REPUBLICANS FILIBUSTER WITH TREATY

Gronna Makes Long Speech to Delay Action—Little Hope of Reaching Vote on Johnson Amendments This Week.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—With an unbroken filibuster on the German peace treaty expected to continue to the Senate today its passage is but a little hope for a vote on the Johnson amendment being reached this week.

It was proposed again that when the Senate was ready to dispose of the Johnson amendment the Senate should be invited to vote on the amendment which involves the same proposal—should be invited on the floor.

Senator Gronna, Republican of North Dakota, said the league of nations would make this country "a pack horse for the government of Europe."

Administration Senators protested against further extended speech making, which they depicted "pure class resemblance to a filibuster."

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GARY IS FIRM FOR OPEN SHOP

Declares Industrial Conference Blew Up Through Inability to Harmonize Opposites

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Judge Albert J. Gay, head of the United States Steel corporation today attributed the breaking up of President Wilson's industrial conference to a clash of political views.

"This is the greatest question confronting the country, and in fact, the world public."

MINISTER IS FOR ALCOHOL

Says Wine Was Given to Make Heart of Man Glad—Would Deport Prohibitionists

LONDON, Oct. 24.—"Man cannot exist on 'dry bread,'" is the broadside in support of alcoholic drink fired by the Rev. H. L. Warnford in his harvest festival sermon at Ealing.

"Wine was given to make the heart of man glad, and by that word wine I infer anything with a spirit which is above that of any other."

"Some like water and others like wine with more being to be found in the national beverage of this country of the gods, the regal champagne of all their gifts of God."

WORLD IS NEAR DISILLUSIONING

College Man Says War Was Fought for People in Desperate Commercial Rivalry

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Oct. 24.—In an address before the joint convention of the Western Massachusetts State Library club, Dr. Albert Parker Fitch of Amherst college, declared that the late war did not make the world for democracy.

"After four years of the shame and horror," he said, "of a comparatively futile war, in which the boys apparently fought on a clearly defined basis to make the world safe for democracy, we know now that we certainly have not made the world safe for democracy, that we have been fighting not for all peoples, but for some peoples in the most desperate commercial rivalry ever seen on earth."

"The world was never so near utter political disillusionment as it is today, and the war has left us with far less democracy and far more imperialism."



Raymond B. Fosdick, who spent over two years with the American peace commission and who was formerly chairman of the government's commission on training camp activities, has been selected the post of assistant secretary of the league of nations.

FREIGHT AND PASSENGERS ARE TIED UP

Longshoremen's Strike Results in Piling Piers With Goods to Be Shipped and Filling Hotels With Prospective Passengers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Four hundred and thirty-four ships with a tonnage aggregating 1,032,700 tons lie in New York harbor as a result of the longshoremen's strike.

"Virtually every dock and dry dock in the harbor is occupied, every cargo stowage and 120 vessels waiting to be loaded or unloaded."

"There are lined with freight waiting to be shipped, and in the meantime with goods, much of it perishable, which cannot be unloaded because no men can be obtained."

"Passenger traffic is equally tied up. Sixty-five of the twelve regularly scheduled passenger-carrying, twenty-five of them trans-Atlantic liners, are waiting for the coal."

"The United Fruit line was the only line which was not completely tied up today. Strike breakers have been employed there for several days and cargo work accomplished. Other lines threaten to follow that example, requesting federal troops if the port is not given their sufficient power."

Reports From East Galicia Show 5000 Fresh Victims Each Day—Bury Some Alive

WARSAW, Oct. 24.—Reports are daily received of horrible conditions in eastern Galicia where typhus is raging and spreading at the rate of 1,000 fresh victims each day. The country is practically without hospitals.

TWO BODIES WOUND IN AUTO WRECK

A. L. Pratt and A. Black in Hospital as Result of Collision on Addison Avenue

"The two men, with one other, whose name was not learned, were driving south on Washington street, when they came to a stop at a red light, when they were struck by a car coming from the north."

