

Spain's Government Pins Lone Hope On New European War

Anarchistic Elements Getting Out Of Control (By The Associated Press) HENDAYE, Franco-Spanish border, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Spanish government's lone hope for victory lies in a European war, according to reports from Madrid said today.

Intelligent Spaniards supporting the government have come to feel they cannot depend upon Russia; that Italy-German Reunited States will not be a reliable ally; that there is only disappointment in hoping for help from the Soviet government of France, in the present circumstances.

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CHINA ORDERS EXECUTION OF REBEL LEADER

Loyal Troops Advance White Secret Negotiations Proceed for Release of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek

(By The Associated Press) NANKING, China, Dec. 18 (Friday)—Two armies fought today while secret negotiators debated settlement of a civil war that may cost the lives of both leaders, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and his captor, Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang.

The Nanhai regime, although asserting its armies were highly successful on the Hsueh-Liang front, declared a truce and compromise with the rebel marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang, was known to be in the making.

Deep internal conflicts, however, in the closely guarded conference at Nanking, where James Edgar, British adviser to Marshal Chang, was cloaked with Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, her brother-in-law, Dr. J. H. Kung, minister of finance and temporary head of the government, and her brother, T. V. Soong, ex-chairman of the Nationalist government.

Chiang Tzu-Wei, formerly military governor of Szechuan, had been sent to steer Marshal Chiang in his civil conflict.

The fighting has started there again. Part of White Offensive Apparently the Boadilla action was part of a wide offensive by General Francisco Franco, the insurgent commander. Other fighting was in progress in northwestern University City, and from the northeast, Fascist troops were moving toward Madrid.

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NEW DEAL STRIVES TO TRIM SPENDING

Administration Moves to Reduce Appropriations and Taxes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt today became the hub of a whirlwind which of second-term activities that are among other things, official word that the administration was striving for cuts in both federal appropriations and certain taxes.

At the same time the following reports emerged from White House conferences and other authoritative circles:

- That the chief executive and congressional leaders look to further improvement in business to hasten a return on a balanced budget.
- That there will be no general reshaping of the cabinet.
- That the government will do "very little" borrowing from now on to finance running expenses.
- That the civilian conservation corps will be extended after March 31 and made permanent July 1.
- That the lending powers of the reconstruction finance corporation will be extended beyond July 1.
- That the White House secret will remain the same, at least for the time being.

Budget and Taxes

Chauncey Harrison (D-Min) and Douglas Harlan (D-Min) of the senate and house committees on taxation talked budget and taxes with Mr. Roosevelt. Harrison said the question of eliminating nuisance taxes where administrative costs were "out of all proportion" to the revenue collected was being studied.

"He reiterated there would be no increase taxes at the coming session, basing this opinion on the business pickup and consequent higher tax receipts."

"Reports of receipts to the treasury are most gratifying," he said.

Speaker Bankhead (D-Ala) came out of the president's private office with a statement he said discussed prospects of keeping appropriations down.

Daniel W. Bell, acting budget director, who attended a party with the president, Secretary Morgenthau and Martin B. Eccles, federal reserve board chairman said "there is nothing left to be done on the budget now but the message." (The president's budget message to congress.)

Concerning Mr. Roosevelt's second-term program, Mr. Bell predicted there would be no general change in the present lineup.

TWIN FALLS YOUTH INJURED IN WRECK

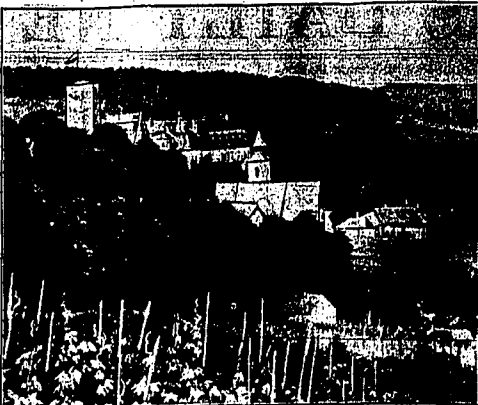

CUBA'S SOLDIERS PRESS SUGAR TAX

Army Battles Tor Rural Schools Under Military Regime

HAVANA, Dec. 17 (AP) — Cuba's army leaders, with their strongman, Colonel Fulgencio Batista, aided with a grippe, pressed tonight their fight for passage of a \$120,000,000 sugar tax bill in the face of presidential opposition.

There were few informed observers who doubted that the army would eventually win its battle to contain funds for army-financed rural schools.

A number of national representatives and senators were "normalizing" with Major Jaime Miralles, chief of army adjutants at Camp Columbia.

Meanwhile, in Havana, leaders of a pro-tax demonstration cancelled plans for a demonstration in front of the capitol because less than 100 persons showed up.

The best informed observers said the sugar tax itself was becoming a secondary thing, and, instead, there were signs of an open fight between the military and the congressmen, on one side, and President Miguel Mariano Gomez on the other.

The same observers said the army needed 100,000 votes to override the Gomez veto on the sugar bill, and that it already has pledged 106.

BLACK LOCUST SEED GATHERED AT GOODING

GOODING, Dec. 17 — Black locust seed gathered by members of the Gooding county locust seed pool was sold in Boise Saturday to the Herold Seed company of New York City.

The seed, which was gathered in Gooding county, is said to be hard and strong and is used by many farmers for wagon tongues and handles.

Pods about two inches long contain the tiny bean-shaped seeds. The pods hang on the trees after the leaves have fallen. Picking is easy and one man can pick several dollars worth in a day. Mink stated.

He said that the seed will soon be a valuable crop for many farmers in the county. He says it means additional income for every farmer who had some of the trees on his farm and streaked that no one should neglect picking the seed.

Seed Threshing

Threshing of the seed is accomplished by putting the pods through ordinary threshers about three times. Return from 100 pounds of pods is about 20 to 30 pounds of seed.

Gathering of pods for a second threshing and sale is to begin immediately, Mink says. In a letter mailed to farmers this week he cautioned them to keep their seed free

of trash and not pick wet seed, because it could not be threshed.

He also said that the same company that bought the seed Saturday has bargained for the next lot of seed and has deposited \$10,000 with the county marketing association to pay for the seed as it is delivered in Gooding. About \$9 per hundred pounds of pods will be paid this time for seed.

TEACHER CONVICTED OF SLAYING FATHER

Punishment Fixed at 20 Years Imprisonment; Bond Furnished

WIDE, Va., Dec. 17 (AP) - A verdict which "sure knocked out my Christmas" today convicted 23-year-old Edith Maxwell for the second time of slaying her minor-blacksmith father. Her punishment was fixed at 20 years imprisonment.

The brunette school teacher broke into a room when a deputy clerk read the jury's verdict "guilty of murder in the second degree." But she soon regained composure when Judge Ezra T. Carter allowed her release on \$10,000 pending argument of a defense motion to set aside the decision.

In her first trial, which resulted in a first-degree conviction and a 23-year sentence, later set aside by the Virginia supreme court of appeals, Edith, here, had been struck by her father with a "slipper" when he sought to attack her.
