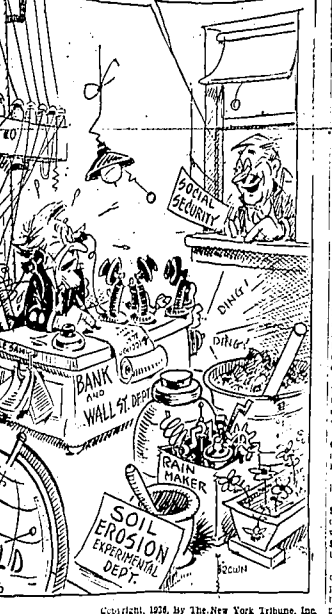

WPA TURNS RELIEF LOAD TO COUNTIES

800 Women to Be Removed From Federal Agency's Idaho Rolls

County commissioners must be prepared to budget for another 800 women, now on WPA work in Idaho and who will be removed from the rolls of the WPA on January 15...

Facing with a shortage of jobs through curtailment and reduction of quotas for January, Hood said almost half of the 1507 women now employed on WPA work in the counties and to social security for aid.

The Idaho quota for January is 7000 persons. Hood said in a letter to James L. Barnes, Twin Falls county commissioner and spokesman for the state association of county commissioners. The social security act provides for a permanent plan for such cases; the Work Progress Administration is a temporary measure solely for relief of unemployed persons and for those not eligible for other federal benefits.

It seems entirely fair, therefore, that three women who will require more or less permanent aid should be removed to the agency best equipped to care for them even after emergency agencies have passed out of existence.

Jobs for Men. — Another consideration is that each of these women is taking the place of some man with a wife and family in just as much need as these dependent children cases are removed from our rolls, we can immediately replace them with employable men. Present indications are that even the additional places left open by this may be insufficient to provide for all these men.

We believe there is a practical advance to each county in going along with us in this connection. Such needy men as we cannot employ certainly will be a charge on their communities without federal aid in carrying the burden. On the other hand, when the state and government cooperate financially on social security cases, the cost to the counties and towns is proportionate.

On January 1 we will commence to separate these women. So that none of them will suffer any hardship we will allow sufficient time for the Idaho cooperative relief administration to investigate and certify them before we cut them off. We anticipate all such cases should be closed on our records by January 15, 1937.

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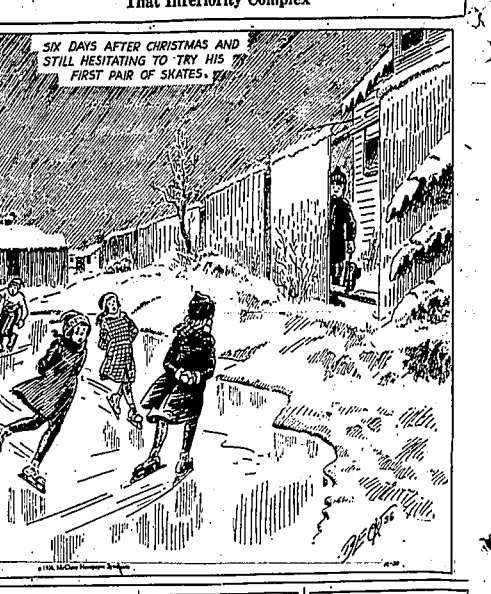

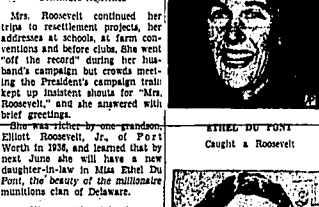

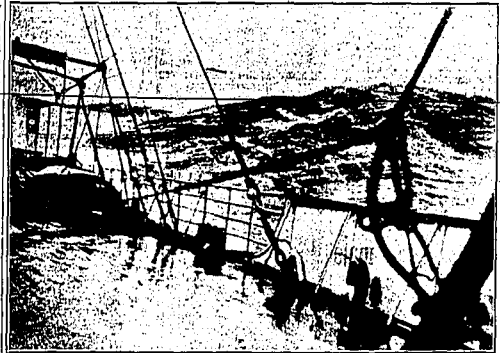

National Athletic Association Condemns 'Bow' and All-Star Amateur-Professional Contests

N.C.A.A. Calls For Ban On Forecasts By Coaches

NEW YORK, Dec. 29 (AP)—Curricular football games of the post-season, "bow" and all-star professional variety were vigorously opposed today by the 31st annual convention of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The convention approved the granting of recognition to the football game matter which came to prominence within the last few years when Western universities sold their games to commercial sponsors and the news was taken up in the East by Yale last fall.

