SEE NO BASIS OF SETTLEMENT OF LONGHOREN STRIKE

Both Sides Exchange Charges Against Other

MAY CONTINUE NEGOTIATIONS

Secretary of Labor Wilson Hopes to Avert Walkout of All Miners Scheduled for Nov. 1—No body Optimistic Over Outlook.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Exchanges of statements charging profiteering by the operators and contract breaking by the miners were developments in the threatened coal strike today.

Both operators and miners were awaiting the response of Secretary of Labor Wilson, who today said he had no hope for a compromise settlement and predicted a walkout of miners on November 1.

Neither side will admit seeing a basis for a settlement of negotiations. The operators' spokesman said he would not accept the terms of the miners' ultimatum.

Miners' leaders would not consent to this ultimatum. They held that the "get out of jail" increase in wages had a 30-hour week.

Local mining reports that national organizations of mines might become active in the strike.

Nationalization of mines, though approved by a recent convention, is not a definite plan. It will not be brought into the "open market."

Local operators of the operators' union said they would not accept a previous charge of the miners that the operators were profiteering.

Miners' officials are going to continue to demand a 30-hour week to obtain their demands in all fields. Inasmuch as new contracts have not been signed in some of the fields," Brewer said.

Wilson in reply declared that the operators' statement was "apparently designed to mislead the public."

He said the federal trade commission had called attention to "astounding profits." He charged also that operators are taking prices at present, taking advantage of public fear of a strike.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Secretary of Labor Wilson tonight announced he had appointed a special conciliation committee to attempt to adjust the strike of longshoremen in New York.

LANE LAND BILL MAY BE PASSED

Reports Indicate Political Fear Has Kept Bill in Committee for Many Months

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Reports of an understanding that foresees passage of the Lane sodiers land bill, popularly known as the Mitchell bill, have been circulating since from the committee on public lands of the house of representatives.

Both sides of the bill have been introduced early in the present session, by the Republican floor leader, Mitchell, from whom it now takes its name.

The bill has been reported to the committee for months because the Republican leaders were suffering from what is known in slang as "cold feet" or plain politics.

Questions have been raised about its hearings running into months have been held on it, but it has been allowed to die in the committee.

SAY REIGN OF TERROR EXISTS

Goal Miners Ask Senate to Investigate Conditions in West Virginia Field

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—A federal investigation of alleged injustices to West Virginia coal miners was asked in a resolution adopted by the miners which was presented to the senate this afternoon.

The resolution stated that an "inhuman and unbearable" condition prevails in the Guyan river coal field, and alleged that coal operators have created a "reign of terror" by the use of gunpowder armed with high power rifles and machine guns.

It was also asserted that "nothing but promises" have resulted from appeals of justice to the state government of West Virginia and that a train bearing fifty "organizers" were being shot at and held up for three hours.

The resolution was signed by Fred Mooney, secretary treasurer of the United Mine Workers, who claimed to represent 41,000 miners in the West Virginia district.

Returned Soldiers Tell Tyranny Tales

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—The transport ship "Lafayette" returned to State troops back from Siberia today, and with them came stories of alleged mistreatment at the hands of the Russian government.

ELECTION FRAUD WILL BE PROBED

Charges Against Senator Newberry Will Be Laid Before Michigan Grand Jury

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Charges of fraud and unlawful expenditures of large sums of money in connection with the nomination and election of Truman Newberry as United States senator from Michigan, will be laid before a grand jury to convene at Grand Rapids, Mich., Attorney General Palmer announced today.

Sustained Newberry's election returns of Palmer's announcement tonight, said he did not care to make any comment.

Newberry in the primaries had Henry Ford.

Ford won the Democratic nomination, having outvoted Newberry, who was defeated by Newberry in the election.

A proposal for a senatorial investigation of Newberry's election returns and a motion was dropped. Newberry held his seat since the beginning of the present session.

SUGAR SCARCITY DUE TO DRINKS

Prohibition Greatly Increased Demand for Soft Drinks, and These Contain Sugar

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The soft drink war that raged with prohibition, primarily, but not only, because of the scarcity of sugar, according to expert testimony offered to the senate committee on agriculture today.

The committee on agriculture today announced that the demand for sugar has increased the country's sugar demand 18 per cent since 1914 and the demand cannot be supplied without causing an effect by the government toward securing a larger share of the foreign crop.

King Missed Chance to Quench Thrift

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18.—King Albert must cross the desert all because he failed to keep an appointment with the king of Belgium.

The king was to have visited Santa Anita ranch, where Mr. Anita Baldwin was prepared to receive the royal visitor.

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Bolsheviks Lose Men and Munitions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Belief that the power of the bolsheviks in Russia is waning was strengthened today by advices reaching the state department and Russian embassy.

The Russian embassy today received a message from the Russian government, which was based on official dispatches from Omsk, seat of the Kolchak government.

MAN NARROWLY WINS AIRPLANE RACE BY MANY MILES

Details of Transcontinental Flight Are Given

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Lieut. Edwin W. Maynard completed his ocean-to-ocean flight at Minota this afternoon, a double victory in the first transatlantic air race.

