### FRIENDS OF PROHIBITION GIVE WARNING

#### Say Proposed Enforcement Measure, Because So Drastring, Can't Be Enforced.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The drastic prohibition enforcement measure suggested by the "dry" now seems certain to pass the house, probably without a change except possibly to make the provisions more stringent. Public enemies from several prohibitionist that the law will prove "oppressive, irrelative and incapable of enforcement. The radical drys have maintained supreme control, voluntarily going down by safe majorities all attempts to modify it.

The house has practically completed reading of the bill for amendments, and so far it stands practically the same as it came from the committee. A final vote is not expected until next week.

Representative Lee, Missouri "wet" has prepared a new enforcement bill in three sections, in the present sections of the Volstead act, and will submit it to the house just before the final vote is taken. It carries no definition of intoxicating liquors. Drys today refused to admit manufacture of light wines and other personal use and spent hours trying to find loopholes in the provision allowing doctors to prescribe liquor.

To prevent drug stores from becoming saloons, an amendment by Miller of Washington was adopted, providing that physicians may not give liquor prescriptions in drug stores, nor have their offices in the stores. Examinations of persons with the view to prescribing liquor is prohibited in drug stores, and the limit a sick man may obtain is one liquor prescription every ten days.

The section of the bill prohibiting the advertising of liquor was passed without an amendment. All electric signs and notices advertising liquor must be torn down as soon as the bill is approved. Papers can no longer print the "recipe" of a brewery, distillery, bottle, keg, barrel or box or other article representing an advertising liquor.

### HIBERNIANS MAY MEET IN IRELAND

#### Convention Closes Without Electing 1920 Meeting Place.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—The 1920 convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians was not expected today to do up any more than to hold it in Ireland. The executive committee will designate some American city next spring.

Daniel E. Heery, Indianapolis, was elected national president.

"The convention closed after an session devoted mainly to discussion of Irish freedom. The presence of Seamus de Valera, president of the "Irish republic," attracted wide attention to the sessions. Most of the delegates will attend exercises at Golden Gate park tomorrow afternoon when De Valera will unveil a statue of Robert Emmet. In the evening he will address a mass meeting in Oakland and will leave here Monday for New York.

### FLOODS IN TEXAS DO MUCH DAMAGE

DALLAS, July 19.—Flood warnings were sent to farms along the Trinity river bottoms north of Dallas today.

A flooded area of 35 feet here in the city flooded a floor. Property damage on the upper reaches of the Trinity today was reported at about a million dollars. Many lives were reported.

Reports from Gainesville said the river was racing after flooding the lower basin of the city. Ten inches of rain fell at Gainesville between three p. m. and noon, it was said, sending three small streams out of their banks.

Bonita Fe and Kelly passenger train stalled by the flood were reported tonight. Damage to railroad property would be considerable, it was said.

### Official Washington on Week-End and Holiday

WASHINGTON, July 19.—With the senate adjourned until Monday and the senate foreign relations committee not in session, the president is delegating in a day of quiet and rest at the White House, and many senators are leaving the capital for home and holidays, the peace treaty situation assumed today an auspicious turn in the domestic policy of "watchful waiting."

Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, with whom the president conferred, was the minority leader of the foreign relations committee, at the capital last yesterday, departed for his home in Omaha. He was accompanied on what had transpired between the president and himself.

The president's secretary-in-chief, Harlan Phillips, today reported that the situation were anticipated before Monday, when the president was expected to confer and make arrangements to start at the White House on the disputed provisions of the document.
