LOOKS LIKE REDS AND WHITE SOX

Only Lot of Herb Tuck Can Prevent Chicago and Cincinnati Meeting in World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—(AP) The Sox's present hunting White Sox started their final road trip of the season today at Washington.

Before they return to their home town to wind up the season against the St. Louis Browns and Detroit Tigers, they will make a complete tour of the western half of the circuit.

The Sox have seventeen more ball games to play to complete their 146 season schedule. They are holding a lead of seven and one-half games over the second place Indians today, and it is possible for them to settle the issue in the minimum time during the present week if they keep up their winning streak.

Cleveland and Detroit in a week and seek race for second place, will have a slim chance to meet the Sox, but they must win practically all their games while the White Sox would have to suffer a severe reversal of form and a hard losing streak to topple out of the lead.

The Sox are as good as "in" with the American league hunting, and the hard hitting "burned" Reds are to enjoy the advantage of playing on their home grounds for the next three days, meeting the eastern division, that have lost to them consistently all season, the business of clinching the National league pennant to but a matter of days for the Moran team.

Thinking that the Sox and Reds will maintain the fast pace they have been showing since early in the summer, the pennant races should be over by a week from today at the outside.

hipples from the "rowdiness" references made in these columns just preceding the last league game between Rupert and Hulke are still making me suspicious of the Press Box writer in receipt of a personally directed copy of a Rupert newspaper which attests to our case very properly.

We are informed editorially that one innocent party related to the Rupert folks received not only "an sincerity," but a shocking lack of "horse sense." While our critic may have overlooked such trifling things as coherence and logic in applying chastisement at least credit him with good intentions. Hurley, Paul, Bill and Twin Falls will all be represented. This looks as though the other teams were laboring under an impression rather similar to our own.

INSURGENTS IN BALL MEETING HERE TONIGHT

The meeting tonight will be held at the Regent Hotel. Managers Ashdown of Hurley, Larsen of Paul, Moran of Hart and Twin Falls will be represented.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—The new record of twenty-six home runs held today by Babe Ruth, was made at the expense of twenty-two American league pitchers.

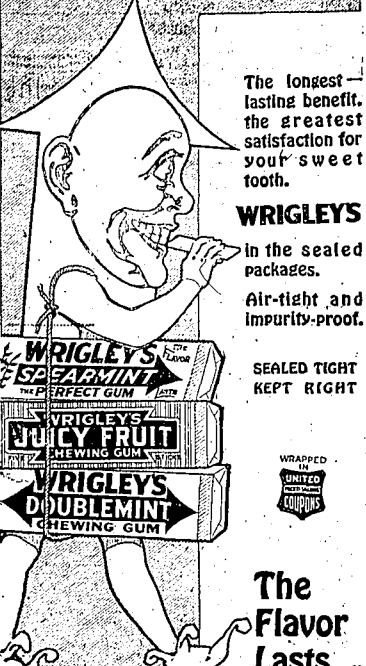

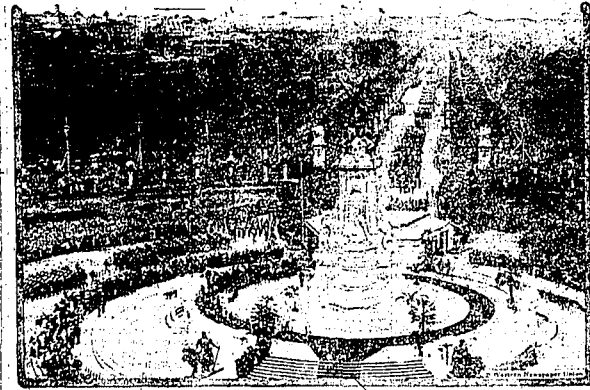

Profits are Small Says Combine

When confronted with criticism for "boosting" price they rush into print with a nice little alibi. This clipping is from a recent issue of the Twin Falls News:

"If we were actually making such large profits in our business as some people seem to think we are, what they think about us and our business might not concern us so much," said a local coal dealer today, dismissing popular charges of the announcement of a raise of 50 cents a ton in the price of coal the first of this month with the prospect for further increases in the cost of the commodity.

"As a matter of fact," he continued, "I will venture the assertion that there is an commodity sold in Twin Falls today on a smaller margin of profit than coal."

Food Is High

The quoted figure showing that the cost of coal to the dealer here five years ago was \$60 a ton. It was sold then for \$8 a ton, leaving a dealer's margin of \$150 a ton. The cost of coal to the local dealer now is \$25 and the price to the consumer is \$100 a ton. Although the dealer's margin has increased from \$150 to \$22, this dealer points out, the cost of handling has more than doubled, and the actual profit is considerably less than it was five years ago.

Draymen Want Raise

"The draymen tell us that after the first of next month, they will not haul a load of coal for less than \$1.00 a ton," this dealer stated. "The present charge for delivery is \$1 a ton. If this purpose is carried out," the coal man added, "it is safe to say that the drayman will be making more out of the hauling of a ton of coal than will the local coal dealer."—From Twin Falls News.

NOW LET US SEE

Last winter the United States Fuel Administration allowed the dealer a clear profit of \$1.25, and none of them went out of business. There are just as many yards in Twin Falls today, as there were a year or two ago.

They Say Cost of Handling Has More Than Doubled

But what do they mean by handling? Surely it cannot be the delivery. For there is an extra charge for this service, and, in fact, this has been increased from \$1.00 to \$1.50. They must mean, then, unloading. This costs from 20c to 45c per ton, and even if they got it done for nothing before the war they cannot blame the unloading cost for all of the extra 50c profit they are making over last year, when the government set the price.

It Is a Clear Case of Profitteering

Honolulu, Hawaii.—Fleeting the entire fortune of a life which she has built up to a point of success, she is recognized as the foremost woman physician throughout the length and breadth of China. Dr. Yamel Kin, who moved through Honolulu recently on her way to the United States, has a life history that has few equals for romance and interest.

Many years ago a physician of wealth and leisure named Doctor Kin was traveling in the far East, going from village to village in China, studying the language and customs. The quest lasted nearly fifty years.

One afternoon he stopped for the night in a village devastated by the plague, and while walking about among the dead, death-stricken he heard the wail of a tiny baby. He discovered an entire family being dead in the hut, with the exception of a baby girl.

He gave her the best medical training that was offered, hoping to make of her a great woman physician, and in time she was graduated from a medical school in New York city, an institution that ceased to exist when the Cornell and Columbia universities medical colleges for women were closed. She is now Doctor Kin.
