## Woman Takes Plane To Confront Captor Of Chiang Kai-Shek

**Generalissimo's Wife Seeks Freedom For Mate.**

(By The Associated Press)

CHANG, Dec. 22—Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, a wife fearful for the safety of her mate and no longer mindful of the golden rule, flew from Hankin, today for Sianfu, center of rebellion, to meet directly with insurgent Marshal Cheng, Hatcher Chiang, the freedom of her husband.

A government airplane crashed to the ground in flames as a number of soldiers were killed in the wreckage today, it was reported today. The plane, believed to be fascist, also fell to the earth.

In a nearby government-held village west of Madrid, the fascist administration declared its troops advanced in the region of Boudilla del Monte, although the insurgents shelled that village as well as Pineda de Alarcon and Matagorda.

**England's Church Leaders Call for Religious Revival During Coronation**

LONDON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The romance of Edward of Windsor seems to have lured the Church of England on an emboldened religious revival tonight.

The archbishop of Canterbury, the archbishop of York and the bishop of Bradford called the people to think of God, and urged that they so rededicate themselves during the coronation of King George VI.

The archbishop of Canterbury will broadcast an appeal for a religious revival over British Broadcasting Corporation facilities December 27. Recordings will be related to the dominions during popular broadcasts.

The intended broadcast was described by church sources as a "clarion call for the nation to consider whether the time has arrived when there should be a return, in some measure, to religion."

**Ford Turns to Courts as Strikes Continue Tie-Up in Auto Parts Factories; Shipping Peace Unsighted**

DETROIT, Dec. 22—Strikes in automotive parts factories defied efforts of settlement by Mayor Frank Couzens and other mediators tonight, leading to at least one major auto-making manufacturer to move to produce his own requirements.

Harry H. Bennett, personal director of the Ford Motor company, announced he had asked Louis J. Colombo, attorney, to obtain a writ of injunction to obtain a writ of injunction for repossession of Ford-owned brake machinery now on consignment at the Kelcey-Hays company, site for nine days because of a "sit-down" strike.

**5000 Workers Idle**

The Kelcey-Hays strike, which has kept more than 5000 workers idle, was the center of the day's developments. The company supplies part of Ford's brake pads and inter-fering of its output has curtailed assembly operations in some Ford plants.

At a conference with Mayor Couzens and Bennett, George W. Kennedy, president of Kelcey-Hays, said that "as soon as our plants are free of men we will open immediately and minimum wage will be 75 cents an hour."

Thirty-three bodies had been recovered tonight and eight others were reported in the workings.

Twenty-three miners were injured, some so seriously they were expected to die.

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**BOMBER CRASHES ON FIRST FLIGHT**

**Airmen Escape With Minor Injuries When Huge Plane Falls**

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Three Army Army flyers escape with slight injuries when a \$90,000 Martin bomber, on its maiden overland flight, crashed a few seconds after it had taken off at Mitchell field, Long Island.

The huge twin-engine plane, with its 10 feet of wingspread, tumbled through a main power line, sheared off the right wing, then descended a telephone pole and knocked it over.

Pilot Ejected

The pilot, Lieutenant Glenn Thompson, a recent graduate of West Point, was ejected from the aircraft. Corporal Arthur Moore, his observer, and Private Donald L. Lessor, the radio operator, suffered minor cuts and bruises.

The crash was caused by a power line which had been cut out when the ship was about 700 feet from the ground in a sharp-climb "go take off." The ship wobbled and it landed in a field about 1000 feet from the army reservation.

**Gas Tax Collections Set New High Mark**

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—Idaho's 5-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax produced \$2,692,000 during the past 12 months—an all-time record—compared with \$1,900,000 for the previous year.

The increase is 18 per cent, said Emmitt Flint, state commissioner of tax enforcement and collector of the tax.

"It is due to favorable weather and improvement in business conditions," Flint explained.

**Nazi Germany Tells Housewives to Cook More Fish, Save Bread Crusts**

A secret meeting of treasury, postwar and other officials has been called for next week, at which final plans for the transfer are expected to be approved.

The purpose, authorities said, is to guarantee peace further by removing the possibility of the gold being used by a foreign power.

# BOARD ESTIMATES WHEAT INCREASE

### Department of Agriculture Reports 15 Per Cent Gain in Acreage

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP) — A winter wheat crop of slightly over 600,000,000 bushels next year was estimated by the agricultural department today in reporting needed acreage this fall was "by far the largest of record."

