Wires Down and Can Only Estimate Damage

HOUSTON, Tex., Sept. 17.—Floods completed early today following interrupted wire communication with eight towns and cities along the Texas coast. 2755 of the latter were known dead killed in the tornado which swept the Texas shore Sunday at 2:52.

Republican Absence Causes Postponement

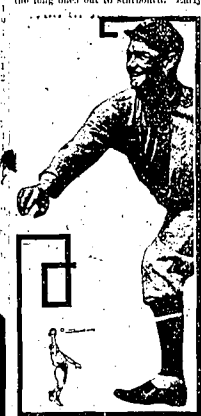

WILSON ANSWERS LABOR COUNCIL

Says Subject or Conquered People May Revolt Without Interference of League

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—President Wilson this afternoon sent a series of specific replies to the San Francisco labor council, in which he designed to meet certain objections raised to the treaty.

For the first time he has specifically taken notice of the charges made that he failed to take proper consideration of the Irish situation.

The president, as already has been made perfectly clear in these dispatches, declares that the conference at Paris could not consider Ireland, as the problem there was essentially one which it had no jurisdiction.

Under the covenant does this nation obligate itself to assist any member of the league in putting down a rebellion of its subjects or conquered people?

COUNTY LEVY SHOWS RAISE

Sweeping Increase in All Items Doubles Last Year's Levy—New Assessment of Valuation Brings Big Revenue Returns

A sweeping raise in county tax levies, nearly doubling those of last year, is shown in the table which has just been completed by Deputy Auditor Frank Lynch and filed with the commissioners. While the total levy in the county is approximately the same as last year, the several items show an increase because of the absence of a road levy, which was practically absorbed by the various highway levies. The increased assessment of both town and farm property has brought much larger revenue returns for every department of government.

In addition to the regular tax levies several special assessments for its improvement districts. In Twin Falls there will be special assessments for sprinkling, sewer district No. 26, sewer district No. 21, sidewalk district No. 23, sidewalk district No. 26, paving district No. 29, 24, 25 and 27.
