FRAZIER BACK FOR PRESIDENT IS LAUNCHED

Public Ownership League Wants North Dakota Governor Nominated on Their Platform

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—A boom for Governor Frazier for president of the United States was launched at today's session of the public ownership league of America.

Governor Frazier, who the coal miners and other public workers work under the old wage agreement, said Governor Frazier today, "with the latest price that coal workers should be paid at cost. Every ton we are taking out of the mines is being sold direct to the consumer at cost."

"When the parity between the miners and operators is finally established, what the wage scale for miners in the United States will be, will be determined by the miners working in the public ownership system."

Simultaneous with the launching of the Frazier boom, the public ownership league made an announcement by its labor-farmer party here Saturday and Sunday.

More than 1,500 representatives of labor and farmer organizations are expected to attend this meeting. Secretary R. N. Sackels of the Chicago Federation of Labor declared at a conference it will be decided whether or not labor will back Governor Frazier's candidacy, and if not, another candidate, acceptable alike to labor and farmers, will be put in the race.

Labor leaders here forecast a distinct break in the American Federation of Labor with the mine and labor party in the political field. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, said he has a very strong opinion on the matter. He said he has a very strong opinion on the matter.

Governor Frazier said that the Non-Partisan league will have a strong representation at the convention. The league adopted resolutions today declaring for government ownership of mines, and also for the nationalization of waterways, railroads, highways, the postal service, telephone and telegraph lines, all public houses, warehouses and marketing facilities and asking that the government support and control of the coal, steel, and iron industries and report on the best means of acquiring and operating these industries.

The resolution declaring for the conservation of natural resources also was passed.

BRITISH HAVE 'DISCOVERED' AMERICA

Correspondent Flock Westward to Write Yards of 'Gopy' About the Real Land of Promise.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—(Landscape discovered America in 1492. It's one of the accepted facts. Just like two-plus two equals four. We learned it long ago that we forgot why we know it.

And now perhaps it isn't so after all. Perhaps it's just one of the poor theories, like "night makes light" which has had to go into the discard in the light of the new day that is presumed to be dawning.

For England is discovering America—today, yesterday and tomorrow—perhaps even next month or next year, who would have believed it.

The modern discoverers do not know about Europe, champions of a fortune hope until the day when they are able to persuade some of their fellows to look for jewels to finance an argeer.

They walk up funny little cubby holes—"country houses"—in Fleet street, the Park row of England, and there draw liberally upon the coffers of the public house.

Then they do discover. A thrilling public follows the exciting and dangerous journey of the modern Columbus through State after State. It pulls down columns of wonderful, ever-increasing facts about this new continent of ours.

Britain is still here to eat, what we eat, how we dress, how smart our girl appear, how high our buildings are, how much we have in our hands, how many automobiles we have, how much we make, how many people are after what we make and how much of it they get.

An avidly curious public learns that we have hotels that are as long as themselves, that "Heavenly" Ford hopes to make a million dollars in a year, that he and his man and crew expect some day soon every family in the country will own a "mobile" and that everybody's working for it.

England assuredly is discovering America with a vengeance that almost implies America is being discovered. The correspondent explores, writes, reports, and tells of the interesting, even to an American familiar with the subject matter. Despite the running comment that the world is visible, which holds up our customs and habits as not being in the British style, the stories are so full of interest, book-making money to a newly discovered land of promise.

My relatives live in London and New York. We are not German, as we were naturalized here. Such are the descriptions I collected among my American friends in Berlin and under this discipline want to enter other countries, as I can't see their notions of "Gopy" and want for another day.
