Names of the companies are not given. They are designated by code numbers as they are known in the department records. The large earnings appear to be made by the large companies or by operators with small investments. The operators contend that earnings shown are calculated on the capital invested rather than the capital stock.

The report shows in the Appalachian district that earnings have on capital invested range from 13.92 to 328.92 per cent. This percentage is computed on earnings after the taxes and excess profits taxes are deducted.

As a basis of comparison one of the largest mines in the Appalachian region, with invested capital of \$2,000,000 made a profit in 1917 of 19.90 per cent. A mine showing 228.72 per cent earnings on amount invested reported but 18.92 as the amount invested.

Another large mine in the Appalachian region, with \$1,220,000 invested, showed a profit of 25.25 on the investment.

A BANK BIRTHDAY A few days ago the federal reserve banking system celebrated its fifth birthday.

These twelve centers, operating as a unit when necessary, have likewise met the requirements of national finance, and have assumed international burdens never dreamed of when the system was inaugurated.

THE GUILTY COAL CONSUMER

The director of the federal Bureau of Mines points out that the consumers themselves are largely responsible for the hardships of the coal miners, and likewise for the cost of coal.

The principal factor in the closing of the mines is the state of the market. Consumers reduce their purchases of coal in the spring and summer months, and production is slowed down correspondingly.

This fluctuating operation of the mines is naturally more expensive than steady operation would be, and thus it increases the average cost of producing coal.

If all the mines were worked all the time at full speed, there would doubtless be an overproduction of coal.

AUTHOR OF ASSESSMENT LAW SAYS CORNER LOT METHODS WRONG CONSTRUCTION OF ACT

City Attorney George G. Pickett of Moscow, Man Who Framed Measure, Informs The Times of the Proper Interpretation and Gives Legal Remedy for Those Who Wish to Oppose.

That the city council in placing the wrong construction on the state law governing the street paving assessment by placing the entire burden upon the corner lots is the opinion of the author of the law, George G. Pickett, city attorney of Moscow.

Together with interpretation and illustration of the law, Attorney Pickett points out the legal remedy for those who oppose the form of assessment adopted.

Attorney Pickett declares that the matter, as defined by the supreme court of Washington in the case of Idaho and covered by the compulsory laws of Idaho, strictly outlines assessment of the corner lots.

Now, as you will note, I have placed the districts into blocks 1, 2, and 3, and as you will see, I have gone to the corner of block 1 in each case.

Mr. M. L. Lewis has given me your letter of Nov. 6th and asked me to reply to you in re paving improvement district.

The present state law of Idaho, under which local improvement districts are created and within which districts the property is assessed to pay for the improvements, was originally set in 1907.

The amendment of 1919 was drawn by me and submitted by the four representatives in Boise to prepare its passage. You state, "The court's judgment has been that the corner property received all the benefits and so it has placed the entire assessment upon the corner property."

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make yourself, or your attorney must make himself, in placing his objection anything, that is required by the statute, adding to it any matter that he may think pertinent, so as to bring the entire questions up to the appeal of the district courts of such matter.

This latter question I argued before the judge, one year ago, and went into the subject very thoroughly; he sustained my contention, there being no decisions in the United States adverse to the decision. Your statute prescribed your mode of appealing and in appealing, I wish to caution you that unless your attorney can stipulate, the assessment roll may not be brought up to the district court, but may be used with the same force and effect as if certified, and copies of all ordinances and every action of the board taken must be taken by the assessor.

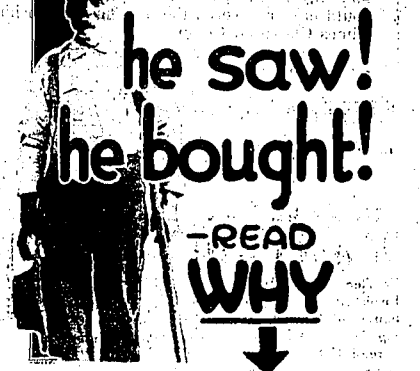

GOODING SAYS BEST TEAM WON

Takes Exception to Charges of Unfair Advantages Taken Over Twin Falls

Denying that unsportsmanlike conduct, unfair officiating or intimidation had anything to do with the Gooding football victory over Twin Falls recently, the student body of Gooding high school today were responsive to the charges of Coach Bennett as published in *The Times* a few days ago. In a letter to *The Times* today the charges are not only denied but protest is also made against the statement that surprise was caused here by the result of the game because Gooding had been considered an inferior team. In fact the Gooding viewpoint holds the whole matter down to the opinion that the best team won.

Their statement follows:

The Twin Falls Daily Times, Oct. 15, 1910.

Answering the article appearing in your November 13th issue referring to Twin Falls-Gooding High School Football Game, wish to state that the charges made therein against Gooding of unsportsmanlike conduct, unfair officiating and intimidation are absolutely arrundless.

Benefit of Twin Falls referred the first half of game, during which time Gooding scored 20 points and Twin Falls 0. Benefit penalized Gooding 15 yards; Cady, the referee during the

second half penalized Gooding 25 yards. Twin Falls was penalized only 50 yards during the whole game.

Your paper states in regard to the dismissal of Becker from the game that "Cady started to dismiss the foul but Bennett insisted that Becker be put out of the game. Bennett threatened to withdraw his team from the field at this point if the penalty was not called."

This is absolutely without foundation in fact as Cady dismissed Becker from the game at this point without a word being said from Bennett, Bennett or anyone else to him.

Your paper states that Gooding was considered an inferior team to Twin Falls before the game, but the records of these two teams this season do not bear this out. Gooding, prior to this time had beaten Turley 29 to 0, Jerome 29 to 0 and Twin Falls on the latter's field, with all its own officials, 13 to 0.

The Twin Falls team should be complimented as they played every minute of the game even when the score stood 23 to 0 against them, every man on team was good, especially at all times. The only reason they were beaten is because they were up against a better team.

Hester Bennett and Coach Bennett insisted on Mr. Bennett refereeing the entire game. The only objection to this arrangement on the part of the Gooding coach was the insistent requests of Gooding supporters, that Bennett be not allowed to officiate at all because his brother, with whom he had come over, had bet \$50 on the game with a local business man.

Mr. Cady had officiated at the Turley game and had given excellent satisfaction to both sides.

At no time during the entire game was there evidence of any unspor-

tsmanlike action on the part of any position on the sideline, whether Gooding's or Twin Falls, nor anything to be credited in the actions of the players on either team, but from the opening kick-off Mr. Bennett advised the only important rule remarks and continued the crabbing throughout the entire game.

This was unusual from one who was always in lead in his plans for clean athletics and proper school spirit.

We would like to have you give credit where credit is due. We have the right to the Gooding school, and Gooding citizens demands.
