SOX NEED TWO GAMES TO CINCH LEAGUE PENNANT

Indians Must Win All Games to Get Look-in. So Chicago's Pets Taking It Easy

New York, Sept. 19.—Had the Sox, weary little pilot of the White Sox, already grabbing the pennant in the American league championships for the week's work?

The Sox are still two games removed from a mathematical cinch of the 1910 pennant today, but they are not worrying and Gleason has issued orders to his players to stand around spectators to arms, legs and hands from now on. With each game remaining Chicago need win only two, providing the Indians do not knock without an after defeat. For the last few days the Sox have been plugging along with their second string pitchers along 50 per cent of the whole week. Eddie Cicotte has not pitched a game in two weeks and Gleason has used Williams and Kerr at five day intervals.

This trip will be depended upon to turn back the heavy stickers of the Reds when the big series gets under way. Charlie Williams and Kerr will very probably be used against the Reds in the order named, and Gleason figures these three pitchers looking over one and two, will be enough to effectively block the ambitions of the Moran men.

The pitching ability of Cicotte and Williams has been a byword around

the American league all season, but of the trio Gleason has in mind for the big case. Eddie Kerr may prove the surprise. The steady little pitcher, who shut out his hungry Yankees on Wednesday, has been given the stamp of approval by New York fans and critics. Kerr's size is also a factor out of proportion to his pitching ability for his speed, line control and a left handed and an assortment of levers that would win games, against anybody. What is more is just about the best pitcher on the club with the prospect of greatness. Weaver and the rest.

IDAHO COACH HAS HARD JOB

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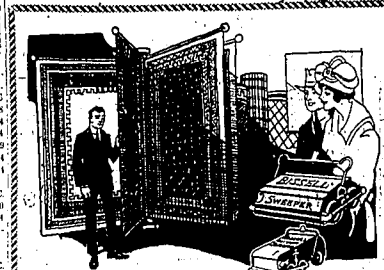

OUR "OBSCURE RICH"

There was a time, and not so long ago, either, when millionaires were pointed out in the street, even in big cities. "There goes a millionaire," people would say, in awed tones. Heavens would zap and marvel reverently.

That time is past, and gone. There is no more distinction in having a million. Little more, one might say, than having an Army commission in the family. The war is responsible for that. It multiplied fortunes as if multiplied commissions, making millionaires as common as colonels and captains, if not more so.

It is estimated that the war crop of millionaires amounts to 15,000 or 20,000. There are so many of them that a few thousand more or less makes little difference.

These men, for the most part, have gained no great distinction from their wealth, even when they live in small communities. People do not know how rich they are; or knowing, do not care. They are lost in the "photogenic" crowd, which is no longer really photogenic at all, but merely well off, and known for its comfortable way of life and its disregard of high prices rather than its magnificence.

"The obscure rich" somebody has called them. It is an apt phrase. They have got rich almost without knowing it. They can hardly realize, themselves, that they have attained that golden, indelible dream of millionaires; and if they do realize it, they feel a little more impression of them than on the public. They may be known to fortune, but are not known to fame. They are known only to the United States treasury department. And that is enough.

MONUMENTS

Among the memorials being erected in honor of American soldiers fallen in the big war, a monument in Stoughton, Conn., deserves, and is receiving, particular mention.

A handsome stone was erected, at public expense. On it were chiseled the names of the members of the town council which had decreed its erection. Beneath was a line stating that the names of the heroes commemorated by the monument would be found in a tin box placed inside the stone for the benefit of future ages.

Let it be said, in the honor of the living Stoughtonians, that the surviving war veterans are now erecting another monument to their lost comrades, at their own expense.

And let nobody laugh too bitterly at the action of that Stoughton town council. And let nobody, in any public structure, of one sort or another, in many an American community, one or two might even be found in Twin Falls, which from appearances might seem to indicate that it has been overlooked as a monument to the otherwise forgotten men who happened to hold public office at the time it was built.



NOTICE OF OPENING OF FAIRY ART LANDS

By order of the Commissioner of Reclamation of the State of Idaho, the heretofore described land in Twin Falls County, Idaho, will be opened for settlement and sale on and after October 15, 1910. Such land is situated 160 acres by anyone qualified to enter the same under the provisions of the act of Congress, June 16, 1904, and acts amendatory and supplementary thereto, commonly known as the Carey Act, and laws of the State of Idaho, and the rules and regulations of the Department of Reclamation relating to Carey Act lands.

Application to enter said land may be made in person or by authorized agent to the Commissioner of Reclamation, Boise, Idaho, or Carey Act office, this office residing at Henshaw's, Twin Falls County, Idaho.

The land will be sold to entrymen by the State of Idaho at the price of fifty cents per acre, one-half of which shall be paid when application is made, and one-half when final price is submitted.

All applications to enter said land must be accompanied by a copy of contract for the purchase of shares in the Irrigation system of Idaho Valley Development Company, at a price not to exceed \$125.00 per share. One share will be required for each acre of land to be entered, and such shares represent a proportionate interest in said irrigation system, determined upon the number of shares finally sold.

shutdown. This was the first instance in this district of any of the steel plants closing.

Reports from many steel companies around Pittsburgh today told of increased efforts to prevent any trouble next week.

Plants of the United States Steel corporation in the Monongahela valley will not shut down if the strike is ended, officials of the various plants indicated today.

Thirty or forty thousand men are employed in the corporation's plants and subsidiaries in the valley, but, according to the iron and steel workers' union, in some plants the officials state, the number of men employed with the union is only about one per cent.

Officials in the Bradstreet district said the union negotiators have made very little progress towards fixing the men up there.

Probably the reason for this, Mr. Davis said, is the fact that there are independent, which include, besides plants employing about 200 men, all those mills not connected with the United States corporation, hence in this way to remain open and obtain orders that normally would be given to the corporation.

The twenty-four presidents of the brotherhoods co-operating, in the strike, and the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, which includes Cannon (Denver), will meet in Pittsburgh some time within the next two weeks, Mr. Davis said, to discuss bill plans arising out of the strike.

In the Pittsburgh district, comprising territory west of Youngstown, Ohio, and east of Johnson, Pa., it was estimated today by labor leaders that approximately 200,000 men will fall in report to work Monday.
