MORNING SETS DEADLINE TO LOOSE CHANG

Ultimatum Demanding Return of Leader Sets Time Limit; Crack Army Units Sent to Sianku

(By The Associated Press) PEKING, Dec. 18 (AP)—The Chinese government today gave rebel Marshal Chang (P. A. M. Sunday E. T.) to deliver Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek alive, or facing the fury of Nanjing's armed forces.

After a few hours' halt in the drive on Sianku to rescue its leader, the government notified rebel Chang Kai-Shek that its ultimatum demanding Chiang's release was final.

Chinese officials said this action was taken after receiving a letter signed by the generalissimo himself saying he might be back in Nanjing tomorrow.

The official (Chinese) back news agency published what it asserted was the text of this generalissimo's letter, in which he ordered cessation of infantry and air attacks on the Shensi rebels who hold Sianku, and urged generalissimo's rank.

The letter, the agency said, was couched in friendly terms, and was signed by the generalissimo's most trusted lieutenant, addressed to General Ho Ying-Chin, commander in chief of the army.

The date of the letter was not revealed.

Lewis announced the decision after a Washington conference with Homer Martin, president of the union, and claimed "many thousands" of men workers had enlisted under his banner.

The motor car industry started the fight of its plants, including the Ford Motor Company, General Motors, Chrysler, and others.

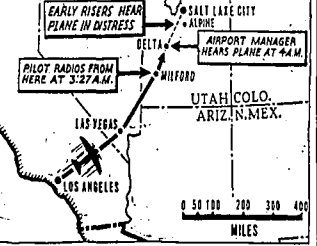

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### QUICK ENDS PROBE OF ROBBERY CASE

#### Alleged Kidnaping of Girl Remains Unsolved Mystery

TRUBSON, Ariz., Dec. 18 (AP)—A federal grand jury that labeled the six-day disappearance of June Robinson as a "mystery" today returned a verdict that the evidence was insufficient to warrant the indictment of any person in the alleged kidnaping of the girl, the will of judgment of the hearing case.

Declaring he was in "full accord" with the report, Frank E. Ryan, U. S. district attorney, announced today that he would recommend that the case be dropped from the records.

The grand jury dropped the indictment on the pursuing drama in which a pretty child, then six years old, was kidnapped from her home by a grand, wealthy from Spanish land grants, played the leading role—a drama replete with mystery.

Thomas J. Stewart, of the same line, three years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

Pierre J. Latta, steward on the Normandie, three years and a \$5,000 fine.

Joseph J. Martin, steward on the Normandie, three years and a \$5,000 fine.

Other sentences came just six months after federal narcotics agents started investigating an unusual case of opium from New York, the De France and Normandie boats.

### Remnants of Wild Horse Bands Face Extinction

#### Former King Posses for Photographers, Replies to One Statement

These two areas will be the first to be rounded up.

It is estimated that 100,000 wild horses are still left in the world, but it is believed that only 10,000 are left in the western United States.

It is believed that the wild horse will soon be a novelty and will no longer roam the rugged mountains of Idaho and Nevada, wild, untamed and free.

### INCOME INCREASES DESPITE DROUGHT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Higher prices for farm crops were offset by the drought, but income today to farmers more than offset drought damage this year.

The crop reports also said the nation's farmers would realize \$6,400,000,000 gross income from 1938 production, compared with \$6,000,000,000 from 1935 and \$7,276,000,000 from 1934, another drought year.

The board reported that the gross would provide \$4,000,000,000 for farmers, livestock and livestock products, \$3,100,000,000 and government benefits payable to farmers.

Although last summer's drought was described as less severe than the 1924 disaster, the board reported that farmers nevertheless harvested 21,000,000 acres less than they did in 1924. More than 22,000,000 acres were planted into crops were abandoned the report said.

The report based on December 1 conditions, slightly reduced estimated production of corn, wheat, hay and rice compared with last year.

Yields of several of the principal "1924 crops," the board said, were distinctly lower than usual. "There is no general shortage of food."

The small corn crop this year was valued at \$1,141,200,000, or slightly more than the estimated \$1,000,000,000 for this year, although 1938 production was placed at 1,341,170,000 bushels far below the 2,260,000,000 bushels of 1924.

Other crop values at more than \$100,000,000 this year, with new estimates for production, are: wheat, \$775,213,000 for 70,273,000 tons; wheat, \$434,338,000 for 62,841,000 tons; cotton, \$347,600,000 for 1,111,000,000 bushels; apples, \$10,072,000 for 10,001,000 bushels.

When the family comes trooping home for the holidays they find that days of careful preparation have resulted in a wealth of good things to eat—well planned to increase the enjoyment of Christmas time. The cook's jar is full to the brim with ice cakes and puddings, fragrant pies—and on the great day a succulent roast with all the trimmings.

From Cape Cod, which has given us the traditional cranberry, to the sunny southland, with its famed Ambrosia, a desert luncheon is preparing to make this holiday dinner the most luxurious of the year.

Whether it is Christmas stuffing with turkey, currant jelly with duck or spiced apple sauce with goose, flavor and harmony of foods are two big stepping stones to Christmas dinner success.

A cider cocktail—orange or pineapple juice, can be used chilled or hot for the first course at dinner. It may also be passed among the guests in the living room.

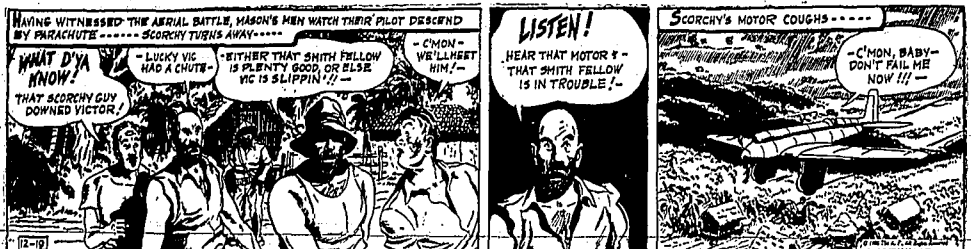

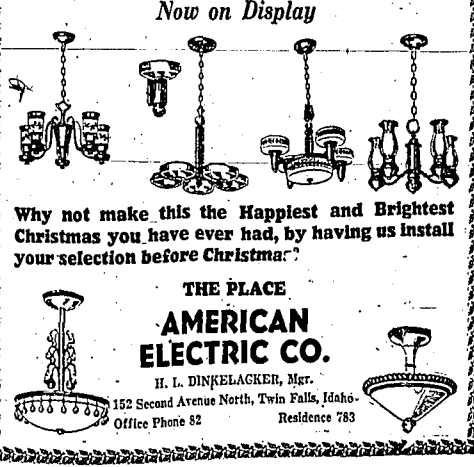
