### GARBLED NEWS REPORTS

It is easy to be misunderstood, and hard to straighten out the misunderstanding after the truth has been given wide circulation. An instance of egregiously unintentional misstatement was the flight of the Atlantic from Newfoundland to Galway, Ireland. Naturally, he was an object of deep interest to the newspaper reporters, who sought him out and got interviews which were carried to America and spread all over the nation by the ubiquitous press. One of the statements which the pilot gave in his Lancashire dialect was that "we had a lot of hail on the way over." Whether it was entirely due to the dialect, or whether a part of the mistake was due to inaccurate cables, the innocent statement about raining into a hailstorm reached Twin Falls over the wires of the International News Service, making the pilot say it was "hail" on the way over. Doubtless the trip was nerve-racking. Another news service reported that statement, "We had a lot of ail on the way over." What the aviators were doing with the amber fluid, going from prohibition America to Ireland was quite beyond human understanding. Now, if the machine were coming to America with a load of the forbidden drink, it might have carried the suggestion of a bootlegging expedition. The explanation for the misstatement perhaps is to be found in dropping the aspirate, and the habit of speech which mounts the vowels in a manner extremely understandable to the Briton but incomprehensible to the average American. The "times" had to correct the wrong impression given by the innocent interview regarding the hailstorm which helped to add variety to the first non-stop flight of the Atlantic, and to express the hope that the next trip will not be marred by such unpleasantness.

### MEAT EXTORTION

The report made by the department of agriculture on the meat situation, corroborates the opinion already held by the general public as to the injustice of meat prices. It develops that there is no shortage of meat or meat animals in the United States. There are plenty of cattle and sheep. So far as production goes, beef and lamb meat almost be called a fair on the market. The packers evidently regard it so, for they have lowered the prices paid for livestock about 25 per cent since last March. This should result, of course, in a corresponding reduction to the consumer. There has been no such reduction. Retail prices do not seem to have been lowered anywhere more than 10 per cent. In most communities the prices are as high as ever, and in some cases they have actually risen. Wholesale prices have gone down, but retail prices remain at about the same high level. It is charged that the retailers are worst profiteers in this instance than the packers, their prices being in no sense justified by the wholesale quotations. "The packers and mill-men complain that the public is not eating enough meat, and have can the public consume meat as used at the rates it has to pay? There is no use urging increased consumption unless prices drop. Something must be done about the matter, for the benefited of the cattle industry no less than the welfare of consumers who need more meat than they feel able to afford. The department recommends government control of the meat industry, and the publication from day to day of lists of fair retail prices, so that consumers may know when they are being over-charged, and may help to regulate prices accordingly. If there is any difference of opinion as to the former suggestion, there can be little as to the value of the latter.

### BLIMP, BLAMP, BLUMP

The term "blimp," used for a dirigible balloon, may now be regarded as having won a fixed place in the language. The cruise of the R-34 across the Atlantic has settled the matter, as anyone may see or hear for himself from newspaper comment and current conversation. "Blimp" it is. It is not a pretty word. But the English language is notoriously tolerant of short and ugly words, and we may as well make the best of it. It develops, therefore, upon the slapping slappers, of the grammarians, or both together, if they can ever get together to fit the word into the language properly, with all the necessary accessories and variations. Thus from the noun "blimp," we should derive the verb, "to blimp." This, indeed, has already been done. Some inspired poet has written in the immortal line, "Blimping, blimping, over the bounding main." And some of the men who curse in these craft say they "blimp." It may seem a common thing to hear such remarks as, "I blimped from New York to Chicago the other day." Or perhaps the verb ought to be an intransitive one, with its principal parts "blimp, blamp, blump." And there might be an adjective, "blimpy," and a corresponding adverb, "blimpily." There are all sorts of possibilities in it.

