the \$200,000 municipal election, to be held next Tuesday, December 13. W. H. Edridge, city clerk and registrar, said last night, urging all Twin Falls taxpayers to assure themselves of their eligibility to participate in the building.

Registration books will close at 9 o'clock Saturday night, to be open today and tomorrow from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m. Last night new registrations totaled 19, six from each of the city's two wards.

Mr. Edridge pointed out that all persons who voted at the last municipal election and who pay either real or personal property taxes in the city are considered as already registered unless they have moved from one side of Shoshone street to the other since that time. Voters who have moved since that time or who did not vote in 1937 will be eligible to vote only upon securing a transfer.

Polling Places

The clerk said that the polls will be held at the following places: Ward 1, from 7 to 9 p. m., the first ward polling place being the city hall while the second ward voters will ballot at the schoolroom of Lakeview. Ward 2, at election judges will be furnished with lists of taxpayers to add to the registration books.

City Attorney George M. Paulson recently defined eligible voters for the election and the registration books. He said that the voters who are eligible to vote are those who pay either real or personal property taxes and have resided in the city for 30 days previous to the date of election and have complied with registration requirements.

GOODING, Dec. 10 — Buying of turkeys for the Christmas market will under way. In Gooding, Charles Mink, local manager for the Idaho Egg Producers, is receiving and has a crew of about 40 persons picking and packing the birds. This organization expects three weeks for the market.

At time of delivery they are paying a price equal to about twice the estimated market price and will make the final payment soon after Christmas. Prices, Mink reported, are about the same as at Thanksgiving, possibly a little higher.

C. C. Tarpalin, independent buyer, started receiving December 7 and expects to buy about one car of turkeys.

J. E. Atkison, owner of the Greenhorn farm situated about six miles northeast of Gooding, finished picking and packing about 2000 turkeys Sunday for shipment to Seattle.

He now has approximately 1,000 fowls on hand and \$2000 he raised this year. During the Thanksgiving marketing period he sold over 2,000 birds to the Idaho Egg Producers.

He started the season with 8,000 in his flock, but the season was so poor for raising turkeys because of winter conditions that one-fourth of the birds were lost before they reached maturity, he stated.

The flock on the Greenhorn farm and the flock raised by E. C. Commons of Wendell were the two largest flocks of turkeys raised in the county. Mr. Atkison, has his own breeding stock and hatches his eggs at the Gooding hatchery.

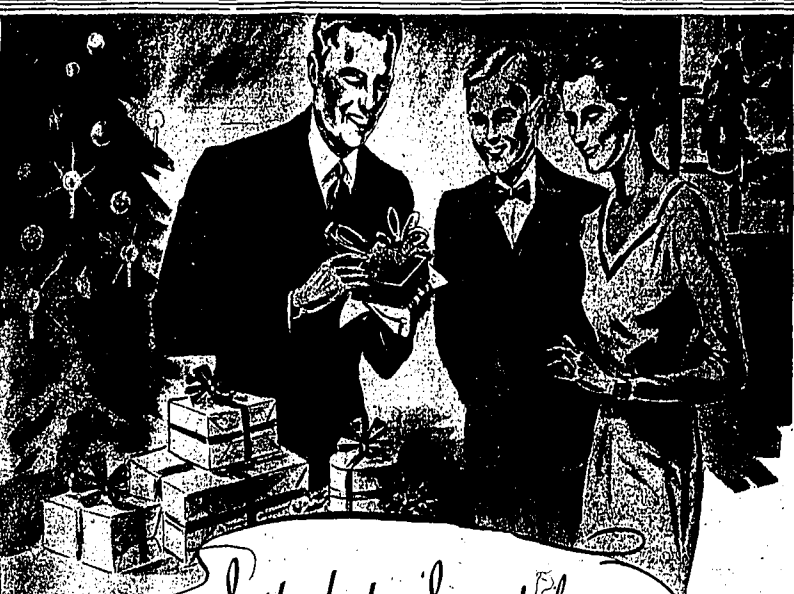

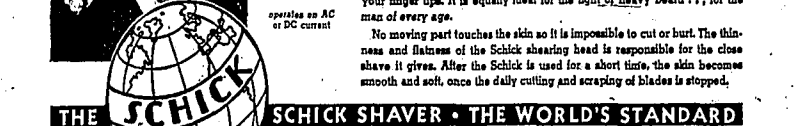
