Lumber Operators Boost Wage Scale

LEWISTON, Idaho, Dec. 14—C. L. Billings, vice president and general manager of Potlatch Paper Co., Inc., a Weyerhaeuser subsidiary, announced a 10 per cent hourly wage increase for his employees, effective December 16.

He said the raise would apply to mill employees at Lewiston and including \$150 and to contract labor on a daily basis.

He said that the raise in wages is in line with the increase in cost of living together with a greater demand for our lumber.

About 2,300 men are affected in mills and camps of the company in the Lewiston area.

The peak season about 2,300 will be benefited.

Billings declined to disclose the total sum of the pay increase, but on the basis of the prevailing 50-cent hourly rate for common labor the raise would exceed \$15,000 monthly.

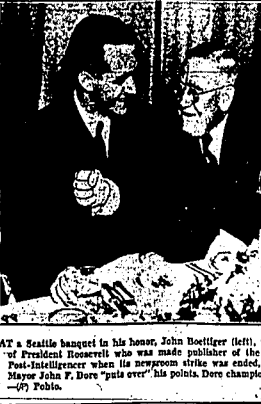

BRIGHTER OUTLOOK SEEN FOR FARMER

Demand for Products Due for Rise During Coming Year

Demand for farm products in 1937 will probably be much greater than it was during the past season and improvement is anticipated in both domestic and foreign demand, the latest report received from the University of Idaho, College of Agriculture, reveals. Harry S. Hale, Twin Falls county agent said Monday.

The report, according to Mr. Hale, both national income and industrial production will be ten per cent more during the coming year than it was in 1936.

Farmers are expected, during 1937, to increase their production of wheat slightly. The 1936 wheat crop is the largest ever produced in the United States and growers are likely to reduce their plantings next season, the report reveals.

Exports of pork and lard from the United States in 1937 will probably be very low. The chief reason is the small supplies and high prices of these products in this country. Another reason will be the increase in hog production which is taking place abroad.

Produce Cheese

Idaho is becoming a factor in the national production of Swiss cheese, the report states. In 1934 Idaho produced 1,284,555 pounds of this commodity. During the first six months of 1937 1,227,417 pounds were produced, almost as much as during the whole of 1934. Idaho now ranks sixth among the states in the total cheese production, with an output in 1935 of 2,326,000 pounds. Its share of the total production, the report says, is not so favorable. Many trees in this area have not reached the maximum bearing capacity. Prices in western states during the next few years may be less favorable in relation to prices to the rest of the nation.

COUNTY HITS RECORD IN CATTLE FEEDINGS

More cattle are on feed in Twin Falls county at the present time than at any period during the past several years, Harry S. Hale, county agent, said Monday.

At the present time approximately 700 cattle are being fed in the county in addition to approximately 40,000 sheep, Mr. Hale said. Cattle will start to move to market in January and sheep will have already started to move rapidly, he said.

Much of the feeding is being done with pulp and saw shavings purchased from the Amalgamated Sugar company plant at Twin Falls. Records of that company show approximately 8000 tons were sold farmers dealing with the organization.

TODAY IS DEADLINE FOR SECURITY CARDS

Midnight tonight will be the deadline for social security blanks to be received at the local postoffice, officials said Monday.

The original deadline had been set for December 8 but national officials at Baltimore, Maryland, extended that time ten days because of the war in Spain.

Officials urged employes to complete their cards at once and bring or mail them to the postoffice before the time limit expires tonight.

WEED CUTTING AID TO SNOW-FIGHTING

Dry Fall Enables Farmers to Reduce Winter Hazards

A dry fall, which enabled farmers to burn weeds lining much of the 265 miles of surfaced road kept clear each winter by snow fighting equipment of the Twin Falls Highway district, will prove a benefit when winter snows come, J. D. Sincera, director, said Monday.

Presence of weeds lining the road each year has served to form deeper drifts, Mr. Sincera said. "The snow served as a natural snow fence, causing the snow to drift directly over the center of the highway."

