New York.—Education in northern France ceased in the autumn of 1914. 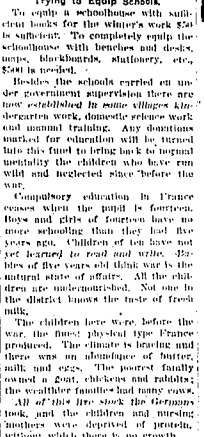
PAY DAY PRICE FOR LAND

BUHL PULLS VICTORY IN FIERCE GAME

Blue and White Led, 6 to 3. After Stubborn Contest Before a Large Crowd

In one of the most stubbornly contested games ever staged in this city, Buhl High won from the Twin Falls High School football team yesterday afternoon by a score of 6 to 3. The victory gives Buhl a commanding football supremacy in this section of Idaho.

Through three tiring periods the game was waged extremely evenly. Although Twin Falls took enough in the second period for Kregel to tie the ball between Buhl's goal posts for three points, in the third period the play was chiefly in Twin Falls territory, although never dangerously near the goal. In the second period, the Blue and White gradually stirred, pressing Buhl back and shortly had the ball within the ten yard line. Here Buhl succeeded in kicking a field goal, which carried the ball over its front of the goal posts where Kregel had an easy mark for a drop kick. Encouraged by the three point lead, Twin Falls started another march down the field but the whistle, marking the end of the half, interrupted their advance as they were two yards from the territory. 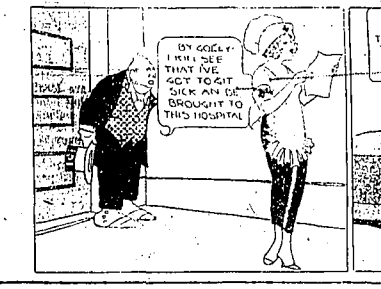

JOHNSON CALLED O'DOWD RETAINS MENACE TO BALL CHAMPION CROWN

Comiskey Makes Statement Which Says President Ban Is Impediment to Go Rid Of

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—Ban Johnson is a menace to the integrity of baseball and everything that can be done to rid baseball of this "impediment" is to be done, according to a statement made public today by Charles A. Comiskey, president of the White Sox. Comiskey's statement is an open declaration of war upon Johnson and a flat challenge to the president of the American League.

"We have reached the conclusion," said Comiskey's statement after re-announcing that himself, Jack Huggins of New York, and Harry Frazee of Boston are acting chiefly to protect sports interests worth millions that Mr. Johnson is endangering gravely the value of these properties, that the integrity of baseball and we therefore intend to do everything possible to rid baseball of the impediment we believe is now attached to it."

Comiskey declares that the board of directors is acting within its rights in calling the annual meeting of the league for New York December 1 in defiance of Johnson's call for the meeting in Chicago.

Johnson's statement is a heartless one. He put Kregel out of the game for about two periods and nearly ruined the effort of the Blue and White.
