SENATE DEFEATS RATIFICATION WITH LODGE RESERVATIONS AND ALL COMPROMISE EFFORTS FAIL

Massachusetts Statesman Says Treaty Is Dead and Will Remain So Unless "Our" Program Is Adopted—Hitchcock Says Republicans in Aikward Position

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—President Wilson will make no comment on the treaty situation until he sends his message to the next congress, it was announced at the White House this afternoon.

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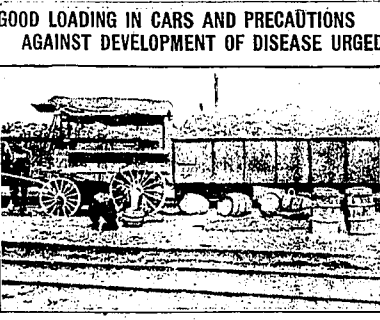

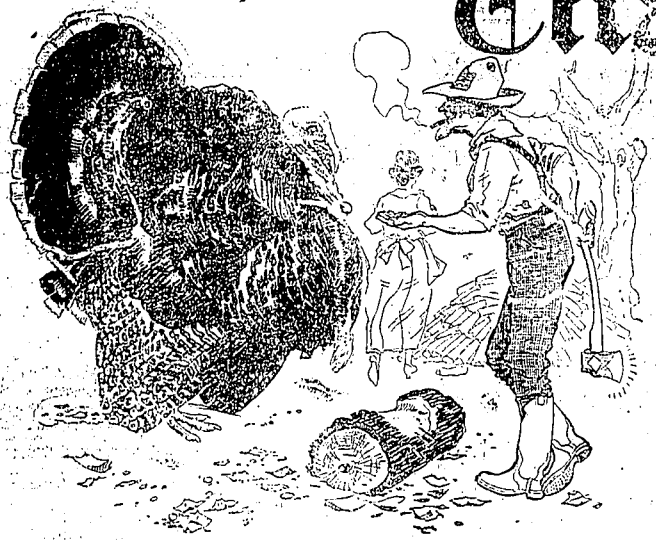

# DAME FASHION IS AUTHOR OF WORLD'S WOES

French Physician Indicts Her Majesty on Six Counts and Presents Arguments

PARIS, Nov. 19.—Frantically all the great evils now confronting the civilized nations of the globe may be laid at the door of the fashionable craze for indecent and extravagant dress, according to Dr. Forcade de Courcelles, one of the best known physicians in Europe and a leader in the suffrage movement for more than thirty years. These startling conclusions are set forth in an article by Dr. De Courcelles dealing with the effect of immodest and expensive dress up on the shortage of the baby crop and just published in the *La Revue Medicale*. Dr. De Courcelles' "indictment" of her majesty, dame fashion, is on the following counts:

- 1—She forces her subjects to make themselves tender by artificial means.
  - 2—She causes women to expose their bodies to all kinds of weather.
  - 3—By indecent variations of styles she causes women to spend so much money on clothes that many men are unable to marry and the race is hurried on to extinction to maintain large families of children.
  - 4—She is the direct cause of such immorality prevalent in civilized nations.
  - 5—She is a powerful, indirect cause of the drunkenness and extravagant expenditures to entertain the women who are fashionably dressed to display themselves in restaurants, cafes and at the theaters.
  - 6—By expending so much of the contrast between wealth and misery who is the cause of much of the revolutionary agitation now spreading throughout the globe.
- "If a woman appears at all plump her dress maker tells her: 'Maintain you are too fat; you must do something to make yourself slimmer,'" says Dr. De Courcelles. "And she follows this advice. So we see the correct, useful to maintain the body becomes an instrument of causes abnormal displacements. It used to be said that a woman is a being who dresses herself, kumps and tightens herself!" that that is an mistake nowadays; at least upon the three and third points.
- "The woman's clothing has reduced it self to the most single extension by the slenderness of the body on the one hand and by the scantiness of the raiment on the other. She is dressed in 1918 when she is undressed."
- "Now as to my second point. The greater part of the body is uncovered by the present day fashions. This permits Dame Fashion to collaborate with the physicians, insofar as fever are concerned, but it is something that physicians do not desire to expose the throat, the back, the limbs, and the arms to all of the cold winds, draughts, grippe, tuberculosis and heinous the birth rate. A woman is no more mistress of her body, style is everything and as to the children they are scarcely dressed at all in France. So we have the spartan selection. Only the robust survive, and the others, who have been exposed to the weather and insufficiently clad, catch all sorts of ailments."
- "On the third point, we wish the children of the 'gilded class.' We spend the amount of our resources to sustain the bluff. It is these large expenditures which kill the infant before it has a chance to be born. For many of the children are not because they cannot afford to maintain wives in such style, but because they themselves love to associate with women of enormous wealth. Everything that diminishes the amount of money spent in the household aids in the suppression of children and dame fashion is the leader.
- "Life has become more dear and more complicated. It is out of all proportion to the increase in wealth, but it brings at the same time by a peculiar anomaly more coquetry into the world because Dame Fashion retards and hinders matrimony, immorality, jealousy and the things which debase human lives. So we have prostitution, either open or clandestine, out of need for money for coquetry, the women get a better economic position. The feminine sentiment is going to change more and more and finally we shall see France as we knew her before us."

