Nazi Leaders Point to 'Breadlines in America'

BERLIN, Dec. 19 (AP)—Leaders of the Third Reich balanced empty plates with submarines today and turned the German eye toward "breadlines in America."

Der Angriff, the organ of propaganda Minister Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, came out with a full-page showing a white-haired New York grandmother, in tatters, giving thanks with clasped hands for a bawny mission haulout.

The caption said: "Bread! Meat! Vegetables! Even an apple! It's been months since she had such a meal—and, afterward, back into the street to disappear like thousands here, until they again bring her to a warm fire."

Der Angriff proudly contrasted such things with the German winter relief: "Based on duty toward our fellow citizens—not on pity."



# MILLER OPPOSED BY LABOR LEADER

## State Federation President's Objection to Appointment Endorsed

POCATELLO, Dec. 19 (AP)—Another leader of the Idaho State Federation of Labor jumped into the controversy today over appointment of Attorney General H. H. Miller as state immigration and labor commissioner. S. V. Lund of Pocatello supporting statements of the state labor president that union men do not want Miller.

Lund, immediate past president of the State Federation of Labor, backed up an assertion of Paul Blake of Lewiston, president of the Idaho labor group, that the appointment of Miller by Governor Hoag does not find favor of the federation.

Friday afternoon a letter attack was personal and that it spoke for himself and not for the state labor group. Miller's statement was absolutely correct when he said he was speaking for labor. Lund said as a president presided over the Lewiston convention of labor last fall and said today prior to the convention Miller and his friends made repeated attempts to have the federation endorse the attorney general for labor commissioner.

No Time for Politicians  
Lund said he promised to bring the request before the convention but refused to permit Miller to make his bid in person on the grounds that he had so much of our own business to attend to that we could not give any politicians.

Miller was informed also the federation thought if the state commissioner of labor position should be filled it should be someone who was acquainted with labor and labor procedure. In the event of a refusal, Mr. Miller appeared in Lewiston during the opening day of our convention and another of his representatives who had a fraternal seat in the convention again made the request for Mr. Miller to accept the position.

Miller said Blake's statement he appeared at Lewiston was "untruth."

If there is anything personal about the labor position, it is from the governor's and Mr. Miller's viewpoint.

All labor is asking is fair representation by someone who understands the problems involved.

We wonder what the legal fraternity would say if Mr. Miller were to appoint a good union man to the position of assistant attorney general?

Lund said labor had made official endorsement of August Hoagston of Pocatello, a vacation in the federation, as state labor commissioner.

# Sun Valley Christens Capital Of Recreation

## Union Pacific Plays Host At Dedication Of \$1,250,000 Sports Development

KEPCHUM, Idaho, Dec. 19 (AP)—Sun Valley Lodge—swanky \$1,250,000 Sawtooth Mountain Resort—will be dedicated next Monday night to the nation's winter sports lovers.

For six months the new capital of recreation has been under construction about a mile from this picturesque western village that was founded 48 years ago on a firing line of civilization.

Three hundred Idahoans—most of them conspicuous in the affairs of Idaho—have been invited to a dinner at the lodge next Monday.

Governor and Mrs. C. Ben Ross and Chief Justice Raymond, C. W. of the Supreme Court and Mrs. O'Brien are among them.

The Union Pacific railway—sponsor of the resort will play host with William Jeffers of Omaha, Neb., executive vice president of the company, presiding.

Old Dream Fulfilled  
With the opening, Ketchum village fathers will realize at last their hopes of a quarter century that this rugged mountain country some day might be nationally recognized as a playground.

Modern and salubrious in every detail, the 125-room lodge was conceived as a rendezvous for hiking, fishing, sledding and hunting parties.

The lodge and its various elds are located 60 miles north of Shoshone, through which the Union Pacific railway main line was built more than 60 years ago.

A branch of the railway connects at Shoshone with Ketchum, but the resort operates a fleet of sedans from the railway town to Sun Valley to shorten the journey for visitors.

Ketchum's distinction for many years has been confined to its reputation as one of the greatest sheep and lamb exporting centers in North America.

The town was founded by David Ketchum, who built the first cabin here in 1878.

Near the lodge winds the Little Wood River.

At Feet Of Sawtooths  
The resort nestles close to the feet of a range of snow-capped Sawtooth mountains, and from every window can be seen the white-crowned cedars that dot this vast, primitive domain.

Paradise led to the door of the new resort, which is situated on the Sawtooth Park Highway at the gateway to what would travelers have often termed "The Switzerland of North America."

Less than 100 miles to the south the highway connects with the modern Old Oregon Trail.

The resort is managed by Raymond F. Stevens of Lake Placid, N. Y., member of the 1932 American Olympics luge team.

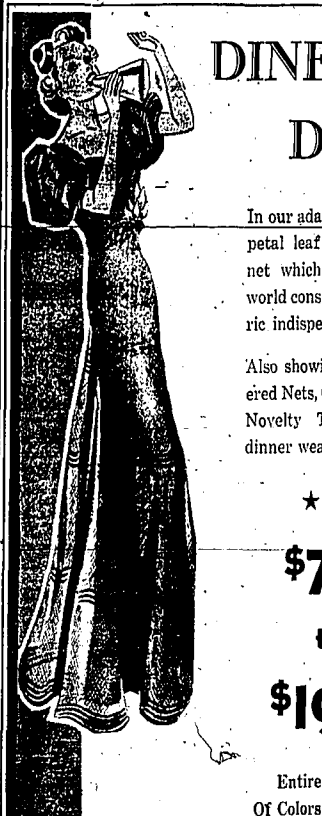

### WASHING INDIAN REVERSES TREND

#### Hope for Race Important Factor for Population Gain

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 19 (AP)—The erstwhile vanishing American disappearance act has gone into reverse.

