### HEROIC WAR PIGEONS

#### Flock That Did Wonderful Deeds Returns Home.

#### "General Mail" Comes With Dzeast Shattered as Result of Many Exploits.

New York.—With breast shattered, but still alive, General Mail, one of the bravest war horses returned recently. As the stricken pigeon from New York harbor, General Mail set out on the deck wrapped in a blanket that bore several wound and service stripes. There was no perceptible sign that he realized where he was. He made no comment.

Reporters tried in vain to interview him. Sergt. Fred J. Herman, his commander, did all the talking. You see—General Mail is a carrier pigeon. He was one of the seven birds of the intelligence service of the A. I. E. that the transport brought home.

General Mail's exploits are many. On one occasion, having been assigned to deliver a message of great importance to a post 18 miles away, he flew through air and gas, and just a squadron of Germans that had been sent out to intercept carrier pigeons and delivered the message in just 35 minutes.

With his breast torn open, with his wings singed by fire, and eyes blinded with blood, he kept on till he had reached his objective.

King Cole, another pigeon, is the nearest rival of General Mail for fame. He was a messenger in the last Argonne drive and flying through

a cloud of gas fell into an abandoned trench. There he lay in the mud for two days, and gathering strength, arose, and came home with the unscathed.

GERMANY WILL NOT TRY KAISER

Minister of Justice Says Nation Will Not Try to Force Extradition From Holland

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—Dr. Müller, minister of justice, today declared that Germany does not intend to demand the extradition of the ex-king from Holland.

Asked for an opinion upon the proposal before the national assembly to create a state court for the trial of war offenders, Dr. Müller said:

"As framed by the government the bill provides for the establishment of the tribunal with functions similar to those exercised by an American jury. They will be empowered only to hand down a verdict relative to the guilt of the van and responsibility for continuation of the conflict. No German law exists under which a defendant could be punished for such offenses even if found guilty. The possibility remains, however, that the national assembly may enact special legislation for this purpose. The tribunal will likely be a court, as that is what the supreme court is."

Dr. Müller said that, in his opinion, Germany is hoping that the content will abandon the clause of the peace treaty providing for the extradition of the ex-king. The special provision in the peace pact that the persons to be extradited must be delivered to Germany within a month after the ratification of the treaty is criticized by the Germans as impossible of fulfillment, according to the cabinet. There would be no real difficulty, he said, in the case of Germany who refused to surrender voluntarily.

SECOND DIVISION HEROES ARE HOME

Advance Guard Arrives Sunday. Remainder Due Today

TWIN FALLS, Aug. 4.—Five transports, with 1500 men, of the second division of the American army, are scheduled to dock at 11 o'clock today.

Most of the returning men have seen active service dating back to the early hours of the great allied counter-offensive that halted the Germans in their second dash toward Paris. Many of these troops figured in the famous action at Château Thierry and most of them are decorated for service.

CONTROL 16,000 MILES OF PHONES

United States Army Perfects Fine Telephone System in Occupied Territory

HANDLE 15,000 CALLS DAILY

Enables Commanding General to Keep Hand on Pulse of Army—Operators Speak English, French and German.

At the time the Americans began withdrawing from Germany the United States army had perfected one of the finest telephone systems in Europe. From the headquarters of the third army in Cologne it is possible for the commanding general to get in his office and talk with American officers in London, Berlin, Vienna, Rotterdam, Brussels, Antwerp, Paris and various other European points.

A system of occupation has a telephone system closely resembling the commercial system in the United States. On the top floor of the hotel where the building in Cologne is situated, a switchboard was installed when the Americans reached the city.

16,000 Miles of Wire. Within the German occupied area there has been established by the signal corps under the direction of Colonel F. H. Chief signal officer, a network of wires connecting the various units of the third army. Direct lines connect with all the corps and divisions, approximately 16,000 miles of wire being in service.

This system of phones has not, however, been built by the third army, but consists almost altogether of the German lines taken over by the signal corps and so arranged as to meet the needs of the army. Sufficient clerks were left, however, for the civilian population to carry on their business. More than 1000 calls are registered daily on the Cologne switchboard. With the establishment of an exchange in Cologne it was necessary to employ operators who could speak English, French and German. The first operators on duty in Cologne were all members of the women's telephone corps and have been in the service more than a year. The chief operator, Miss Cook, was a former employee of the American Telephone and Telegraph company of New York.

"Doodahdy" Code Name. The word "doodahdy" was the code name of the third army switchboard in Cologne, the corps and divisions all retaining the code name that was assigned them during the war. On the part of a twenty-nine telephone directory issued by the third army the entire contents of "doodahdy" had been reproduced in the shape of a tag made up of a combination of letters, signs and a numeral.

All the operators, including switchboard, telephone instrument, and in fact, everything excepting the wires, are of American origin and are to be taken out when the Americans in force say goodbye to the Rhine and for France and home.

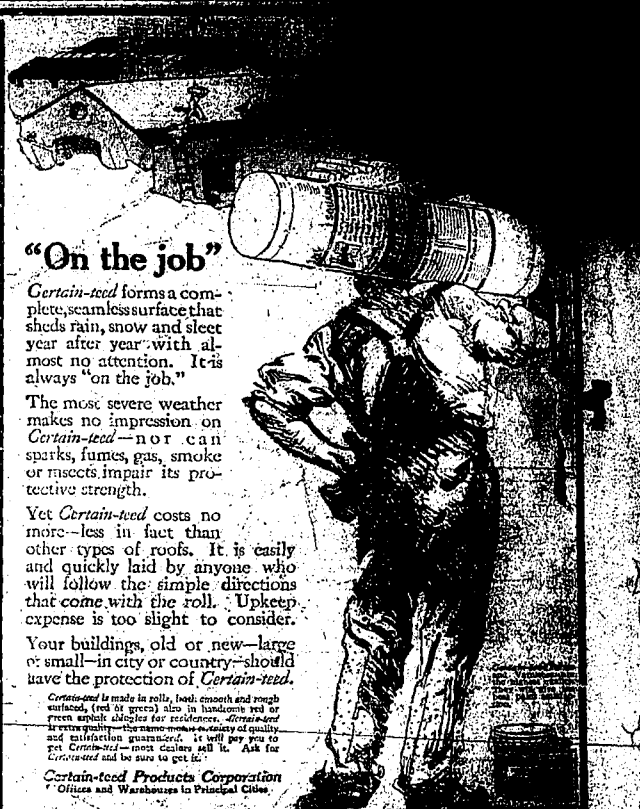
TO MAKE JOBS FOR GRIPPLES

Australian Government Buys American Invention to Provide Employment for Returned Soldiers.

Melbourne, Aug. 4.—An organized man operating the newly invented Lloyd loom so impressed G. G. H. McClellan, member of the Australian legislature, during a trip through the Lloyd Manufacturing company's plant here that arrangements were completed by which the Australian government pays \$250,000 for rights to use the machine as well as Lloyd's new method of production. They will only be used in giving employment to returned and crippled soldiers and sailors.

From the very earliest times when Moses was weaving in the huts, the loom has been a hand-made red-headed—these articles have been woven by hand.