### NEW ENGLAND'S "DECADENCE"

When any of the older sections of the United States is called "decadent," the accusation is usually taken by livid-headed people with a grain of salt. The "effete east," as it is often called, shows too many signs of vigor and progress to make any such blaudish charge sound convincing. But here is a criticism of New England by a Boston citizen which may be taken seriously, because it concerns the one thing on which that section has long prided itself—education. "A certain decay," says this critic, "is progressing in New England, of which no adequate explanation has yet been found. At one time the New England States led the country in education, but no longer do so. If one desires progressive education, colleges in other parts of the country must be sought. Harvard and Yale, for example, are living on their past, and both of them are now signally poor in faculty men with the modern spirit. "The public schools are also neglected, one-time education lovers preferring to spend their money on luxuries. Many teachers are, withdrawing from service because their communities rate them as less important than common laborers, and will not provide proper school buildings and teaching facilities. "Another sign of Massachusetts' decadence is the general attitude toward health. An important bill to promote the health and physical development of school children has just been killed by the Massachusetts senate. The defeat indicates the public's ability to ward health and toward children. "I offer an explanation of the decadence thus shown. The tendency is undoubtedly downward. "One wonders who eastern educators will say to this. It may be argued that no part of the country pays the attention it ought to pay and spends the money it ought to spend, on education. Still, there is noticeable a growing tendency on the part of the west and middle west to educate their own sons and daughters instead of sending them east to boarding schools or colleges, and many experts declare that instruction today is more liberal, modern and practical west of the Hudson river, and still more so west of the Alleghenies. "Does the course of education, like the course of empire, take its way westward? And are the young people of classic New England destined hereafter to go west to school?"

### NO-ACCIDENT WEEK

"No-accident week" has just been observed by certain railroads in California, under the direction of the safety officials of the roads. Bulletins were posted warning both the public and the employees of the roads could not fail to see them, while rallies, moving pictures, household exhibits, talks and other means of getting into close touch with the 205,000 employees to be reached in this campaign were used to arouse interest. During this week every employee was urged to take special pains not to be injured himself, nor to be the cause of injury to another. Early in the fall there is to be a great public movement of the same kind. But when time is taken to think it over, it seems a little foolish to postpone until fall anything so decidedly for the general good. If the movement could start with mother in the morning when she first lights the stove, and continue right on out into all the ramifications of business and domestic life, what suffering and death might be averted! Observance of "no-accident week" by a single group of railroads is a fine thing, and it will be interesting to know whether the result was 100 per cent successful, but if the movement could be made 100 per cent American, day in and day out, it would be better still.

### "HAIR CUT OR SHAVE?" "BOTH!"

Long and serious articles have been written and fine orations made on the benefits which humanity has derived from the war, and how the barber comes along with another one. "Tussock standards have been raised by the war," says he. "Tussock standards" has a mighty fine sound, but when he means is that all the long-haired or so young men who have been in training and service in the army should have habits of cleanliness and neatness which they refuse to give up as they return to civilian life. They cling to the clean shave and the neatly trimmed hair which are a part of every good soldier's make-up. More than this, it is not just the soldier but the boy who does extra-quick and frequent service from the barber; it is all the younger and older men as well who wish to look as soldiers do. So clean cheeks and well-clipped heads have become the rufing fashion, and of all the people who preach of the good war has brought, none has a finer text nor better examples to back it than the barber. Cleanliness of the body and cleanliness of the soul are mysteriously interdependent, and pride in personal appearance is the cornerstone of self-respect and success.

### THE EDITOR AS AN INTRODUCER

Green with envy, the editor of the newspaper that is gradually falling into his evil sleep accuses the editor of The Times of acting as introducer of a non-partisan speaker at the oratorical contest in the city park on the Fourth of July. Why so much prominence should be given to the introducer and the one speaker, to the entire neglect of the lawyer who made the principal address and to the speaker who followed the non-partisan speaker, can be explained on several hypotheses, but it is just likely that the accusing editor came out of his dock only long enough to find out that there was "something at the park" on the glorious Fourth, and didn't know anything about the fine addresses made by the others. Strange how accusations develop in the last bitter moments.

Von Bethmann-Hollweg, who is trying to protect his former Kaiser from punishment, is the man who, five years ago, explained that Germany had to "hack her way through" Belgium to get at France. Now his allies will back their way through German subterfuges to get at the Kaiser.