However, the convention's approval of football broadcasts ended the fight of the National Association of College Coaches of college teams "and all others associated with the conduct of college football," and trained from making public statements containing forecasts of probable results.

"We make this recommendation," said Professor Z. C. Cleveland of the University of Chicago, "because we believe, first, that it is not becoming for those concerned with the conduct of intercollegiate sports to give publicity to the probable outcome of contests beyond those in which they are immediately concerned, and second, because such prophecies or forecasts give further stimulation to the urge of gambling."

Diagnose Broadcasts

Going further, the convention disapproved forecasts of any kind by coaches, suggesting the elimination of the practice in some cases. It also disapproved of intercollegiate sports to participate in commercial broadcasts in which the coaches of the colleges sports are traded upon for the sales promotion of products.

"The purpose of this resolution," said Professor Cleveland, "is to diagnose the broadcast of college sports as a means of advertising and to suggest that the broadcast of college sports be treated upon for the sales promotion of products."

John T. Griffith of Chicago, who was re-elected president of the N.C.A.A., said that there "are fewer boys per thousand than ever being legitimately substituted in college teams than was true 25 or 30 years ago."

The convention adopted a resolution concerning the broadcast of Avery Brundage, president of the Olympic committee, who was re-elected president of the N.C.A.A. at the University of Utah, Salt Lake City.

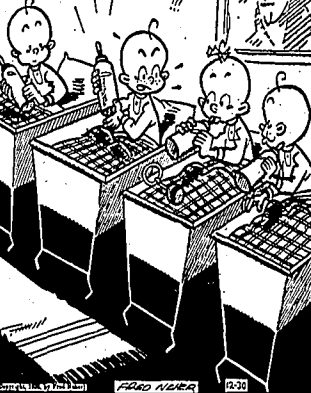

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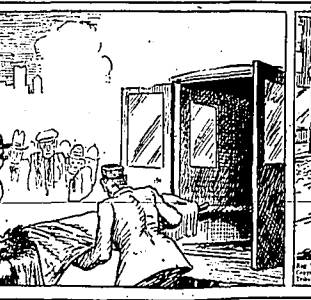

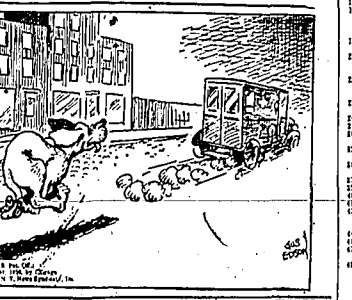

MIGRATION FACTOR IN DISEASE RISE

Many Active Tuberculosis Cases in County Are Traced

One of the major reasons for so many active tuberculosis cases in Twin Falls county is that persons having the disease have moved here from throughout the United States. The existence of this disease may have been contributed to by the poverty and poor living conditions that were encountered there. It is stated in the first annual report of activities of the state department of public health, prepared by Dr. J. W. Hawkins, director of the Twin Falls county health unit.

The report will be released for general distribution in the next few days. Figures dealing with various diseases existing in this county and control work being done are prepared by Dr. Hawkins for the state report.

"Probably the most difficult situation confronting communicable diseases in Twin Falls county," the report states, "has been the problem of tuberculosis."

"Extensive surveys were made during the summer and fall months of tuberculosis in the county and suspicious cases with lung symptoms, loss of weight and other signs pointing toward possible infection."

Examined 13 Cases - "One hundred and fifty cases were examined. Of these 95 children were given a skin test, of which 22 were positive reactors, and 42 adults were skin tested, of which 28 were positive reactors. Through cooperation with the Idaho Tuberculosis association, chest x-rays have been made on 35 patients, 21 of which showed positive evidence of tuberculosis. Over sixty of these cases of active or possible tuberculosis have been handled through the local health unit."

"Six cases have been given care at the county farm with absolute rest and medical attention of a nurse has been given in these cases, in addition to medical supervision provided by the physicians of the county."

"It is interesting to note that for the five years prior to this year, 100 cases have received hospitalization from this county. The support of four of these patients was provided by the Veterans bureau of federal government, the other three being supported cooperatively through county and state. About 100 cases of tuberculosis are reported in this county by the county commissioners and the WPA, nurses attending at a home of equal number being given patients," the report states.

Dr. Hawkins returned to Twin Falls Monday after spending a short vacation at Coeur d'Alene. Excursions back to Twin Falls he will be making at the close of his visit.
