

# GIANT DIRIGIBLE R-34 REACHES HER DESTINATION SUNDAY MORN

## Ties Up at Roosevelt Field After Eventful Cruise of 3600 Miles Across Atlantic.

MINNEOLA, I. I., July 7.—The giant British dirigible R-34, first lighter-than-air craft to cross the Atlantic, was anchored at Roosevelt flying field at 2 1/2 Sunday morning, having completed the voyage of 3600 miles in 108 hours and 12 minutes. Immedi-

ately preparations were made for the return voyage, the details of the start- ing which has not yet been settled.

The cruise of the R-34 was filled with exciting incidents. In mid-ocean, a tall iceberg suddenly appeared in the R-34's path. Fearing the effect of the collision on the gas bladders, the dirigible tilted her nose upward and hauled the ice mountain like a juniper leaping a fence. In the same manner she hurdled five other banks.

At one period in her flight the R-34 spun through calm atmosphere with a cloud layer above her and another below.

In Saturday night's battle with the storm over the Bay of Fundy, the dirigible was suddenly tossed 100 feet by an unexpected wind blow. Her skeleton frame creaked and it was feared she might break in two.

The president will include an address at the Metropolitan cathedral at Columbus, but as the closing session will be held on July 15, it was pointed out that the president probably will be unable to accept.

It is known that many of the president's advisers have advised him to abandon the speaking tour entirely, or for the present at least.

Strikers leaders said today that their cause numbered 1,500.

## HE LOST LOVE, SHE SHOT HIM

### Chicago Attorney Had Three Women to Look After Him—He's Dead in Hospital

CHICAGO, July 8.—Three women who are in the triangle that led to the slaying of Benjamin E. Barr, an attorney, will face each other today before a coroner's jury empowered to investigate Barr's death.

One of the women is 15-year-old Margaret Seithamer, who killed Barr by firing the shot from a tiny pearl-handled revolver into his body. A second is Mrs. Thilo Bauer, Barr's fiancée to whom he was to have been married last week. Mrs. Bauer is Mrs. Myrtle Westgate first, the common law wife of the slain attorney, is the third.

It was because she thought Barr no longer loved her that Miss Seithamer lured for him in his office yesterday afternoon, and then she entered Barr's study with a hot revolver in a hand.

Testimony at the inquest is expected to reveal further details of Barr's tangled love affairs.

Miss Seithamer expressed no remorse today over the killing of Barr, and laughed when informed that he had died of the wounds she had inflicted.

"He got what was coming to him," she told the police. "He made a toy of me, and then cast the stone which no longer availed—I warned him but he would not listen."

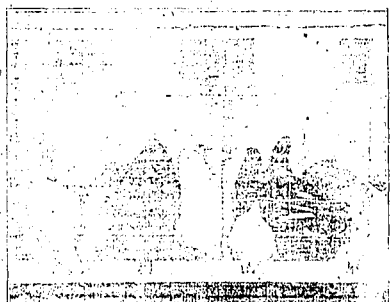

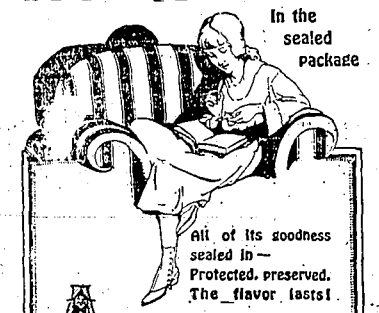

### U. S. CLOTHING SCHOOLS

The scene was the waiting room of a railway station in Phoenix, Ariz. That place was chosen because there was no other kind of place. Before the affair started, a committee of women gave the room a thorough scrubbing and changing it over. They took down the room because a waste of industry and material. A few sewing machines and two work tables were set up. A home demonstration agent taught a work to many women. The first afternoon found 92 women earnestly at work. Instruction was given in dress making and millinery. Clothing schools are held in other localities as well. The work is under the direction of the home demonstration agent, who is a member of the U. S. Bureau of Home Economics. It is not often necessary to have a railway station, but so in the case of Phoenix. The women at the station are busy with their work. During the week at Phoenix, one woman made a velvet dress, aingham dress, a skirt, a hat and a baby cap. The total amount of work accomplished by the class was surprisingly large. Women who find it not very desirable to do their own sewing and to make most of the family wardrobe out of contrived, hard-earned money are being taught to sew and make their own clothes. There is a saving in time and money, and not to mention temper and family happiness in the right kind of instruction, intelligently applied. The work of the home demonstration agents in this field should be as productive of good results as it has already been in other fields.

BUFAALO, N. 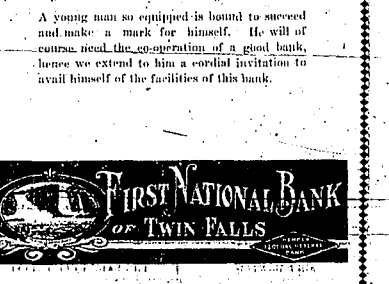
