CLEARLY SETTING ISSUES OF THE BATTLE

Remarkable Presentation of Situation Says Collective Bargaining is Issue and Makes Defense of Rights to Organize—Are Starting Automobile Repair Shop

Containing a concise outline of the issues at stake in the local employment controversy, defending their own position and appealing for fair consideration from the employer and the general public, a remarkable statement has been made by the machinists union of Twin Falls...

ORGANIZED LABOR AND ORGANIZED LAW.

Action of the coal miners in ending their strike at the order of a United States court may be regarded as labor's answer to charges, open or covert, that organized labor is opposed to organized government.
