## SEIZED FOODSTUFFS VALUED AT MILLIONS OF DOLLARS WILL BE THROWN ON MARKETS THIS WEEK

### Federal Officers Are Continuing Work of Collecting Evidence Against Hoarders in Many Cities—Estimated 500 Arrests Will Be Made This Week Through Efforts of Officials

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Food worth millions will be dumped into wholesale markets to force down prices in every section of the country, beginning Tuesday or Wednesday next week, under plans being made by clerical officers and officials of the department of justice.

Two million dollars worth of butter, eggs, sugar, lard, etc., were seized yesterday in St. Louis, Chicago, Toledo, Canton, and Detroit, will be sold first. Food worth millions will be thrown on the market this week, according to Boston, Bismarck, and other cities.

Hearing will begin next week on ten libel suits filed against 500-800 eggs stored at various points.

## HISTORY OF TWIN FALLS COUNTY IN WAR

The work of compiling the names of the boys who answered their country's call to arms is a big task, but the men who have undertaken it will make a contribution to the history of Twin Falls county that will fill a valuable place in the years to come. What few co-operative citizens of the county give them will help to make the history accurate. And accuracy in history is a much to be commended attribute.

It took half a century for historians to understand and do justice to the French revolution. It took longer that to have the name of Thomas Paine written into the history of the American revolution, and it is not there very securely yet, despite his great work for the cause of the revolutionists.

There will be many histories of the world war, but none of these will carry the same heart interest as the simple story of the boys from our own home county who went away to battle for freedom.

And, speaking of histories, look agents already are battering front doors or working their way into offices to display to the amazement of the unsophisticated the only "authentic" history of the war, with introduction by some notable to give it greater weight than the work deserves.

No doubt there are some among all the multitude of publications which have merit. They may be moderately accurate or comparatively or interesting. But to pretend that in so short a time after the great conflict there can be any true history of it would be absurd.

It will take time, the advantage of further perspective, much gathering and comparing of data, to put upon the market anything which even faintly approaches a finished history.

Not until many a long year has passed will all the evidence be in. There were countless happenings, reasons for movements, political intrigues, which are only now beginning to see the light of day. Current histories of this war may be useful—but only as temporary makeshifts.

## HOW THEY SAVE THE COUNTRY IN WASHINGTON

The heroic efforts of the members of the national house of representatives to save the country are made clear once in a while by the Washington correspondents of the press associations. The other day Representative Blanton of Texas, using a style of oratory that made the late Theodore Roosevelt fidgets, and an echo of which was recently heard when Theodore, Jr., made his maiden political speech, declared his Texas colleague, Representative Hardy, was a "public stamp for approval of all acts of the administration officials."

"That is unbecomingly hardy."  
"I want no altercation with my colleague, who is old and gray haired," retorted Blanton.

The other gentleman from Texas shouted "I am not so old" (and then said something else) and started after his colleague. Members crowded between the pair, and Speaker Gillett, with proper parliamentary authority, ruled each out order.  
So the great problem confronting the congress are handled in truly masterful style. No wonder the representatives are dignified by the title of "honorable," and no wonder the anti-thinking speak of them as "Solons."

## THE CITY OF ORPHANS

"The true horror of the famine in Syria," says a man returned after six years of relief work, "has been the moral breakdown. The horror of having thousands of neglected children growing up without homes or education, the victims of a demoralized environment, is awful to contemplate. In the small area of Syria for which I compiled statistics, there are 319 villages, with 4361 orphans and 2618 children with only one parent."

A group of Americans in charge of local relief under the Red Cross and the Near East committee have worked out a plan for resuming these children. It is not a matter of getting them food alone, although that is the first great need. They must also be trained and educated, prepared to assume the responsibilities which will be theirs in a few years. They are the nucleus of the new nation growing up through the ruins of the old. They will be the farmers, mechanics, artisans, laborers, teachers, etc., of the future.

In order to do this tremendous work of training a city of orphans is being founded. The committee plans to bring these children together in several big groups to facilitate instruction. They will be divided into small families, housed in good buildings erected for the purpose. As far as possible they will be trained as Syrians. The American influence is to be used only to develop efficiency and high ideals, not to breed dissatisfaction with their own country or lack of true patriotism.

Dedicated to the building up and renewal of courage, health, self-respect and ability for self-government, the City of Orphans has before it a future of hope and opportunity.

## Surprises That Lurk in Hat Shops

## 40 Per Cent Profitier On Extended Vacation

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—John F. Campbell, president and treasurer of the John F. Campbell company, sugar dealers, and John E. Dunker, vice-president and manager of the firm, were named in warrants obtained today by United States District Attorney Clyde, the first to be taken out in the light being waged in Chicago against the high cost of living. Campbell and Dunker are charged with violations of the food control act in taking unreasonable profits. According to Clyde, the Campbell company bought sugar from Arbuckle Brothers of New York for \$3.82 net per hundred pounds. Freight costs to Chicago brought the price of the sugar to \$2.25. The government alleges this sugar was sold to wholesale dealers for as high as \$13 per hundred, a profit of about 40 per cent, whereas the food administration has declared that five per cent is a reasonable profit for sugar jobbers. At the office of the company it was said Mr. Campbell is in Canada on an "extended vacation."

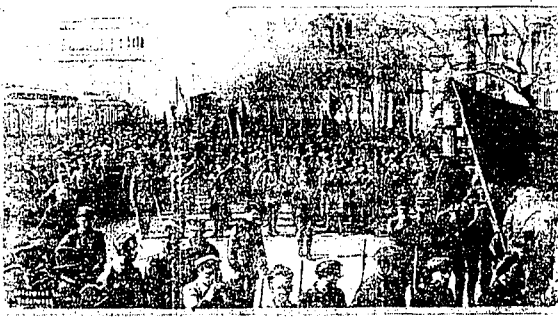

**FINANCIAL**

When the highway bond was sold arrangements were made for the purchase of a 100,000 dollar bond and delivery and payment for bond as follows:

April 10th	20,000

The agreement with the purchaser provided also, that they could take any amount in excess of the amount stated above at any time prior to maturity by paying a sufficient bonus to partly take care of the difference between the amount of interest that would accrue on the bonds from the time they took them up to the specified future periods, and the interest we could get on the money paid.

The bonds were taken up long before the date provided in the agreement and the funds paid.

We received more money than we thought the banks could handle profitably and pay in the rate of interest we thought we should receive, and in an accommodation to the banks invested \$200,000 in the district funds in 4 1/2 per cent government indubitable certificates securing the district against possible loss by repaying the bonds, and subject to the joint order of the district and themselves.

To make what we considered a fair distribution of the funds, a deposit with the various banks in the district we apportioned them on a basis of the assessed valuation of property returning to each town in which banks are located, according to the following statement, excepting where banks did not care to take their entire amount, 15 per cent of the amount, however, invested in light of certificates as stated above.

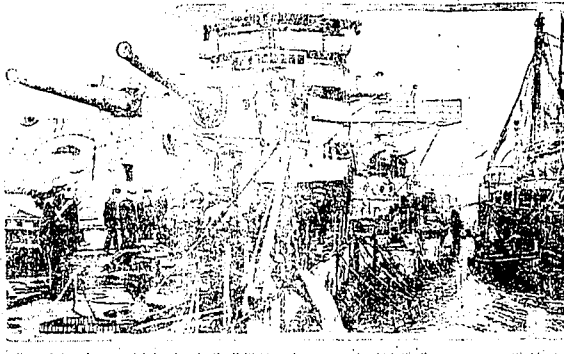
