WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Ten reservations to the peace treaty were adopted today by the senate as it rushed the work of preparing the resolution of ratification.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—W. E. Johnson, American leader of the "dry" forces in England, who was roughly handled by a crowd of college students Thursday afternoon, entered upon a long period of rest on orders from his doctors, and it was some time before he was able to appear in public against the "demon rum."

BOSTON BANKER DIES SUDDENLY

Major Higginson Won Notoriety by Defending Orchestra Leader or Accused of Distasteful

BOSTON, Nov. 15.—Major Henry Lee Higginson, one of the foremost bankers of the United States and one of the most distinguished financiers of the Massachusetts, died suddenly at the Massachusetts general hospital here today.

Major Higginson succumbed suddenly after an operation. He had been ill for a few days of an intestinal disorder.

Major Higginson obtained wide notoriety when he espoused the cause of Karl Muck, who was accused of destructionism by Higginson, however, finally turned against the orchestra leader and the charges against him were proven.

Germans Disapprove President Wilson

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—Foreign demonstrations today in front of the American embassy building, which crowds shouted "down with Wilson" and "down with the armistice," were the warmest order of defiance to the armistice day parade shooting, which followed Tom Hindenburg's and his wife's speech last night.

EXISTING LAW IS INADEQUATE TO DEAL WITH RED ACTIVITY

Work Among Negroes Enlists Their Support 60,000 NAMES OF SUSPECTS FILED

Red Newspapers Advocating Anarchism, Communism, Radical Socialism, Potent Factor in Spreading Class Hatred.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(Special)—A list of 60,000 names of suspected radicals was filed today at the department of justice, Attorney General Palmer informed the senate today.

Palmer's statement was made in answer to a senate inquiry making what action had been taken against radicals and what action was being taken against the radicals of the government and violent destructionists.

Palmer's answer covers a score of types of radicals in force today in the United States. It indicates the belief that bolshevism and kindred doctrines are spreading rapidly and that the government has been enlisted on the side of the radicals.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 15.—Governor Davis of Virginia tonight announced he had appointed Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury, as senator to succeed the late Senator Martin.

Officials and congressmen who knew of the appointment of Glass to the senate and his consequent resignation from the cabinet were at a loss to explain the appointment.

Expect Glass to Take Part in Treaty Fight

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The resignation of Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury will be in the hands of the senate early next week.

CENTRALIA, Nov. 15.—(Special)—The United States circuit court of appeals at Portland was expected to decide the Berger case probably will be handed down tonight, to local officials and tonight.

obstructs the laws or officers of the United States shall be subject to a fine of \$10,000 or twenty years' imprisonment, or both.

That whoever incites to overthrow the government or obstructs laws shall be subject to a \$10,000 fine or ten years' imprisonment, or both.

That aliens convicted of sedition shall be deported after serving prison term.

That naturalized citizens convicted of sedition shall be deported after being imprisoned.
