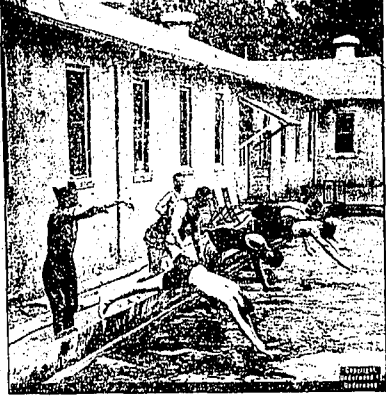
'For Championship of the World' Is Label Plastered on Capital City Bout

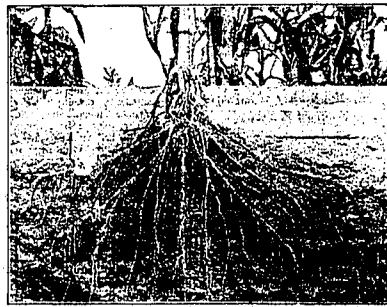

USE CARE AFTER DEHORNING. Pain Should Be Taken That No Foreign Substances Get Into Openings After Operation.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) It is not unusual to apply any preparation after the operation of dehorning to prevent bleeding, as the loss of blood is not sufficient, as a rule, to be of consequence. Care should be taken, however, to prevent substances from getting into the openings left after the horns are removed. The horns are elongations of the frontal bones of the skull, and are hollow. They communicate with the frontal sinuses, or air sinuses of the head; therefore foreign substances or fragments of horn which act as an irritant in these cavities are apt to set up an inflammation, resulting in the formation of pus or abscess, which may prove quite serious. This trouble is of infrequent occurrence, but would appear more liable to happen when the dehorning instruments are used, an account of their tendency to crush, especially in the case of old animals which have the saw cuts clean. If proper care is taken, however, such an occurrence following dehorning may in almost every instance be avoided. If the animals are dehorned in warm weather, it is well to apply some antiseptic with a view to keeping flies from the wounds. Some operators do this in nearly all cases, thinking that it facilitates healing. The dehorning operation should always, when possible, be performed in cool weather, and upon animals which have at least attained the age of two years.

LABOR SITUATION IS HELPED BY SOLDIERS

Men Returning From Overseas Are Going Back to Farms.

Department of Agriculture Makes Careful Survey in Army Camps—Shows That Majority of Farmers Will Resume Work. (Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The majority of soldiers who entered the army from the farms are returning to them immediately after receiving their discharge from military duty. This furnishes the brightest spot in a situation that is not yet entirely satisfactory, but that promises-entirely improvement, although there is still no indication of a decided movement back to the farm by the great number of men from food-production work by high wages in industrial pursuits. Careful surveys made in army camps by the department's farm specialists of the department of agriculture furnish ample proof to support statements that have appeared in the press that from 75 per cent to 90 per cent of the men who were called by the army from the farms are not returning to them. In a Virginia camp the specialists found that during the first three weeks in April 1912 per cent of such men discharged actually returned to the farms. During the week ending April 5 the specialists interviewed 2,021 men at this camp. It was found that 85 per cent were from farms and all but 35 of that number intended to return. During the following week 2,108 men were interviewed. It was found that 91 per cent were from farms and all but 13 intended to return. The next week 2,108 men were interviewed. Of this number 201 had formerly been employed on farms, and all but 5 intended to return. These figures are the actual results of personal interviews with each man. It was found also that a number of the men who had previously engaged in other occupations expressed a desire to take up farming. During the three weeks mentioned 2 per cent of the men discharged and who were not returning to them, had observed that the 18 per cent of the soldiers who had been on farms previous to entering the army, and who did not intend to return, the reason given by 1 per cent was that the men were thought and therefore unable to do heavy farm work. At least half of this number are taking up vocational courses in agriculture which will fit them for a class of farm work which does not require hard physical effort. Practically the entire remaining eight-tenths per cent had been farming with their fathers or were tenants and considered it too late to farm this year, as other help had been secured.

GENERAL FARM NOTES

Melons spray while the sun shines. A small garden well cared for is far better than a large garden neglected. Manure should if possible be spread early, but when crops are to be planted late it may be advisable to apply manure. Tomatoes trained to stakes do not show the effects of early blight, but the fruit is better colored and larger. All cereals should be kept in dry, well-ventilated storerooms. Dump, dirt-cultures should never be used for storing food. Bird Horses. The manner in which blind horses get about without coming to more harm than they do, is remarkable. They may, if ever, hit a stump against a fence or stone wall, and will sheer off when they come near one. It appears from careful observation that it is neither shade nor shelter which warns them of the danger. On an absolutely sunny and windless day their behavior is the same. Their olfactory nerves doubtless become very sensitive, for they will be warned of their heads downed in search of water yards before they come to a stream crossing the roadway. It cannot be an abnormally developed sense of hearing which leads them to do this, for they will cut alike through the water by a straight path. Men who have been blind for any great length of time develop somewhat similar instincts to blind horses. 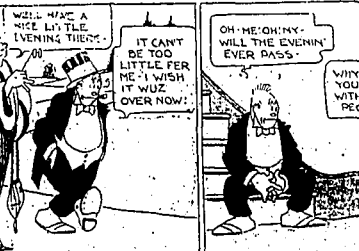
