Trend of Staple Prices

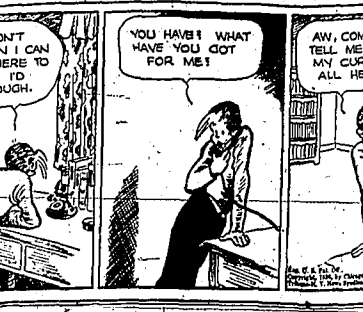

EMPLOYMENT GROUP SECURES POSITIONS

Local Office Places 20 in Private Industry During Week

During the past week 16 persons registered at the local office of the U. S. Employment Service have been placed in public work and 20 in private employment. D. Butler, manager, said Tuesday.

Of those placed in private employment several were regular full time jobs.

Situations filled during the week included waitress, domestic help, two route men for a local laundry and several store clerks. Most of the placements made under public work were on highway construction jobs, Mr. Butler said.

The present time there are two projects in operation which are employing men taken from rolls of the U. S. Employment Service. One is the construction of an \$800,000 underpass at Mountain Home by Mountain Construction company. The other project is a well known project in Kimberly and Acquia school house in Minidoka county according to Mr. Butler.

Recently three projects have ceased operations for the winter. They are the largest contract for a Hop-Condon oiling job in Cassia, Idaho and Twin Falls counties and the history of Idaho work on the Grants to Pinedale road by Dan Canaway, owner and contractor of Twin Falls has ceased operations. Another project under the U. S. Construction company, a road job at Fairfield in Cassia county, has been completed. The two construction projects will be continued next spring.

Under present arrangements all men taken from rolls of the U. S. Employment office for use on these jobs, Mr. Butler said.

FOREST SERVICE TO FENCE LARGE AREA

Two crews of men, one taken from WPA rolls and the other from the CCC are constructing ten miles of barbed wire fencing along the north boundary of the Coala was division in Minidoka forest, Forest Ranger Elmer O. Rose said here Tuesday.

The crews, according to Mr. Rose, are working out of Rock Creek and Colterwood and will complete the winter work by the end of the month. The work is continuing approximately 15 miles south of Twin Falls.

It is planned to eventually fence the whole forest in order to control fire. The present sections are already fenced by private landowners.

ENGINEERS OKED AIRPORT GRANT

Clark Expects President's Signature on Local Project Soon

Twin Falls' dream of an adequate municipal airport, came one step closer Tuesday with receipt of a telegram from Congressman D. Worth Clark of Washington, D. C., saying he had secured approval of the project from the engineering division of the WPA. The telegram was received at local Chamber of Commerce office and was a copy of one sent by the congressman to H. J. Crosswell of the Capital Air Lines.

The telegram follows: "I have been working on WPA project for Twin Falls airport and have finally secured approval in engineering division where difficulty had been encountered owing to certain regulations of the department. I expect to secure WPA approval shortly and also budget approval soon and president's signature immediately upon his return to Washington. You can depend I will keep after matter and wire as soon as final action is taken. If the project is approved the field will be graded, runways will be constructed and probably oiled, if possible. This field will eventually be lighted."

Give Employment "If the project is approved it will mean employment and will create considerable work for WPA roll members," F. O. Thompson, manager of the Chamber of Commerce said.

"It will also mean air circuits which will be here attracting many visitors to the city and it will put Twin Falls in a favorable position to receive air mail service. It will mean untold savings to business firms in getting their orders to market sooner."

Under the present setup the Capital Airlines, which operates a passenger schedule from Boise to Pocatello through Twin Falls, will be allowed to bid for a mail contract after holding their operations for a six-month period.

Activity for securing such a contract is already underway, officials said.

POTATO INCREASE SEEN NEXT YEAR

High Prices Received Will Tend to Encourage Additional Plantings

If potato growers react to prices and other conditions as they have in previous years under circumstances similar to those found this year, they will increase their acreage slightly for 1934, a University of Idaho, College of Agriculture report received by Harry B. Han, Twin Falls agricultural product.

"The high prices being received for the 1933 crop will encourage them to increase their acreage next year," the report says. "However, it is estimated that the price received for the second crop preceding the one being planted has a greater influence on plantings. Thus, farmers will recall the low prices received for most of the 1933 crop, and refrain from increasing acreage as much as one might expect. On this basis it is thought the acreage planted in 1934 will be about 2 per cent larger than that planted this year."

In some sections of Idaho, the report points out, the production of early potato varieties for the mid-season market is of considerable importance. Present indications are that the early crop is likely to bring better prices than the late crop during 1934.

Estimated Crop "Twin Falls I estimate places the 1934 Idaho crop at 22,500,000 bushels. This is slightly below last year's crop of 22,500,000 bushels. This is the smallest Idaho crop since 1929, the report reveals.

Usually Wisconsin and Minnesota produce larger crops than Idaho but since 1929 only Minnesota has exceeded Idaho in total output of potatoes, the report states.

Beans to Increase "In the great northern bean sections, comprising the states of Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Nebraska, the total acreage for this product was 14 per cent less last year and six per cent less than the 1928-29 five year average.

The favorable prices received for beans may lead to lead farmers to plant an acreage in 1934 too large to be profitable, the report says. If acreage in beans is increased very much above the ten per cent, the crop yield probably be large enough to make prices under average market conditions should be well below the average."

Christmas names are being added to the list for Christmas baskets every day, she reports, and more money is required to meet the indicated needs.

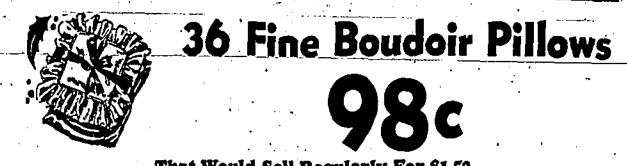
