WASHINGTON, July 21—As the result of race feeling engendered here during the last two days by international and minor racial attacks against negroes and whites, several convalescent sailors and one naval aviator were fired upon today by four negroes speeding by the naval hospital in a seven passenger automobile. Four shots were fired at the convalescent and one at the group of sailors, who were in the yard. None took effect, however, and the negroes escaped.

In a letter to Representative Tinkham of Massachusetts, Miss Joseph H. Haver, legislative representative of the league, urged that the measure soon be acted on.

"This bill," Miss Haver's letter stated, "seems to us to strike at the root of the evil, namely the monopoly which is created by the few great packers, as a monopoly so far reaching that it threatens to extend to all lines of food products. Things have reached such a crisis that nothing short of the above program (the passage of the Kenyon bill) can meet the situation."

### RACE RIOT BREAKS OUT IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, July 20, Sunday. A spontaneous race riot in the negro quarter of the city had been dispersed. Two negroes were arrested and not forty leaders before being released by military and civilian police. Several shots were fired, but no reports of injuries reached the police. The mob, which formed at Liberty Y. M. C. A. but started out with the intention of heading the civil rights held for several days by the police as a suspect, but released yesterday. This was prevented by throwing a cordon of police around his home.

Several stones were thrown from a group of negroes, but no one was hurt. The negroes remained in their homes, nearly all of which were darkened. The crowd gathered in a negro quarter not far from the state capitol and near buildings, and the White House. Riot calls were sent out the soldiers stationed near Washington and police reserves. Ammunitions were loaded out and for a short time there was great excitement. Military and civil police reserves are now scattered throughout the quarter to prevent a recurrence of trouble. No arrests were made.

### WILL URGE FEDERAL CONTROL OF RANGES

Dean H. Thatcher, University of Minnesota, school of agriculture, declared many ranges of the northwest will be depleted of forage unless the government takes a hand. Cattle men fear that unless steps are taken the cattle ranges of the western states will be abandoned, resulting in higher meal prices and probably a serious food situation. Plans for shipment of stock to the Great Lakes basin and the upper Mississippi valleys will also be discussed at the three days' conference.

### GERMANS PROMISE RENAISSANCE

COBLENZ, July 19.—Germany's domestic policy will be outlined by Premier Bauer in a speech in the German national assembly at Weimar on Monday, according to advices from Berlin today. A sensation is looked for.

Dr. Matthias Erzberger, head of the German armistice committee, is to speak, and is expected to make revelations concerning the armistice as well as during the period of the war.

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
