

PRESIDENT WIVES OPPOSITORS TO EXPLAIN GREEN ANGES

BELIEVES DIFFERENCES CAN BE ACCOMMODATED

Republican and Democratic Leaders Asked to Confer at White House to See If There is Real Cause for Violent and Vituperative Outbreaks Against Peace Treaty and League of Nations.

WILL DISCUSS ALL PENDING MATTERS

WASHINGTON, July 16.—President Wilson today took steps to smooth away at least part of the friction existing between the legislative and executive branches of the government. He invited the Democratic and Republican leaders of both the senate and the house to visit him at his residence at the White House. The president urged that this invitation be generally accepted. It is the object, White House officials said, to have all senators and representatives get into touch with the president, explain their grievances, if they have any, and see whether personal contact with the president will remove any misunderstanding which actually have no apparent reason for existing.

CO-OPERATIVE BEET FACTORY INCORPORATED

Articles Filed Yesterday Show Filer Carriers Operates on Division Plan

One of the final steps in organizing the co-operative beet factory was taken yesterday, when articles of incorporation were filed by the company, styled as The Idaho Co-operative Sugar Company. The articles were filed by the president, Wilson A. Twiss, who has been active in promoting the enterprise, with Arthur E. Anderson and P. O. Wilson as incorporators of the company, which is capitalized at \$5,000,000 with 300,000 shares of \$5 per cent cumulative stock at par value of \$10 per share and 60,000 shares of common stock at par value of \$25 per share.

Factory employees as well as growers share in the profits of the company, according to the articles, which provide that after 8 per cent in dividends has been paid on the preferred stock, the remaining profit or surplus shall be divided as follows: 10 per cent to stockholders who furnish beet to the factory, 40 per cent to the factory employees, 20 per cent to common stock and 40 per cent to be used as the directors decide.

REDS BIDDING FOR PENNANT

Fat Moran Manager, Has Wrought Success Where Ten Previous Managers Failed

NEW YORK, July 16.—The "Miracle Man" of 1916 has come back. Fat Moran, the slacker manager, is making another strong bid for fame. Only a few short months ago Moran was out of a job. The Phillies released him unceremoniously because he had won a pennant and made two second place finishes for them. Today he is the most talked of manager in the major leagues.

Taking the reins at Cincinnati just before the training season opened, the man who has a reputation for making losing winning ball clubs out of inferior material has come into his own again. The Reds looked rather hopeless as pennant contenders when Moran took hold of them. Today they are furnishing the slip and ginger, and the element of opposition to the Giants that is making them the National League worth while.

Moran has done what ten former managers of the Reds failed to do—won Cincinnati. Under his leadership, Ed McHugh, Joe Kelley, Ned Hanlon, John Danzell, Clark Griffith, Hank O'Day, Joe Tinker, Buck Herzog and Charley Mathewson all tried it and failed.

How does Moran do it? In the words of the bard: "It's a gift. When Moran took charge of the Reds he needed a shortstop, a second baseman, an outfielder and some pitchers. He managed to swing Jack Daubert

from the Athletics, and he had to let Tommy Griffith go away to do it. He finally got Larry Kopf back into harness and then he picked up Mordecai Brown on the cast-off by the White Sox some seasons ago and got him in at second base—completing an infield that looked unafraid.

His outfield with Griffith one was a problem, but he has made an outfielder of Hector A. Miller, and is using him regularly. All this shows the pitching staff of the Reds also presented a problem, but Moran solved it. Heather Miller and Louie Combs comprised theoretical pitching foundation and he settled down to make winners however out of all of them. His success with Daubert is a real accomplishment and the averages show what the other two are doing. He picked up Slim Gale, who refused to come back to the Giants, and he grabbed the veteran Ray Fisher, former Yankee. With these five chuckers Moran is blanking a trail down the road to Pennsylvania. There is not a sign that the Reds will crack.

In Harbin, Wingo and Allen, Moran has a trio of dependable catchers. His infield is working as smoothly as a Swiss watch and his team as a whole is fielding and hitting brilliantly.

Edna Stueck is the only member of the Reds waiting better than 200, but they are getting men on the bases, running the bases well and summing up the runs home. They are playing bang-up ball in every department and playing together.

Here's the tip-off on Moran's success—he knows ball players and how to coach them. He knows how to get the most work out of a player in any position and about all he knows how to handle his men.

On July 21 Moran will lead his Redville regulars into St. Louis to take the Giants in a three-game series. The fat is sure to fly. The National League pennant may hinge on the outcome.

