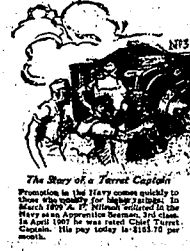

NATIONAL CREDIT MEN PRESCRIBE H. C. L. REMEDY

Secretary Tregoe of National Association Credit Men Advises Greater Production

As a portion of the campaign against high prices, the National Association of Credit Men has directed a letter to each member desiring that the remedy necessary to change present conditions rests in increased production and stimulation of personal marketing.

Members of the association throughout the country have been extending hearty cooperation to the Savings Division of the Treasury Department in its effort to popularize thrift through the sale of government savings securities.

Tregoe in his letter urges the adoption of a national labor policy which will not only recognize but control good faith dealing in the contractual relations of employed and employer.

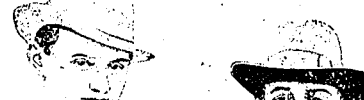
"The right to hire and discharge at will," said Mr. Tregoe, "implies the right to leave and strike at will. Both of these rights, at least up to the present are under control of national laws and, when abused, create a moral injury."

"Let us quit strong arm methods, the autocratic procedure, the breaking of contracts, the violation of good faith, the use of public means, and get down to a basis where men can and must live right in their relations. It is doubtful if we can do one another."

HIGH ON SCROLL OF FAME

To Write the Name of Frank Luke, One of the Best of American Air Fighters.

What Lieutenant Luke, famous American aviator, would, and often did, attempt was illustrated by his feat. Starting out alone to attack three "dirigibles" or observation balloons he had seen behind the German lines in front of Verdun, he was intercepted by ten enemy machines.

He engaged them all, got two of them, and escaped the others by swerving himself to be disabled. His "tail" was torn away from the balloons and he flew off the end of three of them in flames, but Luke disappeared, and what became of him was not known until after the armistice.

When the allied entered the village of Marancy the rest of the story was told from the housewife. The American had been forced by machine or the disarrangement of his machine to descend, but he did not land until he had cut the main cable to the extent of killing eleven of the many German soldiers stationed there. Then he lit his engine and flew away.

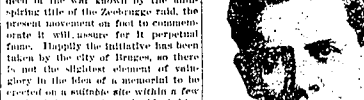

MEN CHANGE?!

Mr. Gosington Confident They Preserve Their Ideals.

Of Course, With Advancing Years He Admits Some of the Enthusiasms May Be Lost, But There's Reason for That.

"An older friend of mine once said to me, 'Gosington, you are a man of ideas. You preserve your ideals until you are somewhere around fifty, but after that they look out for themselves.' CONTROL SHEEP-KILLING DOG

Secretary of Agriculture Says Twenty Governors Urged Laws Prohibiting Dog Testing Sheep.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The enactment of more adequate state laws to control sheep-killing dogs is urged by Secretary Houston in a letter just sent to the governors of 20 States. The secretary points out that, although there has been a gratifying increase in the number of sheep in the United States in the past year, there is room for further expansion of the industry. Farmers, he says, are discouraged in many instances from feeding sheep on account of the danger of disease by dogs. The letters were sent to the governors of Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin, where state legislatures are now in session. Following is the letter:

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SHADE, FRESH WATER AND PROPER FEED ARE HOT WEATHER HINTS FOR BLEN FLOCK

Hen's Are Happy in the Shade of the Old Locust Tree.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Shade and protection from the glare and heat of Old Sol are better and more cleanly natured plucks, more summer ease from the laying fowl and a general abundance of hen happiness. Plenty of shade should be provided, especially for growing chicks, in order that they may thrive and prosper during the hot weather. Shelter furnished by plants or trees is much better than that afforded by buildings or other artificial means. Chick houses should be arranged in orchards will not only furnish shade and green food, but will protect the trees as well as the chickens. Corn or sunflowers will help to provide the necessary shade, or artificial shade may be obtained by suspending frames covered with burlap or branches of trees a few feet above the ground.

Summer Calls for Care.

Although chicks may be hatched from strong, vigorous stock and carefully brooded, their growth will be retarded unless they receive the proper attention during warm weather. Growing chicks should be provided with plenty of nutritious food, including green food, such as grass, alfalfa and clover. As a supplement to the green food which the chicks will waste on the free range, a grain mixture, consisting of six parts cracked corn, two parts wheat, two parts barley and one part oats, should be fed in a separate trough. This mixture should be varied according to grains available, providing the feeding value is maintained. As the chicks get older, the amount of grain should be increased. TO END COSTLY 'TURNOVER'

Experts Now at Work on Labor Problem Which Means Ruin to All Industries.

Editor Turnover—the shifting of workers from one job to another—costs the United States \$2,500,000,000 a year. How best to stop it is the problem with which industrial and employment managers are wrestling.

"It is difficult to realize that this 'turnover' cost us as much as it does," Arthur Woods, assistant to the secretary of war, in commenting on the large number of abandoned service men already employed who are applying for better jobs. "But such is the case, and I believe that a great deal of this turnover can be directly attributed to a lack of system of industrial training, wherein men who are an skilled but have the ambition to become skilled men can be trained for skilled work.

"Many discharged service men, upon being confronted with the fact that they held before the war, say, 'What do I go back to the old lunatic war?' 'Never!'

"Are they not right? They have come back better men in every way, with higher ideals and ambitions. These men look upon the old jobs they held before the war as inferior, but only with the idea of later seeking some thing better.

"The solution now point to the fact that they are applying for increasing numbers to our employment bureaus in order to get better jobs. They hold only particular grudge against their employers, but because they see no other way out, they are applying for jobs where they are, inquiring at some factories, where they see workers are assigned to tasks for which they are not equipped, and where no provision is made for fitting them to the job.

"If these workers are carefully trained, they will be able to do the work, not it is to the advantage of the employer to give it to them.

"Colonel Woods has long advocated the establishment of industrial training classes in plants, not only for present employees, but to help discharged soldiers become skilled workers.

It was believed during the session that a critical fight would occur on the resolution. Labor voted no; the public group, and the employers voted no.

There is the menace that if labor does not win the steel strike fight in the conference, the labor delegation may pull out, and the danger of a split in the conference is great. In such a case the common knowledge with the delegation of other groups.

Mr. Tolson said that this resolution had been sent to Frank S. Johnson, of the American Federation of Labor, explained, "so that we may fight this thing out on the convention floor."

"When the big fight will come is not certain," he continued. "It may come tomorrow, or it may be deferred until tomorrow. If the labor group has a clean cut victory the steel strike will be authorized by the steel employers, and two men from the public group."