The "sky pilot" won the first leg a week ago, the day which he led a large flock of San sandeels.

Replying to Senator Dinkert, Senator Hitchcock defended his wife's absence from the race today.

His total elapsed time was 78 hours, 49 minutes. The rules governing the race required him to remain there 48 hours, exclusive of sleeping time.

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NO PROGRESS ON PEACE TREATY

Senators Take Up Time of Deliberative Body Calling Each Other-Patriotic Names

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Little progress on the peace treaty was made in the senate today.

An attempt to adopt the Walsh resolution which would direct the United States to take up Ireland's case in the league of nations, failed after an hour's bitter debate.

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Hopeful Outlook for No Flu Is Reported

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Doubt of an influenza epidemic and a hopeful outlook because cases reported generally are of a mild type, Surgeon General Hootch of the United States public health service said tonight.

During the week ending October 11, General Hootch said, 19 states reported 229 cases, all mild with 481 cases in 22 states for the week ended October 4.

RAILROAD BILL IS ALL READY

Carries Severe Penalties for Strikes or Hindering in Train Operations

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The senate interstate commerce committee this afternoon completed revision of the railroad reorganization bill under which the roads are to be returned to private ownership.

The provision makes it unlawful for two or more persons to enter into any combination or agreement with the intent to hinder or prevent the operation of trains.

The bill provides that the return of the railroad to private ownership within 30 days of its passage, but subject to regulation by the interstate commerce commission.

The plan adopted provides that the total balance of 400,000,000 used by the carrier will be paid in 10-year bonds.

LABOR INDORSES THRIFT STAMPS

California Federation Memorializes Government to Continue Campaign

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., Oct. 18.—The California State Federation of Labor at its twentieth annual convention here unanimously adopted resolutions endorsing the government's Thrift campaign, memorializing the government to continue and extend the War Savings and Thrift Stamp institution as a permanent policy helpful in safeguarding the earnings of the toiling masses of the country.

The resolution recommended the appointment of a Thrift Agent in every affiliated local union in the state and advised each union to supply agents with a revolving fund sufficient to enable him to carry on hand an adequate supply of Thrift and War Savings Stamps.

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ALLIED FORCES SMASH DEFENSE OF PETROGRAD

Severe Defeat Is Reported in Official Communiqué

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Bolshevik forces continue to suffer reverses before attacks which were reported before two months ago.

The loss of Kronstadt, bolshevik headquarters, was reported today in a communiqué issued by the British war office, outlining a victory gained by the troops under General Denikin.

YALE DEFEATED INGLORIOUSLY

Boston College Has Old Eli Bunch Plundering Groggily at Little End of Score

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 18.—Eventually Yale may "come to."

The big team of Coach Al Sturpe and the students of the noted New Haven institution were dashed and demoralized around groggily from the knockout punch administered to their paper when a lively Boston college defeated them this afternoon, 5 to 0. As a result, the Yale center, who as well as a "hush league" pitcher, twice he made passes high over Princeton's head. The seventh offense gave the victors their first drive when a wild pass put the ball behind the goal line for a safety.

SYRACUSE BEATS PITTSBURGERS

Upsets the Dope by Playing All Around and Bewildering Much Touted Team

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 18.—Syracuse quarterback "old man" Dope" Taylor and provided the cast with the biggest upset of the season, defeating Glenn Warner's highly touted Pittsburgh team 24 to 2. Princeton scored two touchdowns on runs of 35 and 49 yards. Rochester braved in the second half and the Tiger club were unable to score.

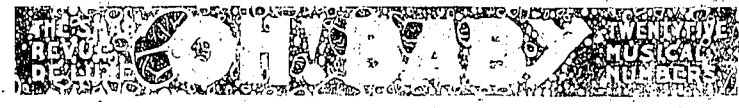

MAORIS BACK FROM WAR, LAUGH AND HAVE TRIBAL MEMORIAL

Battalion Maintained at Full Strength Entirely by Voluntary Enlistment.

The battalion of Maoris, New Zealand aborigines, who fought in the first world war and returned to France, has been welcomed home with a great feast, both a dance and a tangi, or funeral for those who fell in battle.

The airing of the palm fronds, Sir James Allen, told them: "The Maoris hold a great position. You have not one conscript." From the time of the formation early in the war the Maori battalion was maintained at a strength of 1,200 entirely by voluntary enlistment.

Great quantities of munition, beef, pork and other food had been belated in northern oceans for the occasion. About 2,000 Maoris in all shared in this feast. There were several red (a native delicacy) dances.

The feast was a scene of much merriment. The soldiers sat by tribes, encircled by snoring natives. Led by their chiefs, the warriors arrived with long, smiling cheeks the throats of their faces who will never return. All the treasured heirlooms of the tribes had been brought from the safekeeping for the welcome. There were jade ornaments, neck, eideidulne' beads, dresses and beautiful kites. The chiefs of the tribes, by their speeches, employed the Maori South Sea language, after which there was a haka by the famous Araroa tribe and the speech of welcome by Sir James Allen.
