MAIHA, Tex., Aug. 9.—A small detachment of troops of the 8th Cavalry, United States army, are pursuing the bandits who kidnaped the aviators, Petersen and Davis. Their correspondence is with this expedition. A dispatch is expected to be received in a few days in confirmation of capturing the Mexicans responsible for the outrage against our aviators.

MAIHA, Tex., Aug. 9.—Lieutenant H. G. Petersen and Paul H. Davis, American aviators captured by a band of Mexican bandits and held for \$15,000 ransom, are today safe in the United States. One of the bandits can be seen—Lieutenant Petersen's freedom bought for \$7500—Lieutenant Davis rescued by Captain Matlack of the 8th Cavalry, who, unaccompanied, went to the bandit rendezvous and brought about the release of both aviators.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—European's three plagues spots—Hungary, Turkey and Russia—now beyond the control of the allied diplomats, and looking to America as the only nation capable of helping them out of their desperate turmoil. 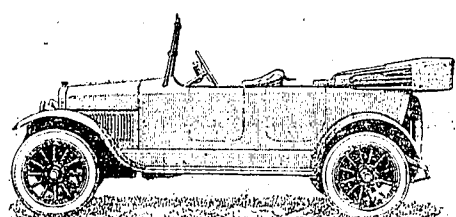

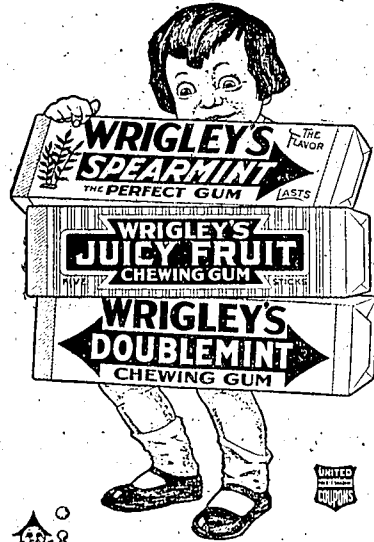

(Continued from Page 1) Borah and the president had an extended representative discussion regarding Article X. Senator Borah told the president frankly that in his opinion the obligation under it was in every way legal and that if this obligation were met it would be met in that way.

"That is not my opinion," said the president. "I would not so forget the wording of that article. Under this provision our attitude is entirely one of comradship and protection. It is in among all of the members of the league." Senator Borah considered that should such an invasion result against any member of the league the obligation of all of the members of the league would be to accept their legal obligations and hurry to the assistance of the threatened member, and that were the wording of the article in the United States it would benefit it. The president did not agree with this interpretation, however. Strikers are prohibited to help an entirely moral and could only be carried out through the regular procedure and by action by congress.
