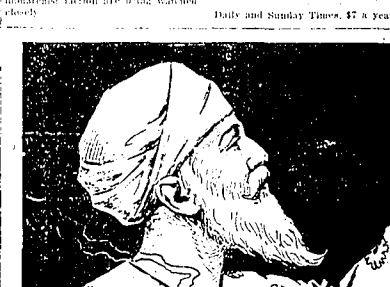

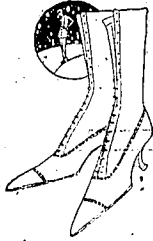

## NEXT YEAR'S ROAD-BUILDING.

All records for American road-building were broken this year, but the total result is nothing to what may be expected next year under favorable conditions. The expenditure for hard surfaced highways in 1919 is \$438,000,000. There will be over \$1,000,000,000 available for that purpose in 1920, including funds from state and county taxes, federal aid, bond issues, unexpended balances, etc.

In order to utilize that great sum, or any where near all of it, there must be provided an enormous supply of materials. The United States department of agriculture is calling attention to the fact that it will be impossible to obtain the stuff and the orders are given long before the usual time. It is necessary for manufacturers to have no idleness of equipment, and it is necessary particularly to make sure of adequate transportation.

Ordinary contracts are not placed until spring for summer delivery. If the hundreds of miles of new roadway so much needed are to be built next year, contracts will have to be placed during the winter.

The biggest factor in the situation is freight cars. For hauling most of the material needed, open cars are used. There is generally a shortage of such cars in the summer and fall, and a surplus in the late winter and spring. Last spring 250,000 cars were standing idle. The obvious thing to do is to utilize those cars during their normal period of idleness. For this purpose it is decidedly desirable to award contracts as soon as possible, in order that shipment of materials may begin early.

The Twin Falls highway commission should take these facts into consideration. Good roads are now urgently needed all over this district to allow any retrenchment of construction on account of low-ness and thirder delay.

## THE EDUCATIONAL GOOSE.

Killing the goose which lays the golden egg has never been considered an economically sound proceeding. Yet that is just exactly what is happening in the educational world.

Industry and business are calling the good teachers because they pay rewards somewhat commensurate with the labor invested, and school teaching does not. If it were merely a matter of removing some teachers and replacing them with others it might not be a serious affair. But it is more than that. If the teachers of today are removed from the teaching service, where are the good teachers of tomorrow to come from? They must be taught. Not only must the subject matter be taught, but also the processes of imparting knowledge in a satisfactory manner must be passed on. This can be done successfully only by teachers who have had experience in teaching.

If all the teachers of today go out into industrial laboratories and executive positions of one sort and another, what becomes of our next generation?

Is the American public going to stand idly by while its children are deprived of their birthright? If there is one institution more purely and fundamentally American than another, it is our public schools.

When a parent hears a teacher say she has 70 students in one room this year, the parent is mildly sorry for the teacher who has the extra work; but how many times does he grasp the fact that when his child is one-eighth of a class of who he should, by any proper standards, be one-tenth, his child is being over half the training which should be his?

How long are you going to keep on killing this educational goose?

## MOVIE TITLES FOR SHAKESPEARE

Must we movieize Shakespeare to make him popular? Some one has suggested that the crowd would flock to playsman presenting Shakespearean drama if only the titles of the plays were a bit modified.

Examples of up-to-date and stimulating titles are given as follows:

- "How Could You, Juliet?" instead of simple "Romeo and Juliet"
- "Call of the Flesh," for "The Merchant of Venice."
- "Strangled in Bed," for "Othello."
- "The Nutty Prince," for "Hamlet."
- "The Knife," for "Julius Caesar."
- "Moonlight and Honey-suckle," for "Midsummer Night's Dream."

Somewhat the suggested titles have a familiar ring. They conjure up gaily billboards before movie entrance, and even the press notices of the mutual comedies and plays given at the Laverne.

In spite of all this, it does not seem likely that a wholesale revision of titles to make Shakespearean production a whirlwind of popular and financial success. But if they insist upon visualizing the bard, why not Mr. Shakespeare as he will consent to let the crowd follow its inclination for a while longer until it has progressed farther along the road of education, appreciation and good taste.

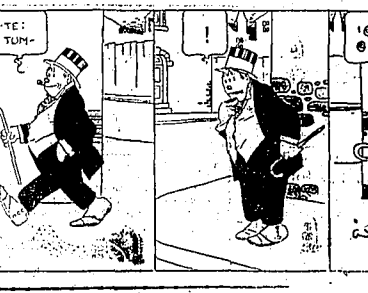