The crop reporting board estimated farmers had planted 51,817,000 acres to winter wheat this fall, or 15 per cent more than the 44,900,000 acres seeded last fall. The 1927-31 five year average is 45,285,000.

Whether this year's production exceeded the addition of the winter wheat crop to 71.8 per cent of normal on compared with 12.2 per cent on December 1, this board said. The same date last season and a ten-year average of 24.4 for 1922-31.

Last fall's seeded acreage of 49,683,000 produced an estimated 519,013,000 bushels.

All crop acres states reported increased winter wheat acreage.

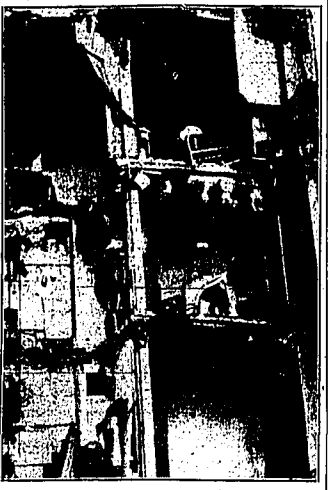
"Prospects Unfavorable"

The board said the principal decrease was in the northern great plains and Pacific northwest areas "where continued dry weather during the fall made prospects unfavorable."

The board said an estimated 1,781,000 acres this fall or 12.2 per cent more than the 1,584,000 acres of 1932. The 1927-31 average was 1,584,000 acres in the fall of 1932.

Yield production was estimated at 24,040,000 bushels on December 1 or less than half the 1932 yield of 68,397,000 bushels, and also well below the five-year average of 32,212,000 bushels for 1928-32.

# Ancient Skeleton Found Near CCC Camp in Hagerman Valley

HAGERMAN, Dec. 22 — Searching for rock suitable for building a salina structure last week, W. R. Burkhardt, engineer at the Hagerman CCC camp, came upon the ancient skeleton of a human being.

The bones were found exposed on a rocky hillside between the town of Bliss and Snake river near a point where the highway line, extending through this section, crosses an old road about a mile from the town.

The skeleton is almost complete with the exception of the head and appears rather small for an adult. The bones show unmistakable evidence of age. Along with it were found a fine tooth comb, bits of half rotted cloth, a spoon and an old leather tin can.

If the bones were ever buried indications are that they have been exposed through erosion and aliding of the shale on the steep hillside where they were found.

The skeleton has been brought to the Hagerman CCC camp and is now being used by Dr. A. J. Towler of the camp to instruct students in paleontology. The bones, in Dr. Towler's opinion could be 40 years old or more and could be either of the white race or Indian. Two other skeletons with cranium bones complete have since been located in the vicinity by CCC workers, Dr. Towler said.

So far as known now there is no way of determining past history of the skeletons, or whether an early day tragedy marked the scene of their resting place. In the opinion of some of the old timers of Hagerman valley the bones are probably those of Indians who died years ago when many of the red men camped in that vicinity. Others think the articles found with the skeletons would indicate they were Whites.

Frederick Conklin, an early pioneer of Hagerman valley who carried the first mail from Bliss to the upper Hagerman falls in 1821 and made regular trips three times a week near the spot till 1880, recalled early history of trouble with Indians experienced by freighters and emigrants farther down the Snake. He said he had never heard of such an incident in the locality where the skeletons were found. Years ago, he said, Indians attracted to Hagerman valley by the salmon running in Snake river had camped in numbers in that vicinity and the skeletons could well be those of some of them that died there, possibly before the white settlers were in the valley.

# RESETTLEMENT NOW PERMANENT AGENCY

### Roosevelt Merges Emergency Set-Up With Agricultural Department

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP) — In his first major move toward consolidating government agencies, President Roosevelt has decided to make the resettlement administration a part of the agriculture department.

Secretary Wallace revealed after a White House conference that the change would be made by presidential order about January 1, Rexford G. Tugwell, who resigned recently as executive for a large mortgage company, and Dr. W. W. Alexander, whom Tugwell picked as his successor, joined in discussing the move with Mr. Roosevelt.

The resettlement administration was established as an emergency agency April 30, 1933, by order of the president.

It has been in charge of buying and retiring from cultivation vast tracts of poor crop land, and has conducted experiments in resettling farmers and housing suburban populations. It also had adjudicated some farm debts and aided drought-stricken farm families.

