II. The Faith Loyalty of the Rechabites (ev. 6:11). Though they were out of their own country, in the midst of a foreign people, they refused to drink wine, declaring that they had been true to the instructions of Jotham, his father's chief steward.

III. The Loyalty of the Rechabites in Contrast With the Disloyalty of the Israelites (ev. 12:10). The appeal (ev. 13: 14). He made the appeal on the basis of the filial piety of the Rechabites. He reminded them that the Israelites were disobedient, though their father was dead long ago.

IV. Judgment Upon the Jews for Disobedience (ev. 17). God declared that he would bring judgment upon them according to what he had said. Judgment is determined upon those who disobey and rebel against God.

V. Reward of the Rechabites for Their Loyalty (ev. 18, 19). Because they had been true to the commands of Jotham they have continued representation before God. God has thus regarded for their sake that he has not forgotten them.

VI. The Miracle of Divine Grace. The miracle of divine grace is too great for our understanding. The most grateful thing about this is the feeling that the stone can never again be as though that sin had never been—Rev. Benjamin J. Campbell in the Churchman.

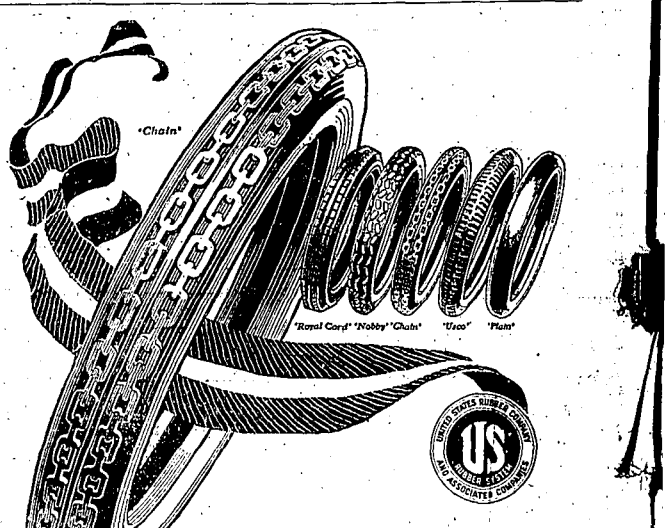
