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STIFF FIGHT IN CONFERENCE

Coal Operators and Miners Will Fight Bitterly to Win in Momentous Controversy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—One of the stiffer fights in the history of the coal industry is expected during the conference on coal miners and operators called by Secretary of Labor William B. Wilson to begin tomorrow at 12 o'clock. The operators, led by such prominent industrial plutocrats as Thomas T. Brewer, chairman of the National Coal Association, and the miners, led by the central committee of the United Mine Workers of America, are beginning to assemble their forces, and while the fighting is not yet begun, the line of action at the conference will be all the sterner point to a bitter battle to carry their side of the controversy.

INVESTIGATORS DRAW GOOD PAY

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 12.—Reports that a large staff of expert accountants have been imported to the Washington to audit the government war accounts have circulated about the House and the Senate during the last few days. THE DISEASE ITSELF.

While dealing with questions of strikes, lockouts and arbitration, it is well to hold deeper. These are only symptoms of industrial disease, and the disease itself. Moreover, they are deceptive symptoms. As Herbert Hoover pointed out in a recently published statement, they "presuppose a condition of things which as a matter of fact there is no necessary connection." The solution, as Mr. Hoover remarks, is to be found in a "community of interest."

"It is hopeless to seek a solution if we are to let these pending 'as different classes fighting each other. The worker, the arbitrator and the employer are absolutely interdependent on one another in this task of securing the maximum production and a better division of its results."

"We must find in the relationship of employer and employee some common bridge of actual, individual self-interest in the maintenance of production and the elimination of waste. We must have a contribution on both sides of their full energy, their full intelligence and their full responsibility."

"Maximum production does not lie in the abandonment of the individual reward for effort and intelligence. It lies in a proper stimulation of these qualities of skill and effort, and their stimulation by the only stimulus that is consistent in the human character, and that is enlightened self-interest."

The big industrial conference at Washington was wrecked because it dealt with the mere symptoms, and never got down to real consideration of the disease itself. Other conferences will fail likewise unless they go at the matter differently. Mr. Hoover's suggestions are along the line of those given by John D. Rockefeller Jr. and many other thoughtful students of economic conditions. It would be a great deal of careful study, especially by the extreme conservatives of capital and the extreme radicals of labor.

Industrial warfare is more absurd than international warfare. There is no more reason in the nature of things for capital and labor to fight each other than for a man's right hand to fight his left. Surely it is not beyond the power of the human intellect to devise a plan whereby brain-workers and hand-workers, those who possess and those who desire to possess, may help each other instead of hindering each other, and thereby help themselves.

PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE MAKES A BREAK.

Suggestion by the British premier in his speech Saturday night that an attempt might be made to negotiate peace with the bolsheviks of Russia has stirred up a lot of protest among the newspapers of the title side. The Daily Mail shoulders at "making hands with a murderer," and denounces the suggestion. Other papers are equally horrified.

The communists seize at the perfect purity which has always characterized the dealings of the British with their subjects and hostilities. There is revolution in Egypt, suppressed by the beneficent military power of England. There is revolution in Ireland, overpowered and crushed by soldiers of the king.

John Bull fills his newspapers with opportunity to shake his hands with himself. And he fails. If the "great powers" do not use every means of crushing the bolsheviks, which has become an unaccountable person seem to have a very large following, how shall the financial moguls collect their money from the worthless Russian bonds?

THE CENTRALIA HORROR

If there is one thing that stands out as most striking in the desolate outrage at Centralia, Wash., which four ex-servicemen were shot and killed while marching in the Armistice day parade, it is the fact that the soldiers executed suspected persons when the fury of the mob threatened to add another chapter to the incident which would not have made the crime any less horrible. If there ever was provocation, that shooting was it.

The action of the soldiers, doubtless prevented outrage if it had not occurred. In the midst of great provocation the soldiers held their heads. NEW VEGETABLE SWEET IN SUGAR SUBSTITUTE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—Manufacture of "sugar" substitutes is being urged by the present shortage and prevent a future scarcity of sugar for the plants and machinery formerly used in the brewing of beer. This is a new sweet which has been put on a commercial basis at the physiological moment.

In addition to being a sweet, malt sugar syrup has a delicious flavor which is that of honey, the chemists say. This quality adds to its palatability and value as a substitute for sugar.

Small sugar syrup has long been known to chemists, but its production on a commercial basis has only been undertaken with a prospect of success. Two factors have tended to hasten its development.

It is announced by investigators of the Department of Agriculture that a little change in the treatment of this new sweet, up to a certain point, will result in a product which is identical with that of brewing beer.