## MUST INCREASE GERMAN INCOME 900 PER CENT

### Finance Minister Begins With Proposal for Expropriation of Large Fortunes

WEIMAR, July 7, via Berlin, July 9.—The initial step toward raising the great war indemnity imposed on Germany by the allies has taken here this afternoon when Dr. Matthias Erzberger, vice-chancellor and finance minister, introduced a new financing bill, designed to increase the lump sum of the republic by 900 per cent. The bill provides for the government's financial program as announced by Dr. Erzberger was the first statement that "it is necessary for the republic to increase its assets by its superfluous riches." A bill for the expropriation of large fortunes by the government was designed to carry out this program. The measures provide for: Expropriation of large fortunes. Special taxation on all fortunes increased during the war. Taxation on the profits of real estate transactions. Taxation on amusements. Insurance taxes. A federal tax on the profits of German stores from the sale of land used for military purposes during the war. Additional taxes on sugar. Three bills for additional taxes on tobacco, matches and playing cards. The vice-chancellor introduced the bill for the expropriation of large fortunes which he outlined the program the new republic must adhere to if it hoped to fulfill its obligations and at the same time escape bankruptcy. Germany's first step toward rehabilitating the reputation of her credit throughout the republic; then she must turn first attention to the payment of war indemnities. The vice-chancellor urged all Germans to cease talking of revenge on Germany's enemies and to get to work. "The word of the German republic must be honorable," he said. "We must work, else there will be no food. We must not avenge for revenge, but seek to save the justice of our case. "I am firmly resolved to tread the path of honest economy, beginning the first of October there will be no more loans of expenditure without details. The war finance system will cease. There will be no more superfluous expenditures. It is necessary for the propertyed classes to surrender their superfluous riches. "The government does not intend to avail the war loans. We must finance the interest upon them. An obligation of the German republic will be the inaugural step. The republic's income must be increased 900 per cent and that of the states and provinces 100 per cent. Expropriation must not be so. The vice-chancellor was loudly applauded when he concluded.

### BOY LOST IN ILLINOIS WOODS

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 11.—Hoodhounds from the Rockford kennel were out on the trail today of Henry Sutter, a sixteen-year-old boy who has been lost since Sunday in the dense woods near Fox Lake. A searching party of 100 farmers, which has hunted for the boy for the past two days, has given up hopes of finding him alive. The boy disappeared when he went into the woods with other boys to pick berries.

### BOLSHEVIST START ADVANCE

LONDON, July 10.—A great battle is in progress in eastern Galicia between the Poles and Ukrainians, said a Central News dispatch from Vienna today, quoting an official statement put out by the Ukrainian war office at Kiev. The Poles have been driven from Brody, and Ternopol and Stanislav have been besieged.

### Polk May Succeed Lansing at Paris

WASHINGTON, July 11.—It is generally expected that under Secretary of State Frank L. Polk will replace Secretary Lansing as head of the peace commission in Paris. Mr. Polk, in other good health, but it is thought by the president that a change of scene would be of benefit. And in declining an overture to state that Mr. Polk's work in Washington while the president has been in Paris has been greatly appreciated by the chief executive. The return of Mr. Lansing is deemed necessary by the accumulation of many matters here which which he most familiar and the best medium to handle them.

### Ensign Upton, Hero, Returns on Transport

NEW YORK, July 11.—Wearing the ribbon of the congressional medal of honor, Ensign Frank Monroe Upton of Denver, landed in Hoboken today from the transport "Vagabond" which he distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism when the freighter "Florence" was loaded with dynamite and exploded. He landed with dynamite and TNT, and other explosives, blew up in "Quinn Bay, 100 miles south of Great Bear Bay, Alaska, on August 24, 1915. Ensign Upton was on the destroyer "Swagley." He stripped off most of his clothing, plunged into the wreckage and rescued a number of crew members of the "Florence" H. who had been blown aboard. Forty men were killed by the explosion.

### FRENCH PAPERS COMMENT ON CLAIMS AT TRIUMPH

PARIS, July 11.—The French press commented in an angry tone today over Italian reports of the clash between French and Italian troops in Plume. "The alliances are now at stake," wrote L'Express in the Echo de Paris. The Paris Journal declared that the Italian evidently wish to end the occupation of Plume by international troops by rendering the stay of all the French troops in the city impossible. Plume is the chief object of dispute between the Italians and the Jugoslav both sides claim the port.

### BENCH WARRANTS FOR BREWERS

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 11.—Warrants were issued by Judge W. H. S. Thomson of the federal court today for the arrest of eleven directors of the Pittsburgh Brewing company, who are charged with violation of the war-time prohibition law by selling beer to soldiers here. The beer, it is charged, by volume contained 245 per cent alcohol.

### KNOWN NOTWITH OF SECRETED JAPANESE-GERMAN TREATY

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The state department has no knowledge of any secret treaty entered into between the Germans and Japan. Officials of the department, while refusing to discuss formally Senator Lodge's resolution calling upon President Wilson to furnish the senate with a copy of the alleged pact, let it be known today that if one exists, it is unknown to the department.

### CHES L. W. BY MARRIAGE

WICHITA, Kan., July 11.—It is reported that a Kansas girl to discover how to cure an L. W. W. Joseph Grubbs, arrested here in connection with propaganda distribution, was held by the police. His sweetheart is thought to give up the work and finally agreed to marry him if he did so. The wife announced the marriage work after it occurred, and notwithstanding the agreement, Grubbs seems perfectly happy.
