### Good Highways Are A Sane Investment

Aids from their economic value—including lowering of food prices, enhancing property values, bringing the farmer closer to the city and to his neighbors, and stretching the business radius of towns and cities—the building and maintenance of good roads could be more than financed by the saving to the operators of automobiles and trucks, declares R. ### Ford Family Now Owns Ford Plant

DETROIT, July 11. It was officially announced today at the Ford Motor company office that Edward H. Ford has purchased from the majority stockholders of the Ford Motor company their holdings of stock at an estimated cost of \$25,000,000 or \$12 1/2 a share. James Ford said he did not sell the stock. The announcement said that the purpose in buying the minority holdings was with a view of concentrating the company and there would be no change in the personnel of the officers or department heads or in the policies of the company. The entire property valued at more than \$200,000,000 is now owned directly by the Ford family with the exception of 5 block of stock held by James Ford.

### SPARK PLUG TROUBLES

Two frequent causes of spark plug trouble are oil or particles of carbon collecting between the points and fouling of the porcelain. The first mentioned is remedied by carefully removing the oil or carbon and thus clearing the gap. If the carbon on the porcelain is hard, do not attempt to scrape it off. Soak the porcelain in kerosene or liquid carbon remover until the carbon is soft enough to wipe off cleanly with a cloth. Points out of adjustment or burned away will also cause misfiring. The points should be adjusted to a gap of from one-eighth to one-sixteenth of an inch, depending upon the ignition system, and turned adjustment and device of motor.

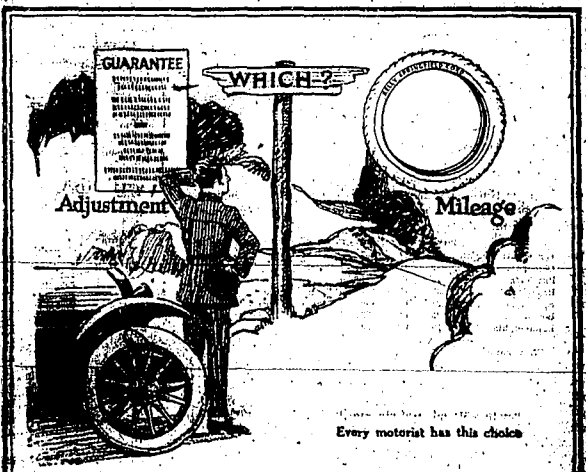

### WHY CITY MEN SHOULD CO-OPERATE WITH GOVERNMENT PLAN OF BETTER HIGHWAYS

This Country Has 97 Per Cent of All Times As Many Dirt Roads (Bottom Picture). (Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) If all the automobiles in this country stood evenly distributed over all the roads of this country there would be five motorcars to every two miles of road, and there are 2,575,334 miles of public road. If every automobile in the United States were loaded to its limit with people, half the population of the United States could be loaded at one load, and there are about 110,000,000 people in this country. Getting down to hard facts and bits, there is a total of 110,000,000 people of road and lanes—that's about 80 per cent of all the motor vehicles in the world are on the roads of the United States. By estimate, there were 7,000,000 automobiles in the world on January 1, 1929. By actual count, 6,147,000 of these were in the United States. These motor vehicles paid, in license and other fees, \$31,471,101, which was the amount of money for motor vehicles manufactured for the government. Each one of these six million one hundred and four thousand motorcars, when it runs on unimproved roads, pays about twice as much for tire and motor wear as it would on a road which is ribbon-smooth roads. And there are about eight times as many miles of unimproved roads in the United States. To be specific, the public roads in the United States total 2,575,334 miles, of which only 290,000 miles, or about 12 per cent, are surfaced. The rest are dirt roads.

Good Roads as Military Measure. From the standpoint of duty, the military element probably takes first place. When it became necessary two years ago to construct great numbers of miles in camouflage, it was found that the roadways comprising the country were not adequate for the most part new roads had to be constructed. The government agency charged with the administration of the federal aid road act. Practically all states are planning a concrete system of connecting highways throughout each state, and there is a more general disposition than was ever manifested in the past to improve the roads in neighboring states so that improved roads will not terminate at state boundaries. About \$100,000,000 more, made an extra appropriation of \$300,000,000 in the post-office appropriation bill to meet the federal part of the program. Citizens of the United States, United States department of agriculture, point out that this is the largest expenditure ever made by any government for a similar purpose, and that it will enable the federal and state governments to carry on a road-building program of a magnitude never approached in the history of the world. It will also create the largest opportunities for profitable employment for returned soldiers and sailors.

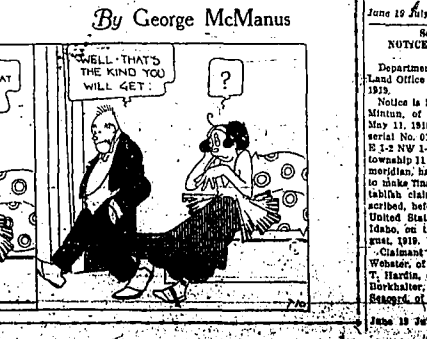
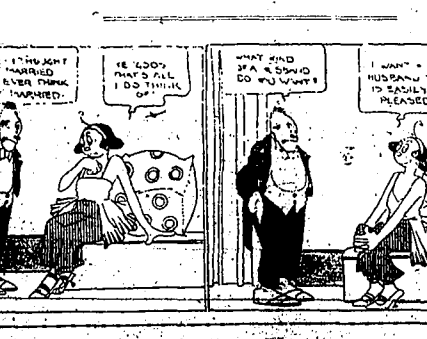
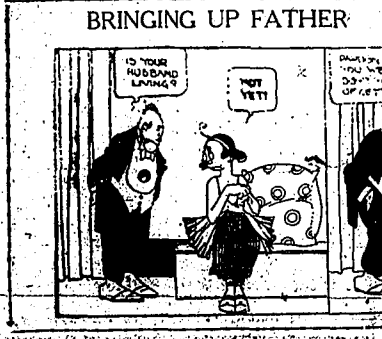