Tugwell previously had urged the shifting of resettlement to the agriculture department, and Wallace thought it logical because 75 per cent of resettlement activities are agricultural.

Announcement of consolidation came while presidential and agricultural committees were studying the possibility of merging numerous agencies, and their combined work with a vast new program to aid

# DAMAGE CLAIM DENIED IN TRAIN-CAR CRASH

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP) — The Idaho supreme court in an opinion today, upheld the Hancock county district court in denying R. A. Dedman of Drummond, \$70,255 in a suit for injuries received when struck by an Oregon Short Line military train.

The accident occurred February 15, 1929, 12 miles northeast of Ashcroft, Idaho.

Others think the articles found with the skeletons would indicate they were Whites.

Frederick Conklin, an early pioneer of Hagerman valley who carried the first mail from Bliss to the upper Hagerman falls in 1821 and made regular trips three times a week near the spot till 1880, recalled early history of trouble with Indians experienced by freighters and emigrants farther down the Snake. He said he had never heard of such an incident in the locality where the skeletons were found. Years ago, he said, Indians attracted to Hagerman valley by the salmon running in Snake river had camped in numbers in that vicinity and the skeletons could well be those of some of them that died there, possibly before the white settlers were in the valley.

### COUNTY'S NEEDY DIVIDE PENSIONS

#### Relief Agency Distributes \$11,130 in November to 509 Cases

During November a total of 509 social security cases in Twin Falls county received \$11,130. It was reported Tuesday by H. H. Burkhardt, county supervisor of the Idaho Cooperative Relief Agency, of this amount \$4,905.22 was contributed by the federal government, \$3,706.99 by the state, and \$2,517.79 by the county, the records show.

Through which disbursements were made the report shows 377 persons under old age security received \$1,616.67 of this amount the federal government contributed \$1,209.22, the state \$388.99 and the county \$1,208.46.

Sixteen blind persons receiving aid were paid \$236 of which the federal government contributed \$188, the state \$112 and the county \$36.

During the same period 118 dependent children cases received \$2,827. Of this amount the federal government contributed \$1,209.22, the state \$1,208.99 and the county \$1,208.98.

At the same time \$1,295.50 was paid for direct relief on 82 cases, the report states.

#### State Figures

During the month of October throughout the state, \$30,236.54 was spent on direct relief, the cases numbering 2,377. These are cases that are unworkable and do not qualify for WPA or social security aid. In the state \$23,174 was spent on social security and included cases of old age, the blind, and dependent children's assistance. This makes a total of 1,278 cases cared for during October at an expenditure of \$28,852.04.

In Twin Falls county for October, 73 direct relief cases received \$1,476 and \$38 social security cases received \$1,300, making a total of \$1,856 distributed during the month.

"We are doing our best to get checks for the aged, dependent children and the blind in the mail before Christmas," Mr. Burkhardt said. "This will be their December payment. Both direct relief and social security checks are always mailed under other arrangements are made for delivery expenditures in Twin Falls county are expected to be approximately the same as those made during November."

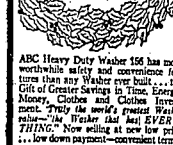

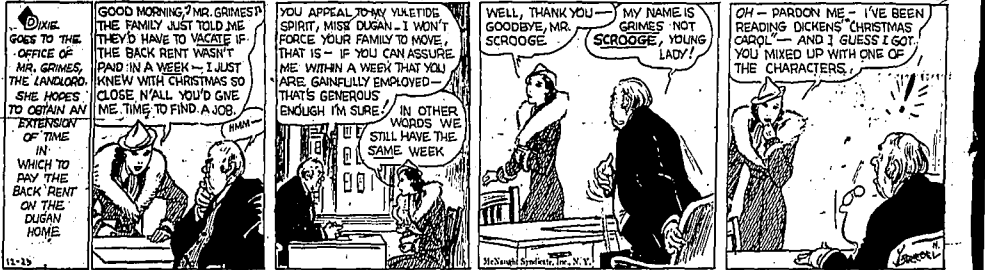

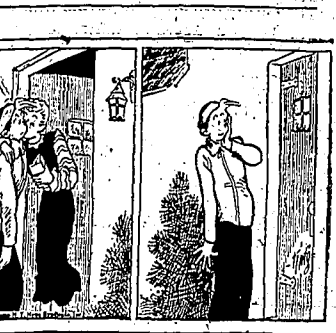
