## ONE BY ONE OLD ONES FADE AWAY

Terry Turner, Cleveland Veteran, Succumbs to Father Time

NEW YORK, July 14.—The ranks of the old-timers in the big show are thinning out.

Now and then a veteran, like Babe Adams, for instance, parts company with the bright lights of the big circuit, only to come back for more. But players like the babe get low and far between.

At the close of the time rolls around the veterans fade out one by one. Ben Wagner, Larry Lajoie, George Gibson, Sam Crawford, Matty, Frank Thomas, Chief Meyers and so on down the line. All these and some others, have passed on in the realm of retirement as active players within the last four years.

Now there is another veteran to add to the list. Terry Turner, who has been in the big show for the last fifteen years "Terrible Terry of the Hot Corner" has been handed a star. Terry recently was given the tenderly name of the Cleveland Indians. Terry who for all of the last five years and more has been listed with the retired list who have had the honor of being named among the most valuable players in the world of the league.

Turner, along with Cobb, Seaver, Collins and players of their caliber, have passed on in the realm of retirement. He has been a consistent performer in at least eleven out of his total of fifteen odd years in the big show, and has certainly had more credit for his low play of the last decade.

Turner has played continuously with the Cleveland club since coming up to the big show from Columbus, Ohio, in 1904, when he was traded for Forest 213, a speculation for player, George, Hines and a cash consideration.

During his long term with the Indians he has played every position on the field with the exception of first base, and played each one well. His position, third base, is one of the most vital positions in a ball club and he played third and second equally well.

Yankee critics of late have been full of pessimism, but now they are wondering if Miller Huggins' team is going to follow suit.

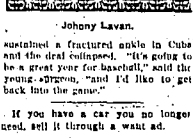
After setting the pace in the junior league almost continuously since the season opened, thanks to consistently good pitching and heavy and heavy hitting, the Yanks have suddenly let up.

### LOWERED STANDARD OF MORALS INHIBITED BY LONDON PRESS

LONDON, July 13.—Considerable space and comment is being taken in the London press regarding the "low" standard of morals caused by the war. Recently the Daily Mail printed a symposium of views on the matter.

Mr. Justice Darling said: "In nothing has the war done more harm than in lowering the standard of morals. This has been reached a point that can be seen in a walk along the street. Women differ by the width of heaven from what their mothers were."

Mr. Justice Darling's views were widely discussed yesterday. "We must never again expect to have Victorian respectability," said Dr. Mr. Schrieber. "The daughter here today is a very different woman from that in which her mother existed. She is surrounded by far more temptations. The telephone, the motor car, the general speeding up of life, all tend in the one direction."

"I do not see any immediate prospect of the present state of things passing off. Fundamentally it is the logical outcome of women becoming independent economically and, in a lesser degree, politically. A girl is meeting men more on an equality, and that is telling both ways. But I would not say that she compares favorably with her mother."

"It is no use over expecting a reversal of parental control among the masses. The girl will henceforth control herself. I would say further that Mr. Justice Darling has probably uttered his dictum as a result of a walk down the Strand. But let us cease to compare ourselves with the Victorians. We are worse—and better."

"Why," asked Mr. Mackenzie, "does Mr. Justice Darling confine his remarks to men? I am tired of men having down the law for women. The open, unrestricted pleasure quest of today is far less harmful morally than the hidden, secret quest of pretenses of the Victorian. You cannot judge life by what you see on the surface. In any case, I always

stands around the Place de L'Étoile under its storm of cheering. Representatives of nearly every civilized people cheered enthusiastically at the passing war heroes. A riot of overpowering emotion attended the scene, in which the emotion of France expressed was the predominant note.

But in the spontaneously great mass of people lining the route and seeing the marching soldiers and batteries there were many moving manifestations of the most bitter hatred. From these windows beamed spiteful and spiteful glances. It is thought that a knife-thrower would have unhindered their line to share in this unparalleled spectacle and not the thousands of children who sat in the chamber of deputies, there left them down in a whirl of glory on the fields of battle.

Some of the scenes were so dramatic as the most wonderful demonstration of refusing ever seen in the French capital. Today it is as though the models of the world are united in welcoming a sultanism. What, in fact, is happening in Paris today is that the greatest mass of people in the world is being united in a revolution of the present.

Before the receding lance today, France parades her heroes in a million and a half dead last year in the great historical ceremony in the history of the republic. A "death" took place beneath the Arc de Triomphe, but a raised platform was built on a raised platform sprinkled with the soil of many battlefields. WASHINGTON, July 12.—A party revolution which may cause President Wilson to seek another term will result from the president's peace message, according to former Senator Lewis, former Illinois minister and political tactician.

If the president does run again, Lewis said he will endeavor to be a third-term candidate, but as a first-term candidate on a new issue.

While Lewis would not say whether he would survive, he declared that "many Republicans would become converts and some Democrats become Republicans." With Wilson's foreign policy the dividing line in the message of President Wilson creates a new political coalition for the United States, Lewis said.

The issues of the last 20 years are now absorbed into one. The question is now shall the United States continue to be a Government apart from the world or a world government? Lewis then stated that these would be the subjects to see a program running for president with a Democrat Republican and a Republican opponent of the League with a Democrat opponent for second place.

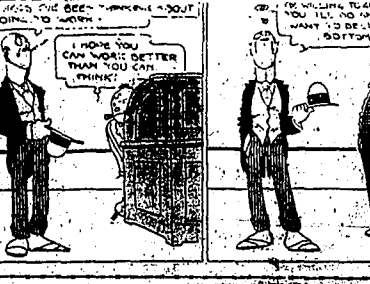

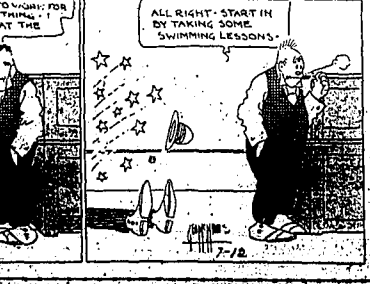
