EUROPE HOPES FOR NAZI PEACE MOVE

Hitler's Reply to Fascist Request for Troops Deemed Fateful

LONDON, Dec. 25 (AP) — With Chancellor Hitler's decision on invasion in Spain yet to be made known, official Europe remained tense tonight but with the mounting hope that Germany would avoid any step that might endanger widespread peace.

The conviction grew, despite recalcitrant holiday newspaper activities and an atmosphere of secrecy, that Europe now faces a showdown on its eastern front.

In Berlin there was a fearful behind-the-scenes activity, but there was no official confirmation of reports that General Wilhelm Paugel, chief of affairs of the Spanish fascists, had pressed an appeal for German troops to aid the civil war.

Believable advice said Chancellor Hitler was making a thorough study of the situation, and this was regarded by France as a good portent.

Paris Encouraged

Paris, informed sources said, while making plain that France was prepared for any eventuality, was inclined to further aid to the Spanish insurgents.

In London also there was authoritative interpretation of the situation as slightly more favorable because of Germany's careful definition of what course to pursue and evidence that Britain's view for neutrality is carrying more weight than in the past.

The British desire to enforce neutrality, these sources said, indicated that Britain again is taking the lead in European politics.

Russia appeared to be finding frank satisfaction in the firmer stand taken by Germany, and apparently was convinced the Spanish insurgents were "on the run" and that the aid of the Madrid government was assured.

The bombs jolted a foot-deep hole in the concrete floor of the foyer and demolished the outer lobby. No one was injured.

H. A. Parker, president of the company formed to operate the theater, said no threats preceded the explosion.

INGOLD DEVALUATION

BELM, Dec. 25 (AP) — The Nazi government decreed itself a Christmas present yesterday at the expense of private citizens, which profited owing to devaluation of foreign currencies.

Under the decree all profits made by converts having foreign debts through currency devaluations were seized in favor of the ministry of economics and finance authority. This amounts to more than \$500,000,000.

ICKES LISTS WPA EMPLOYMENT GAIN

Secretary Backs Proposal for Permanent Agency With Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—Secretary Ickes backed his proposal for a permanent PWA today with a report the present emergency provided employment in private industry for two and one-half times as many men as it put to work on the score of actual construction.

In an annual accounting, Ickes said projects costing \$1,717,309,726 had been allotted for 1936 under the three public works programs undertaken since his organization's establishment.

"PWA has spent for wages almost a billion dollars," he asserted. "Materials used in construction cost a billion and a half dollars—the majority of which went into the pockets of workmen in the mines, the forests, and the factories most often far removed from the site of construction."

"PWA is responsible for three-quarters of all the school and two-thirds of the day-care—day-in for the last three years," Ickes said.

In addition to work already under way or shortly to start, Ickes said there are 4,225 projects "approved by the examining divisions and eligible for allotment."

These would involve a total output of \$113,267,417, including loans of \$113,267,417 and grants of \$75,699,331.

VALUATION OF 4-H PROJECTS INCREASES

BURLEY, Dec. 25.—The 1936 4-H club project year has come to a close with club members completing 634 of the 822 projects for which they were enrolled during the winter and spring. Records turned in for these 634 projects showed a valuation of \$11,142.06 and a profit of \$4,014.46, which was \$300 increase in valuation over that in 1935. Earl J. Bland, district club agent, said today.

A summary of these completed projects shows club members were enrolled for work in baking, canning, clothing and room improvement, in home economics projects, beans, potatoes, garden, wax, cereals and feed identification, in crops projects, beef, dairy, sheep, swine, cattle, rabbits, chickens, ducks and turkeys, in livestock clubs.

Clothing was the most popular activity with 443 members enrolled and 262 completing 164 articles valued at \$1,740 with a profit of \$1,174. This year 1936 enrollment in food preparation, 75; sewing, 113; completed articles valued at \$3,322 and a profit of \$1,167. In canning, 37 members were enrolled and 35 completed their work taking 1,346 articles valued at \$1,142.06 and a profit of \$4,014.46.

Members completing projects in new foods were valued at \$802.25 with a profit of \$268.19. One girl completed a room improvement project.

Highest Valuation

Pig clubs showed the highest valuation of all 1936 projects, 24 members completing a valuation of \$2,326.03 and a profit of \$1,801.91. Dairy clubs enrolled 92 members, 63 members completing projects valued at \$2,732.92, profit \$678.87. Beef projects were third in valuation, \$1,364.83 and a profit of \$411.25. In clothing clubs were 33 of the 44 members enrolled. Enrollments and completions in other animal projects were: cows, 3 and 2; poultry, 2 and 2; rabbits, 7 and 7; sheep, 20 and 11.

Five girls completed four potato projects and one bean project. Their records showed 10 acres of beans grown at a cost of \$1,200.00 and a profit of \$1,200.00.
