# Slingin' Sammy Baugh Leads Texans To 9-0 Victory

## Small Colleges Place Gridiron Stars On 'Little All-America'

### T. C. U.'s Great Passer Smothers Vaunted Broncos

**Santa Clara Football Fortress Crumbles Before Aerial Bombardment In Bitterly Fought Contest**

**40,000 Fans Witness Gridiron Upset**

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12 (AP)**—Led by the greatest passer this football-mad section of the country ever has laid eyes on—cool and courageous Sammy Baugh—Texas Christian swept to a 9 to 0 victory over University of Santa Clara today to send the Broncos down to their first defeat of the season. It was "Baugh this, Baugh that," while 40,000 cheering fans watched the last unbeaten major team in the United States crumble before an aerial bombardment of deadly effectiveness. "Slingin' Sammy" directed the offense with a precision and accuracy that was the envy of all the other players on the field. He was the big gun, the powder charge, and the lightning spark in the terrific attack laid by the Horned Frogs from the plains of Texas.

Behind the clever quarterbacking of the Texas Christian star, the team forced the once "iron" gridiron fortress built up by Santa Clara during the season which brought it seven victories, neither defeat, tie, nor draw, and an invitation to meet Louisiana State in the New Year's day Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans.

Outplayed in the first period, and shut-out in the second, Texas Christian turned the tide of battle in its favor with startling suddenness in the second quarter. Glenn Roberts, 20-pound full-back from West Worth, opened the way for his team's (outbound). It was going toward the close of the second period when he stepped out to snag a Santa Clara pass on his own 32.

The scoring march, good for 83 yards, went like this: Baugh passed to sub half Montgomery for two yards; Baugh passed to right end Roach who lateraled to Roberts, who ran 15 yards before being downed. Baugh flipped one to left half McCall, who was downed on the 9-yard line—a gain of 39.

Baugh hit the line. Then Baugh crossed up the boys and the other four yards. The bundled Santa Clara—were running around in circles. Baugh opened the scoring play. It was a low swift pass to Roach, who nabbed the ball over the line.

"Dutch" Meyer, nephew and namesake of the coach, tried to try for the extra point. He failed; but the points that eventually won the game already had been scored. Young Meyer redeemed himself later in a big way. With Texas Christian holding the ball on Santa Clara's 15-yard line, Meyer, who meanwhile had played a bang-up game at left end, dropped back for a field goal try. The ball sailed to 10. He tied the oval at the 22-yard line.

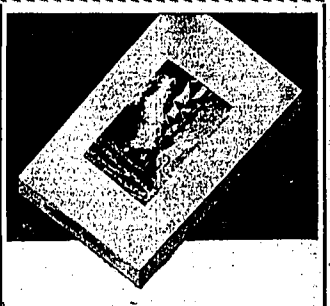

WEED ERADICATION CLOSES FOR YEAR

Trainload of Material Used in Twin Falls County

A trainload of material, principally carbamyl bi-sulphide and sodium chloride, was used during the 1938 season in moutain weed eradication in Twin Falls county. The material was furnished by the office of F. E. Hunt, director of the bureau of noxious weeds reveal. Although actual work on eradication operations is still being completed and will be forwarded to Boise before Christmas, Mr. Hunt said.

From Miller to Clatskanie the work was carried on and approximately 900 acres of farm land was treated, according to Mr. Hunt. The method used was to spray the weeds with the sodium chloride while the carbamyl bi-sulphide was worked into the soil.

Twin Falls county was one of the first in the United States to start weed control methods and is the second most treated county in the state. As high as 200 men were employed in the work during the peak periods of August and September. Labor will not be used during 1937 but the work will be continued by the county as before. Mr. Hunt said. The work has been carried on in the county during the past fourteen years.

SUGAR PLANT ENDS SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Third Best Season in History To Culminate December 17

The Twin Falls factory of the Amalgamated Sugar company will close Thursday morning, December 17, after having completed one of the most successful seasons in the history of the local plant, said R. H. Tallman, Idaho manager, said Saturday.

The total beet grown in the district this year has only been exceeded twice since the local plant opened, Mr. Tallman said. This season the plant will have about approximately 15,000 tons of sugar beets. The only two years exceeding this total were 1937 when 13,000 tons were grown and 1935 when 13,500 tons were produced, the records read.

Out of a total of 108 growers in the Twin Falls district 116 produced twenty tons or more to the acre. This stands against a five year average ending December 1938 of slightly more than ten tons to the acre, Mr. Tallman said.

By-products of the beets, consisting of raw molasses and pulp, are used by farmers for feeding dairy cows, sheep and other cattle. This year farmers purchased approximately 6000 tons of pulp for this purpose.

The other two factories of the company, the Paul-Rupert and one at Burley have already closed for the season. The Paul-Rupert factory was operated this year for the first time since 1926, Mr. Tallman said, and operated this year only because farmers used the new resistant seed for all plantings.

Total tons of sugar beets paid for by the company in the Twin Falls district which embraces Jerome, Hooding, Nicholls, Weiser and a section in Oregon were 118,132, according to Mr. Tallman. Farmers received \$3.50 a ton for beets this year against \$4.40 awarded in 1935.