"Pratt and Black were both thrown through the window of the car, and were injured. Pratt's head was struck on the curb, and he was taken to the hospital."

COAL STRIKE ORDER STANDS

Conference of Miners and Operators With Secretary Wilson Leads to Nothing

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Secretary of Labor, Wilson's proposal for wage increases for the coal miners to meet the threatened coal shortage, was rejected this afternoon by both the miners and the operators.

"Secretary Wilson appealed to the miners to return to work, but they would not communicate with the White House and he asked for a further conference at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The request was taken under consideration."

Bolshevik Movement Traced to Moscow

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—The bolshevik movement which threatens to overrun this country has been directly traced to an "international communist gathering" of Russian leadership held at Moscow, from March 2 to March 6, by Lenin and Trotsky.

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PUBLIC GROUP WILL REPORT

Will Make Post Mortem Observations on President's Industrial Conference

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—The remnants of the president's industrial conference—the public group—has outlined its plan to make a detailed report on industrial conditions throughout the country, as desired by the president.

"The group will meet this afternoon to formulate those plans and also to outline the central committee's intentions. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., as head of a subcommittee, will draw up the tentative report."

"A large number of the public group are frankly pessimistic over the situation. These members, who include Bernard Baruch, are skeptical of any beneficial result from the industrial conference plan. Some of them do not believe that any report which might be formulated would be taken by the country generally as being authoritative."

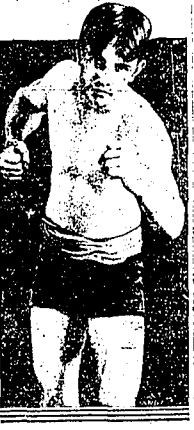

REJOICE OVER RAILROAD HELP

Steel Strikers Are Happy Over Promised Support—Meetings Still Forbidden

PTTSBURGH, Oct. 23.—There was much rejoicing at the headquarters of the steel strikers today over the prospective support of railroad men in sympathy with them. Only those men who handle the raw products and the output of the mills would be affected, but their striking would seriously cripple the industry.

The matter was discussed at length by the strike organizers last night and there was to be another meeting today in likely that the men will be out in a few days.

The ban on strikers' meetings here still stood today despite the bitter fight of congress to have it lifted. After a full day's hearing the court ruled that Mayor E. V. Babcock's action in refusing permits was correct and the strikers petition for a writ.

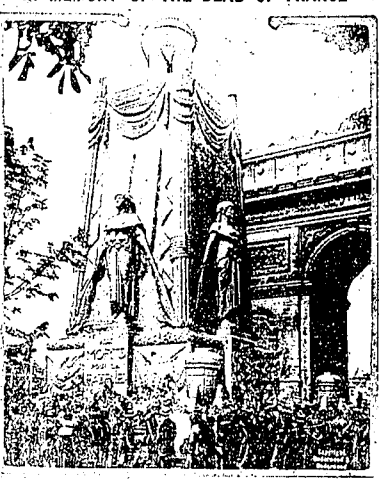

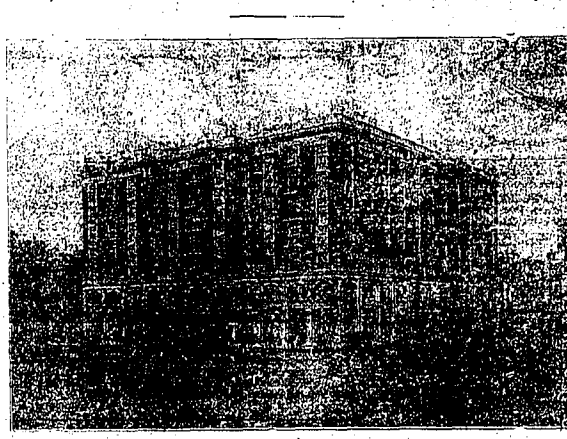
