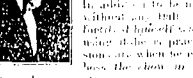

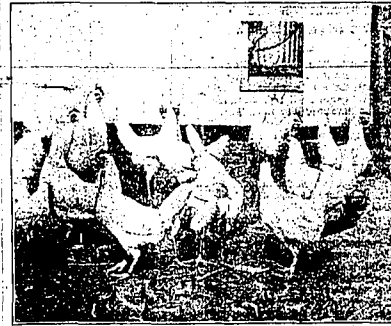
SALZBURG

Salzburg lies on both sides of the Salween river, bounded on one either side by precipitous mountains. A large fortress overlooks it on the south, from the summit of a perpendicular rock, against which the houses in that part of the city are built.

The streets are narrow and crooked, but the more part contains many open squares interspersed with handsome buildings. The variety of costume among the people is very interesting. The inhabitants of the salt district have a peculiar dress, the women wear round fur caps, with little wings of goose at the side. I saw other women with headpieces of gold or silver filigree, something in shape like a Roman helmet, with a projection at the back of the head, a foot long.

Half-way measures are futile in fighting tuberculosis, as there is no treatment of any avail against the disease in poultry. The one practical course is to kill off the whole flock with maximum expediting and immediately thereafter to disinfect thoroughly all the houses and runs.

Tuberculosis of fowls is a chronic contagious disease, characterized by the development of nodules called tubercles in various organs of the body, but most frequently in the liver, spleen and intestines. T. B. of fowls is readily communicated to most species of birds and to several species of mammals, but it is almost impossible to communicate the tuberculosis of man and cattle to fowls. Pigeons and the smaller caged birds are very susceptible to human tuberculosis, however, and are often affected by it.

T. B. Introduced by Purchase.

Tuberculosis is generally introduced into the poultry yard by fowls purchased from infected flocks or by eggs of diseased birds that are destined for hatching. If the disease exists in neighboring flocks the contagion may be carried by small birds or animals passing from one yard to another. A peculiarity of tuberculosis of birds is that the liver and intestines are usually always very severely affected, and that as a consequence the bacilli are very numerous in the intestinal contents and are scattered with the droppings everywhere that the fowl go. The introduction of a single diseased

bird, therefore, may cause the infection of the greater part of the flock in a few weeks. In the same way when wild birds contract the disease the bacilli are carried and deposited in all the birds which they visit.

The eggs of diseased birds frequently contain the bacilli, as has been proved by the inoculation of experimental fowls with such eggs into susceptible experimental animals. The young chicks hatched from such infected eggs are diseased when they have left the shell, and of course soon infect the poultry with which they run. Moreover, since the infective incubated eggs are often fed to chickens, it is evident that even the eggs which do not hatch may introduce the contagion unless they are cooked to fatal results. Eggs, rats, mice and other animals are generally liable to be infected with fowl tuberculosis from eating the excreta of birds which have died, but the extent that these animals transmit the contagion to other fowls, even geese and other domestic fowls, is not definitely known. It is something to be feared, however, that even the eggs which do not hatch may introduce the contagion unless they are cooked to fatal results. No Early External Evidence.

For the most part there are no external symptoms of T. B. in the fowl until the disease has reached an advanced stage of development. Then the birds begin to show a general loss of weight, loss of appetite, loss of the comb, and toward the end dullness and sleepiness. Very often there is a swelling of the joints and of the sheaths of tendons, which is revealed by lameness, swellings of the joints and hunching of the neck. The formation of hard external tumors of considerable size, occasionally the ribs over the so-called "ribber's," the interior of the joint is ulcerated, and a small quantity of pus containing large numbers of tubercle bacilli is discharged. Swellings of the joints are also very common, and the tubercle bacilli are invariably numerous and their nature should always be ascertained by cutting the joint and examining the liver, spleen and intestines to determine whether there are on their surfaces any whitish or yellow spots, which when cut into prove to be tuberculous masses.

As was previously mentioned prevention by the rapid extermination of the diseased flock is the only effective method when T. B. goes in a rampage among the fowls. If any birds infected of any age retained the chances are they will be subsequent carriers and disseminators of the disease. Hence it is not advisable to keep any fowls that have been exposed to the contagion, no matter how valuable they may be. The birds that have died or are killed, as well as all the accumulated manure, sweepings and scrapings of the poultry houses, should be completely destroyed by fire.

So far as known there is no danger of communicating the disease to man by eating the cooked flesh of tuberculous fowls. In any case, however, the diseased birds are so emaciated and their general health so affected that their flesh is not fit for human consumption. It is better, in all cases, to burn the carcasses of the birds in which tuberculous nodules are found, and free avoid all danger of the disease being communicated to either man or animal.

PREVENT SPREAD OF VIRULENT DISEASES

Dead Animals Should Be Buried Deep or Burned.

Left on Surface of Ground Tired-Odor Soon Invites Scavengers to Congregate and to Bring Infectious Material.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The carcasses of animals which have succumbed to infectious diseases, like anthrax, hog cholera, blackleg, tuberculosis, etc., are a danger to the public health, and as long as they remain where scavengers can reach them and portions of them can be carried away promiscuously, they are a dangerous menace over a large territory to all animals which are liable to be attacked by disease germs. Even carcasses of animals which have died from other causes than infectious diseases, unless they are disposed of in a proper way, are a source of danger. Left on the surface of the ground, their odor soon invites scavengers to congregated and to bring with them the infectious material with which they may have become contaminated by eating carrion elsewhere. Burial animals on the farm should be buried deep enough to prevent them

TO IMPROVE SEED POTATOES

Extensive Experiments Being Made in Various States by Government Officials.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
To select strains of potatoes which are best adapted for commercial production, the United States department of agriculture and cooperating state agencies are conducting extensive experiments in seed improvement. Trials are being made in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and also in Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. Several strains of the leading commercial varieties now grown in the North are being carefully under actual growing and harvest conditions in the field, and to select the best strain of seed of each commercial variety. The following year each strain will be grown on a large scale. As the supply of seed stock perishes, the seed is to be distributed among growers and seedsmen, and in this way is to be gradually repopulated and disseminated. This investigation will be of country-wide significance in improving the future stocks of seed potatoes.

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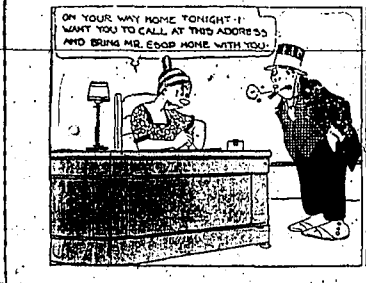