During an ordinary storm, the equipment housed in Twin Falls can cover the district in thirty hours. It is pointed out, the more intense the storm, the more time required to clear the roads.

Because the initial cost and upkeep is so high for drift fences, the district is unable to maintain them, Mr. Sincera said.

During the winter the snow equipment is called to give almost every type of service. Despite snows the roads must be kept open enabling school buses, mail and milk routes, and physicians to get through. In some instances a plow has cleared the way for a physician on an emergency case and, because of the intensity of the storm, has been forced to wait until the physician was through and then break the road ahead to enable him to return, Mr. Sincera said.

Over half of the roads in the district run north and south and therefore are more open to drifting from the prevailing wind coming from the west.

SECOND FALL LAMB POOL BEING FORMED

The second fall lamb pool for Twin Falls county will be assembled and shipped to midwestern and eastern markets Wednesday and Thursday, December 16 and 17, County Agent Harry S. Hale said Monday.

The lamb pool schedule follows: Wednesday afternoon, December 16, at Tyler and Buhl; Thursday morning, December 17, at Twin Falls. Because of the small number of lambs for this shipment, assemblies will only be held half-days at each station listed, Mr. Hale said.

The last pool was shipped December 8 from Piegan and was purchased by W. H. Smith and Son of Denver. The shipment consisted of 266 animals weighing 2225 pounds. Top prices of \$25 a hundred were received.

Lamb Pool Better

"The lamb pool is looking a little better, but I do not see much chance of any substantial improvement until February and March because of the large number of lambs in feed lots and on pasture ready to move to market," Mr. Hale said.

The last pool netted \$7.08 with the customary thin per cent buying shirts and the present market would justify a little more."

In the pool this week any kind of sheep including fat lambs, fleeces, lockers, wethers or fat ewes will be accepted and will be sorted at the yards.

Shipping of cattle from this section will start within the next week, Mr. Hale said. He urged that those wishing to ship in the pool list the number being sent at the offices located in the court house.

The bout was scheduled to go 10 rounds but lasted exactly 26 seconds. Louis landed only one solid blow, a vicious left hook that struck Simms flush on the chin.

Simms fell backward, his arms and legs in the air. Then he refused to draw his head down and waited until the count of eight before attempting to get up. Simms was groggy and reeling as he regained his feet.

Arthur Donovan, New York referee, waved the fight over to his corner, then waved Louis's arms around the stunned Cleveland boxer who apparently didn't know what struck him.

The fight, ending with such dramatic swiftness, left the crowd stunned. There was a cheer as the bout began, then amazement spread out with that left hook. The crowd couldn't believe the fight was over.

Simms' blow landed like a bolt of lightning. It was a short left hook that landed on Louis' forehead, carrying all the power in Louis' microscopically muscled shoulders.

Simms, a 195-pounder, started out to make a fight until that one wallop knocked him sprawling. The Negro boxer, landing five blows to Louis' body and head, he scored first with a left hook into Louis' forehead.

The Detroit Bomber shook his head and tried to get up, but he was falling within striking distance, his arms, like the speed of a meteor, his gloves first extended against Simms' jaw. Down Simms went.

Louis was much surprised as Simms was flustered. Simms, with a broken, twisted nose, the scars of other battles, said he was feeling the roof fall on him. The next thing he remembered, he said, he was waking up in the aisle.

Referee Arthur Donovan said Simms was unable to defend himself, and for that reason he stopped the match. The fight was simply knocked out Simms' career. Donovan said, "He didn't know what hit him. He might have been feeling the roof fall on him."

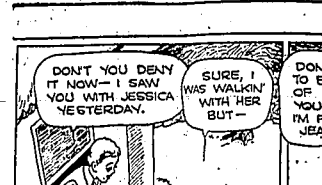

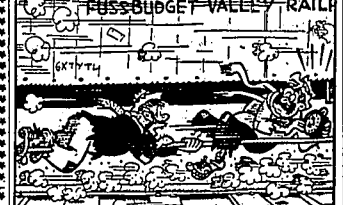
