McKAIG STARTED CLASS HATRED SAYS GOODING

Former Governor Testifies in Own Behalf in McKaig's Suit for \$50,000 Damages

BOISE, Nov. 14.—Testifying in his own behalf today ex-Governor Frank R. Gooding blamed Ray McKaig for being the originator of class hatred in Idaho. He denied that McKaig had paid him two visits at Gooding, or that he had asked for the intervention of the Department of Justice. Asked on cross-examination if McKaig and his attorney had falsely testified concerning McKaig's conduct, Gooding replied that "they certainly did."

It was expected the case would close today, but this seems not likely. McKaig is suing ex-Governor Gooding and the Idaho State Bank for \$50,000 damages on account of an advertisement printed in the Statesman during the trial of McKaig.

SOVIET PEACE WITH BRITAIN IS AGITATING

Premier's Guildhall Speech Now Said to Have Been Put Out as Feeler for Opinion

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Premier Lloyd George faced a crossfire of questions on the possibility of peace negotiations with the soviet government of Russia when parliament convened today. It is reported on excellent authority that the premier's speech which might be interrupted that negotiation which be opened with the soviet government cannot a surprise to the cabinet.

However, in this connection, it is said the foreign office secretly regarded the premier's declaration as a "feeler" to test public opinion.

The members of the parliamentary committee of the trade union congress were reported to have received information that within the next few days the government would decide whether to open peace negotiations with Russia, maintain the status quo, blockade or begin a new campaign of intervention.

It was suggested that the committee interview the premier and then a special session of the cabinet would convene to decide what action might be necessary to force the government to "blow off" all the Russian steam.

The Manchester Guardian, the leading liberal newspaper outside of London, demands that no subsidies be given to any Russian faction, saying:

"If Premier Lloyd George promises Russian peace with the Federation of Russian states voluntarily both the world and Russia will applaud, but further support of General Denikin would promote a separate movement by the Baltic states."

"The problem is to remove both the bolshevik and reactionary forces and allow the natural choice to reassert themselves," the Manchester Guardian says.

Bulgaria Demands King for Trial

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Bulgaria has demanded the extradition of former King Ferdinand for trial on the charge of forcing Bulgaria into the war, the war office announced today.

In addition, Bulgaria demands that ex-former Bulgarian king and other former state officials, many of whom are already under arrest, be brought to trial.

Ferdinand abdicated and fled from Bulgaria after the collapse of the central powers. He was last reported living in Switzerland in the colony of deposed kings.

Former Premier Radetzki was in power in Sofia in 1914 when the war began. He was a Germanophile and worked to line up Bulgaria on the side of Germany.

Since the armistice was signed the socialists have gained tremendous power in Bulgaria and it was recently reported that Boris, former king of Bulgaria, would seek election to the Bulgarian parliament on the socialist ticket.

ORDINARY GROWN ARE GOOD ENOUGH FOR STATE AFFAIRS

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The high cost of living has hit the limit again, Queen Mary has given permission to state functions. The cost of a coronation, such as it was worn before the war, is \$1,000 and it could be worn only on court occasions.

"IT'S GRANDEST THING ON EARTH" SAYS MRS. DALEY USE FORCE ONLY WHEN NECESSARY

Policy of United States in Deal With Bolsheviki Russia Is Announced by Department.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—The United States government will not use force in fighting bolshevism in Russia.

"This was learned at the state department today when it became known that the administration has agreed upon a Russian policy which calls for a course of restraint to affect bolshevik propaganda, but is against the use of force except where evidence on the part of the bolsheviks makes it necessary to respond with violence."

Large stores of food and supplies will be sent to Russia to counter the bolshevik government and credit will be advanced as soon as a Russian government is reorganized.

State department officials today would not be quoted, but they indicated that most recent utterances of Lloyd George with regard to the Russian situation were interpreted as an indication to the United States, that it must take a more active part in the campaign against the bolsheviks.

The bolshevik movement in this country is being carefully watched by the agents of the state department as well as the department of justice, it is announced today. It was stated that the state department and the justice department are using every effort to keep their arms upon labor agitators who look to bolshevism as a general program to follow, that during the period of unrest the bolsheviks have had some success in using labor as an instrument to share their purposes.

Industrial works and large supplies of food and clothing are counted upon by the administration to defeat bolshevism and American troops will only be used when the acts of the bolsheviks call for the use of armed forces.

Select Jury to Try May Day Rioter

CLEVELAND, Nov. 14.—The work of selecting a jury to hear the trial of C. R. Rutenburg, former Cleveland socialist leader, and now one of the communist party heads of "Chicago" was well advanced today.

These were eleven jurors tentatively in the box when court convened today, but as each side still had two persons to be chosen, it was expected that all day would be required finally to select the jury.

Attorney Robert H. H. Young, who is representing the socialist party, asked one juror, "Are you a member of any association to prevent the arraignment of all socialists by shooting them?" The objection of County Prosecutor Young to the question was sustained by the court.