## WAR ON JOHNSON GOES TO FINISH

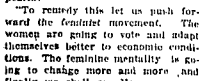
Three American League Club Owners Are Strong After President But's Scalp

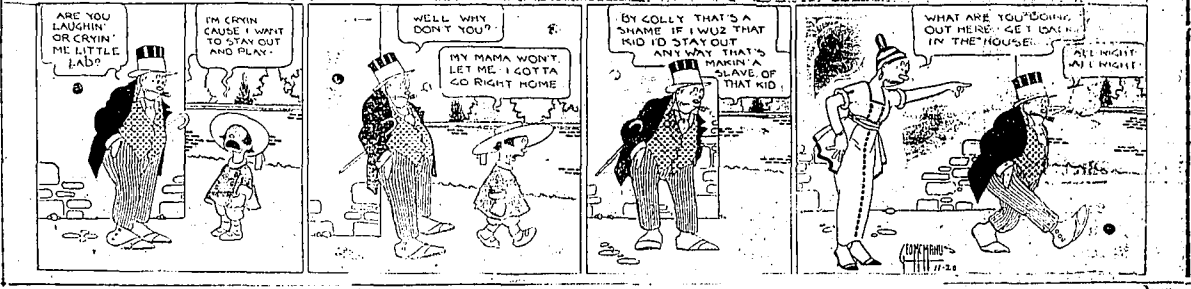


## VILLA'S CHIEF LIQUENTAN CAPTURED BY MEX CIVILIANS

DRY WORLD IS ALMOST HERE

Anti-Saloon League Expects Only Polar Region and African Jungles From Sahara

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Those who believe there is no danger of interference with the rights of bartenders to the better equipped and the jungle-scented Africa. The rest of the world will be "Saharized," says Wayne H. Wheeler, secretary and general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League of America, cheerfully predicted today.

Wheeler expressed the people of Africa and the island world because they are the only sections not heard from in the reports of "dry" progress. He said that "however, that the military service in those parts has always been poor and maybe it would be just as well to wait a while before making the attempt. The island, he said, may be the best country to join the dry cause because of its "hard drinking" common. "I don't get half of Scotland's whisky," he said, "but our only hope in England is the present local option. Our job is made hard here by the fact that the saloons are in the hands of the working classes, are inveterate drinkers. Before the war it was a hard matter to get the women of the working classes away from one grand, glorious time to their own war earnings and the fact that they were so greatly outnumbered by men is giving them the feeling of reckless independence.

"Germany? Well, judging from present conditions, either Germany or England will be the last of the wet nations. With the labor in power, we'd have an easier job there because all the saloons have been closed. We have to lose an edict declaring the nation dry. In a democracy they don't do that easily. I don't think it will be necessary for our league to send missionaries into Germany. We can depend on the effects of the German temperance societies. They are an efficient lot. You know that much of the material we used in the propaganda that we have here was actually gathered by German nationalists. The best material in the world to show the evils of booze is the literature of the saloon. It is impossible to develop a 'Chalgarian' here.

QUAINT OLD FINNISH TOWN

Everything in Borga Seems to Go Back to About the Earliest Period of History.

The first glimpse of Borga from the water is a cluster of old wooden buildings curiously assembled along the shore. The houses are built of red, owing to the highly, crimson-painted pine-knees in the foreground, but upon climbing up the steep, red-shaded street to the town, you change your mind, and decide that it is going to be yellow. For all the time, only one color is seen, and that is the color. A little farther on, however, it comes upon you suddenly that Borga is a town of yellow. The red and yellow is just a background for the splendid, solemn grandeur of its ancient cathedral, which completely dominates the town from the top of a well-kept garden of the type that was popular in the early fifteenth century. It contains very little of a Borga began about thirteen hundred and something, and must have reached its height about the seventeenth century. For it contains very little of a red date nothing more modern than an organ, for example. The white and gold pulpit was carved in the sixteenth century, and its skill and workmanship are rarely old. Other Finnish towns have retained their naive wooden churches with less beautifully but more practical furnishings. The cathedral of Borga proudly upholds the past. The Borga cathedral still measures time by means of a quaint old luncheon bell with a sun.

It was in this cathedral that the emperor of Russia, Alexander II, received the oath of allegiance of the newly conquered Finns, a few days after he had signed the constitution which gave them the franchise. It was in this cathedral which the constitution was signed—indeed, little frame structure with additional, blue-painted hands—has been pulled out with reverence to the traveler, and if you are duly sympathetic, the Borga will then lead you to the site of an old fort, reported to date back to an obscure period, even before the cathedral, when the Finns were heathen. It may be assumed that this is saying anything but impressive. There are some smaller churches, which, one in a corner, are more and several are very fine ones which are supposed to include the ancient and venerable one. Nevertheless, the place must have atmosphere, if you can only find it. For it was here that Walter Rubezberg, the great Finnish poet, used to find the inspiration for so many of his splendid songs.