"The psychological reason is most important, and significant. The inferiority and subjugation will die with the population in almost epicemic speed."

Collier's projects, patterned after the government's racial relief programs, have returned the Indian's self respect, increased the value of his holdings and taught him valuable trades, said the commissioner.

Soil conservation and modern farming methods have increased his food.

New hospitals and enlarged medical facilities have improved his health, already naturally bolstered by growing resistance to the white man's diseases.

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# MILLER ASKS NEW LABOR LEGISLATION

Retiring Attorney General Outlines Objectives in New Post

BOISE, Dec. 19 (AP)—Bert H. Miller, attorney general of Idaho for nearly four years, wound up the affairs of his office tonight and prepared to take up his duties Monday as commissioner of labor, immigration and statistics.

He was appointed to the new post by Governor C. Ben Ross a few days ago.

"I will file my resignation as attorney general Monday morning," Miller said.

Attorney General-Elect J. W. Taylor, an assistant to Miller for two years, will become attorney general.

Miller outlined tonight his ideas of legislation needed to better the condition of labor.

"Idaho," he commented, "is far behind most of the states as regards adequate legislation relative to labor and immigration.

Legal Curb Demanded

"We need a greatly increased population and we need legislation that will better the condition of labor. What we must have is legislation to curtail practices of unscrupulous persons that bring bad results. As seasonal periods of the year there is a great demand for increased labor in the harvesting of various crops. There is no prohibition against advertising in other states for labor, and the practice has been more or less common. As a result, labor migrates to that section in over numbers and a bad situation arises in that many are unable to secure employment. If there are anticipated needs for more labor for the year asserting that need should be required to submit the matter to the commissioner for his investigation and determination. The labor department should have access to the industrial and commercial places of employment where more than a minimum of workers are employed.

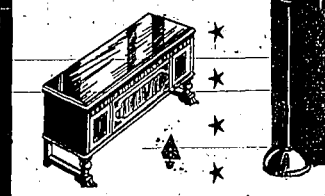

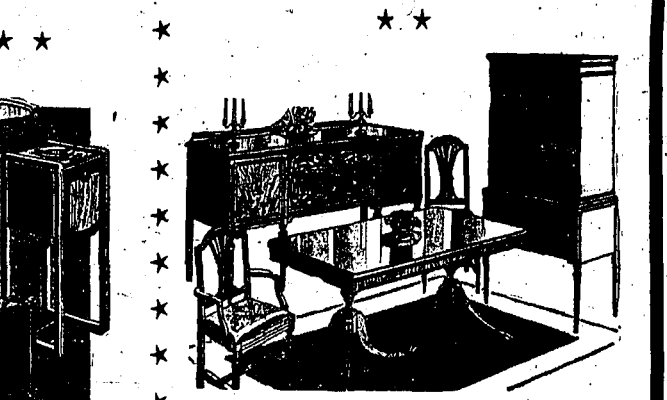

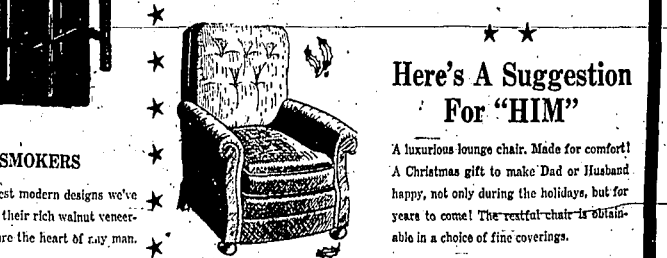

An agreement under which the state took over maintenance of the bridge was reached at a conference between directors of the Twin Falls and Hillsdale highway districts and Governor C. Ben Ross and J. H. Biermer, state director of highways, Boise last Tuesday, Mr. Binema said.

Under the agreement the districts paid to the state \$1500. The districts last summer called for bids for repair of the span, and then rejected the contractor's proposal as being beyond the district's financial reach. Repairs contemplated at that time included re-adjustment of hanger rods and diagonal braces, rebuilding of one panel of the floor and expansion joint and painting of the entire structure.

The Hillsdale district was represented at the conference in Boise by Dr. J. E. Gundelfinger, and State Representative Joe Day. Twin Falls district directors, V. E. Morgan and W. T. Cochrane represented the Twin Falls district.

OUTLOOK ALARMS

Idaho Entomologist Reports  
Spread of Infested  
Area in State

BOBOVOY, Idaho, Dec. 19.—The outlook is alarming. Crickets are swarming. The "outlook is alarming" Dr. C. W. Williams, entomologist at the University of Idaho agricultural experimental station, reported today. The known cricket-infested area in the state has increased from 100,000 acres to 1,500,000 acres now, he commented.

"About 20,000 acres will need to be dusted with insecticides in 1937 if reasonably effective control is obtained," he said. Last year about 45,000 acres were dusted at a cost of \$107,950, but the work was hampered by inclement weather. Agricultural crops and were not so effective in reducing total cricket population.

Under a plan adopted at the meeting by entomologists from the nine cricket-infested states \$200,000 may be made available from the federal government for work in 1937; Idaho share would be \$33,000. Work would start April 1.

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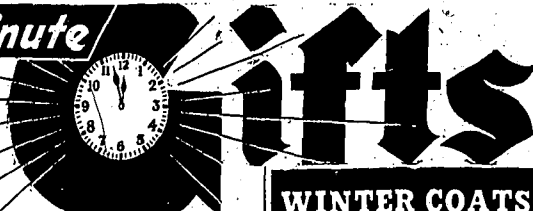
