BRAVE BELGIUM IS STRUGGLING TO RISE AGAIN

By Helen M. Ferguson, (Written for the United Press.) PARIS, (By Mail).—Ostend is open for business, and again ready to bid for her place as one of the most famous seaside resorts of Europe.

As Ostend has struggled to her feet after four years of German occupation, so in the rest of Belgium is the struggle to pick up the thread of national life. Factories stand stripped and idle. Only skeletons of industrial centers remain.

At Ostend, a pleasure ground, had no industry to replace for its principal industries. It is therefore one of the first cities to be ready for the tourists. It is ready now, its big hotels and vast sunny beach are waiting for the expected throngs.

Considering the apparent simplicity of re-opening a summer resort, appreciation of the enormity of the task ahead of Belgium is accentuated by the story of Ostend.

It required three months just to roll up the barbed wire that had been stretched by the beach by the Germans as a part of their defenses against an allied landing. This tangled wire of wire for miles along the beach. A year ago German guns were trained toward the sea behind this barbed wire. Today Belgian women and children and scattering American and British soldiers are to be found there.

Along the coast, the old houses drag curious little bathing wagons across the formerly barbed wire near to the water.

All hotels in Ostend had to be reconstructed and re-furnished throughout because of the condition in which they were left by the Germans. The famous and beautiful Hotel de la Ville was used by the Germans to stable their horses—now all traces of the enemy operations have been erased—and the concrete walkways from the operas, and afterward dancing take place each night.

Next door to Ostend is the resort of Blankenberghe, which will present a picture of gabled hotels. After the removal of most of the furnishings finishing touches were added in the way of hand grenades, so that the walls are badly damaged, as well as ceilings and floors. One hotel at Blankenberghe is in such a condition of ruin that destruction might not attempt it to be ready to reopen. It is to be torn down.

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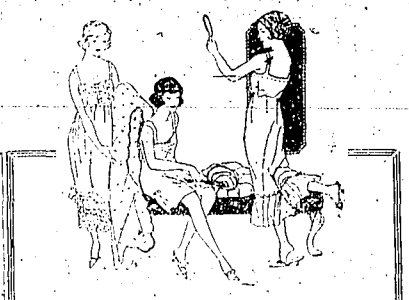

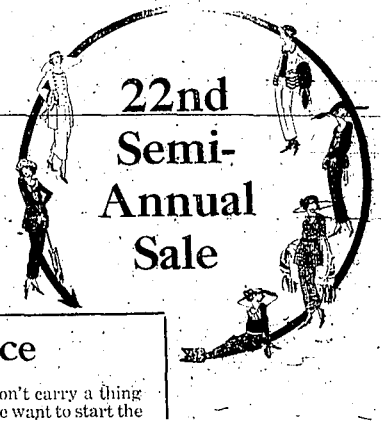
