One of the biggest distribution centers was at Saloniki, Greece, and in this picture Bulgarian prisoners of war are seen there unloading a Red Cross cargo of 2,200 boxes from a French transport. At the right is seen one of the American Red Cross ambulances, fleets of which were used in rushing relief to points where the suffering was greatest.

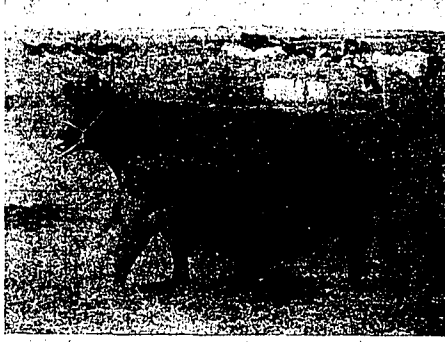

ADORNED ARMIES WHICH PERSEAN KINGS LED TO WAR.

Spectacular indeed must have been the array of mighty hosts before the Days of Business-Like Fighting.

Warfare was a spectacular, as well as a bloody enterprise, in the days of antiquity. Plush kilted and shimmering costumes were worn; never have suited the ancient Persean soldiers.

Silver armor, surrounded by priests, changing colors, were first in line of march. They were followed by 500 youths dressed in purple garments, a central soldier of the sun was drawn by snow-white horses, led by grims wearing white garments and carrying golden whisks.

Two chariots embossed with gold and silver preceded the cavalry of 32 nations, dressed in their various fashions and carrying their peculiar arms.

Then came the Persian immortals, 10,000 in number, wearing golden chainlets and robes embroidered with gold and glittering with precious stones. Following at a short distance were 10,000 archers, the fattest of the king, dressed in garments wondrously wrought.

A company of spearmen preceded the king. He rode on an imposing chariot, and wore robes of surpassing splendor, and a costly mitre on his head. By his side walked 200 of his most noble kinsmen, 100 thousand warriors, bearing spears, with shafts of silver tipped by heads of gold, followed the royal chariot of Xerxes. The king's horses, 40 in number with 200 attendants, rode the procession.

At some distance followed the mother and wife of the king in chariots, accompanied by their children or her children, their tutors and nurses, and 500 eunuchs, guarded by archers, borne on royal treasury. The friends and relatives of the ladies followed with the cooks and servants. Light-armed troops were sent to the front.

When a king in those days looked upon his troops and saw their strength and splendor, it is no wonder he felt proud and wished to lead them in battle. Such an army was not meant to stay at home, where only their number could be seen. Other nations would have known how powerful a king he was. So he and his followers pitched camp, and went for conquest.

Peoples were forced to step them, as they up a life of ease, either for conquest or defense, and the great highways, which peace would have created to commerce and prosperity, became military roads over which went the great army.

MASKS RECALL OLD SHAMANISM

Carvings Throw Light on Superstitions of Alaska.

IMPLICIT FAITH OF NATIVES

Belief in Words and Actions of the Shaman Bo Strong Whole Tribes Would Be Hungry Rather Than See Him Disfigure by Eating Eaters Which He Tabooed—Land Otter Too Sacred to Be Killed.

Masks in the possession of Joseph Bourke of Valdez, Alaska, carved from a single piece of wood, brightly colored with long slender tapers protruding from the top of the head like a devil fish's arm, recall to those familiar with the natives of Alaska their ancient shamanism.

Shamanism, or superstition and sorcery, has been based on imitation since the life of the Alaskan natives. So implicitly did these natives of many years ago believe in the words and actions of the shaman that a whole tribe would go hungry rather than incur his displeasure by eating foods which he had tabooed.

The shaman attained his position and power by unusual methods. By fasting and prayer and the sacrifice of the woods or mountains, where he fed only upon grass and roots, he prepared himself for the adding of the spirits, and all successful shamans had to have numerous spirits at their immediate command. Demons of the spirit world to aid with the shaman sent the navitla a land otter while the conditions killed. The otter's tongue, placed in the mouth of the shaman, was from all human view, for almost the taboos were so severe, it was believed that the shaman could be turned into the animal from which the tongue was taken. The skin of the otter, which the shaman wore as a sign of his profession.

Other Sacred Animals.

Thus it came about that it had often been regarded as too sacred to eat to be killed by other than the shaman, and neither Alaskan natives nor the animals themselves were to be killed after the coming of the Russians.

Shamanism is supposed that the fasting and prayer in solitude did not bring to the wretched shaman the spirit which he had invoked. He took himself, still fasting, to the grave of some deceased shaman and passed a night with his arms, taking care at the feet of the cavity in his mouth. Upon the shaman's return to his tribe his skill was then tested by the curing of some of the natives.

For each spirit which the shaman could produce he had a separate wooden mask, often of his own work, as the tastes of the curer could differ.

Healer and Prophet.

The shaman had many duties to perform. He was supposed to heal the sick, to cure out the devil, to find the bones of his subjects, to foretell the future, and with the aid of his spirits to enable one to avoid unfavorable conditions. The riches of his trade, paraphernalia and charms given descended from father to son. The shaman's life never ceased to be his life; he would be to lose his powers. When he died he was not buried, but his body was allowed to rot in the spot where death came for 24 hours, so that the friendly spirits might have a chance to get out of it. After this period of decay it was buried in the ground.

At last, dressed in full regalia, the body was laid on a board. One of the most ancient and best preserved shaman masks was placed through the hair and the other through the nostrils, and a basket woven of small twigs and grass, and at night the body was buried in a simple remote cavern or crevice. Therefore the members of the tribe never entered this burial place, for it was supposed to be filled with evil spirits.

Mr. Bourke's collection of native masks, weapons and articles is said to be one of the finest in Alaska.

WOLF IN THE HAND.

While the people of Denmark are glorying in the antiquity of their national flag, the "Dannebrog," which claims the honor of seniority among all the national flags, and are commemorating its origin in the thirteenth century, Belgian and German patriots are scouring the Baltic Area on a mission of vital import to their respective flags. The Austro-German state has long indications of adopting for its colors blue, yellow and red, disposed horizontally. This has aroused patriots in Belgium, which claims priority in precisely the same colors, namely blue, yellow, and red, and patriotic societies are said to be forming to take action to prevent Germany's adoption of them.

The Belgian claims are based on the colors of the princes of Flanders and Brabant in the thirteenth century, while the German one is said to rest on the use of the colors in question by the ancient Germanic people.