NORRIS MAKES BITTER ATTACK

Says Powers Plotted to Make China Fight for Them and Then to Divide Her Among Them.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Declaring the Shantung clause in the treaty of peace to be "so indefensible, an unjust and so violent that it would be sufficient alone to reject the treaty," Senator Norris of Nebraska, who has been a constant opponent of war in the senate, today announced in a speech on the floor of the senate that he would vote against the ratification of the peace treaty in its present form. "During all of my public life I have been a firm believer in some kind of an international agreement between the leading civilized nations of the world that would make war between civilized nations as nearly impossible as human ingenuity could devise," Senator Norris said.

"The league of nations is only a part of the treaty. It contains fifty many objectionable features but even if we were willing to accept it in its present form we could not do so without repudiating the entire treaty. "Standing out prominently among the things that have caused war in the past is the question of armament. There is no provision in the treaty which would make it impossible to disarm ourselves. "The compact for a league of nations should require that all business should be done in public. The compact for the league of nations should also contain a provision for the arbitration of the international disputes. The constitution for a league of nations

clearly did not include anything that is so absolutely necessary to carry out the object of the compact," Senator Norris declared, "and he could not sympathize with the treaty because the league of nations would weaken our sovereignty or would override the treaty which we have made. It is perhaps willing to accept the league with its faults as he found them, it is not willing to accept the league as it is now and as it would be after the treaty would be accepted of the Shantung clause. "Senator Norris charged that "it is clearly disclosed that while those leading governments of the world were inducing China to get into the war, in order that they might secure her as a belligerent, they were secretly plotting among themselves for her destruction after she had complied with their wishes and the war was over."

After the entente powers had gotten out of China all that was possible, it was agreed that England should attack Japan in her claim against China, and to compromise England, Japan agreed to assist England in getting all the German possessions south of the equator," Norris asserted.

"These agreements were made in secret, at a time when all the nations entered in them were proclaimed to the world that secret treaties and secret diplomacy must be forever abolished," he continued. "Four weeks China was not told by these great victors amongst themselves and robbers of the world that they were to give her over to the tender mercies of England. Senator Norris, Republican of Nebraska, charged in the senate this afternoon.

Norris read into the congressional record in support of his charge correspondence which he asserted had passed between the British and the Japanese and others of the entente powers before and after the United States went into the war.

"In all the annals of history, I do not believe there is recorded an instance of more complete and honorable agreement to carve up territory not of an enemy but of an ally," Norris said, "and he continued to attack the Shantung agreement, which the president's opponents in the senate have proposed to ratify their former course."

"On March 27, 1914, the Japanese minister of foreign affairs at Tokio approached the British ambassador there, the British ambassador, Sir Rich Channon, as a reward for Japan's throwing her lot in with the entente allies," Norris declared. "The British ambassador, Sir Rich Channon, and after receiving instructions from London, sent the Japanese government the committee report by Norris into the congressional record, in which it was stated that the British minister's government accede with pleasure to the request of Japanese government for an assurance that they will support Japan

in any claims it may have in the disposal of Germany's rights in Shantung." According to the same communication, Japan also receives assurances from the entente powers that Japanese claims to German rights of possession "in islands north of the equator" were to be backed by the British in return for which Japan was to support "Great Britain's claims" to the islands south of the equator. "The Japanese reply, according to the copy sent by Norris, was to the effect that the Japanese government was "deeply appreciative" of the friendly spirit" in which the British government "had given fresh proof of the close ties that unite the two allied powers," and that the Japanese were fully prepared to "support in the same spirit their claims for Great Britain," which they said they would regard to German possessions south of the equator."

SECRET PACT TO PLUNDER CHINA

Senator Norris Points Out Alleged Plans of Powers

WASHINGTON, July 15.—England, France, Italy and Russia, before the entry of the United States into war, entered into a secret pact with Japan that they should divide the spoils of victory amongst themselves and rob China of her inheritance by turning her over to the tender mercies of England, Senator Norris, Republican of Nebraska, charged in the senate this afternoon.

STREET RAILWAYS IN HARD TROUBLE

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Declaring that the electric railway industry "is in danger of complete collapse and dissolution," Guy R. Tripp, chairman of a committee of 100 appointed by the Interstate Commerce Commission to study the street railway's committee the present condition this afternoon that the industry is faced at this moment with three alternatives, "and the least will be complete liquidation. FORD INFORMED MORE ON MOTORS THAN HISTORY

Testifies He Never Heard of Major André, and Thought Benedict Arnold Was Writer

MOHNT CLEMENS, Mich., July 15.—The charges against Secretary of War Baker and the president are absurd.

This was Henry Ford's answer here today to the charges of Senator E. V. Rigney of Illinois, that Secretary Baker and the president violated the draft law in exempting Elmer Ford from military service.

"I was offered ten or a dozen different uniforms with emblems," Ford said. "This knowledge of the various war materials being made in his father's plant made him invaluable. The tank corps wanted to commission him a few weeks after we got into hostilities and the aircraft section followed shortly afterward."

"That Elmer did not want to strain his back in a uniform or sit in a service chair. He wanted to be a janitor. I have many ideals and wishes I want to be carried out and that, coupled with the fact that he was really doing a man's work that could not be duplicated, kept him out of the army definitely."

Ford's statement concerning his son's non-participation in military service was made just before he returned the stand today in the trial of his libel suit against the Chicago Tribune.

Ford's first statement from the stand today was an admission that he is an "ignorant idealist." The term was applied to Ford in the Tribune editorial on which the libel is based.

"You wanted me to say that, didn't you?" Ford asked after Attorney Stevenson had asked him concerning the "ignorant idealist" appellation.

"So I did," Attorney Stevenson replied. "You admit that as a fact don't you?"

Ford merely nodded his head. In answer to another question Ford referred to Benedict Arnold as a writer and said he had never heard of Major André or thought Benedict Arnold was the writer of "United States was born" Stevenson asked.

"I could find out in five minutes," was the reply. Stevenson said, "You appeared to history when you gave your accounts on preparedness. Now in answer to all this, aren't you willing to admit you are an ignorant idealist?"

"Since everybody seems to be annoyed by the liberty examination point as well," Ford answered. A heated discussion broke out today when in answer to a question, Ford said:

"I never wanted to go to the senate."

"And," said Stevenson, "the people didn't want you to go either."

Attorney Lansing, for Ford, broke in with the charge that Stevenson's remark was a "snare."

WISCONSIN MAY PROVE AN OASIS

Gov. Signs Bill Legalizing Two and a Half Per Cent Beer

MADISON, Wis., July 15.—Governor Phillips this morning signed the Malheur bill, legalizing 2 1/2 per cent beer in Wisconsin and providing a minimum and law for enforcement of national prohibition.

Unless a valid act of Congress be passed providing an effective definition of intoxicating liquors that is provided in the Malheur act, which is now a law, the use of light wines and beer will be permitted in this state after January 16, 1926, when the federal dry amendment goes into effect.

Neatness in Frocks for Children



The dresses brought out by manufacturers of children's clothes are a great help to mothers. Neatness is characteristic of the new designs and neatness is the first thing that mothers must teach their little ones. Little girls are good taste in dress unconsciously and the responsibility of outfitting the mother. She will be sure to select the clothes turned out by specialists in children's wear for her little ones—if she doubts her own gifts and intuitions in the selection of frocks.

A frock for the times when our little ones must "dress up" is shown at the left of the picture above. It is made of swish organdie, an crisp and fresh as snow. A wide hem and eight pin tucks make it speak for the attention given the skirt, while the bodice is joined in breeches of narrow excess on, broderie at each side and a "V" in the back. Frills with plain organdie with tiny pearl buttons at each side. The embroidery outlines the neck, and a little, prim bow of ribbon falls attention to it. This smart ribbon makes a pretty sash that will complete the happiness of the very young lady who is to wear it and help teach her to be careful of her frock.

At the right of the picture a new model for a very little girl shows a smart frock with lattice body and gingham skirt. There is not much to say of it, except that it is pretty and good looking, for the picture tells all its simple story. The square pockets are cut on the bias of the bodice and have a border of batiste, at the top.

Often plain cottonery is used instead of batiste, with plaid gingham and with striped cotton materials. One new touch in this little frock appears in the pointed front that laps over from left to right and is fastened under a small roll of neckwear by way of ornament. The sleeves are elbow length, with "thumb-knot" cuffs, and there is a small narrow collar. Further styling is more likely for finishing these little frocks than hem-stitching.

Dead Work.
All kinds of work was so much in vogue that amateurs will find with tonight my suggestions. To have good results proper tools must be used. Provide that straight or long-handled needles. Use the fine linen thread and wax it. Basin the spines to this grade, such as linen, on the wrong side of the design if it be a big of solid work, so it will not pucker. Spread brands out on a surf table, cloth for dark bodies and the light ones on a dark surface, thus work only in a good light, not facing it. Do not work quilt thread and restlessness. It will not pay.
