SO SAYS ANNUAL TREASURY REPORT

Secretary Glass Emphasizes Sound Financial Conditions of Nation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The United States is in a sound financial condition and "prosperity flourishes" is emphasized in the annual report of Secretary of the Treasury Glass made public today.

"A large share of the cost of the war, already has been paid for by taxes, and the public debt is but a fractional part of our national wealth," declared Secretary Glass.

"Our credit and financial structure is sound and our gold reserves the greatest in the world. Prosperity flourishes in every branch of industry and every part of the nation and the people of the country are fully employed."

## STATE CALLS WITNESSES IN MURDER TRIAL

Testimony Is Started in Case of H. F. Grosvener—State May Conclude Today

Examination of witnesses for the state, started yesterday afternoon in the trial of H. F. Grosvener, charged with second degree murder, was continuing today and the testimony of court without being completed. The state, however, was expected to rest its case this afternoon.

Identification and verification testimony was the topic introduced this morning by the prosecuting attorney, J. E. Stephens, who is assisted by Assistant Attorney General and Justice of the Peace. The broken wood work, with which Grosvener is said to have struck E. L. Vaidinger, a fatal blow during a quarrel over a liquor case, was identified by Leonard Van Ripper, son of the deceased man, and by John R. Ault, prohibition officer, who has the wood-work in his possession. Mrs. Stella Van Ripper, widow of E. L. Van Ripper, Dr. George Jenkinson, and Miss Bertha Boyanidin, physician and nurse-pupil attendant, all testified to his condition and injuries following the altercation.

R. L. Leuch and W. H. Warner, ranchers who witnessed the quarrel between Grosvener and Van Ripper, testified yesterday, when the jury had been completed and sworn in. Their testimony was the same that they had given at the preliminary hearing in describing the incident. They were conversing with Grosvener, a ditch rider, near a group of headquaters, they stated it was their belief that the ground at water running down Van Ripper's ditch was smaller than that running through the hedgegate. Grosvener testified that he later saw the ditch rider, through which the water was escaping.

Van Ripper, coming on the scene at that moment, had his attention called to the hole by Grosvener. After inspecting the hole in the ditch, he remarked to Grosvener, without being asked, "What are you doing there?" Grosvener is said to have answered "I don't think it is my hole." Van Ripper then called him a hole digger and later gave the ditch rider a kick which caused his death several days later.

**RUBBER OOR RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH OF HONEY BEES**

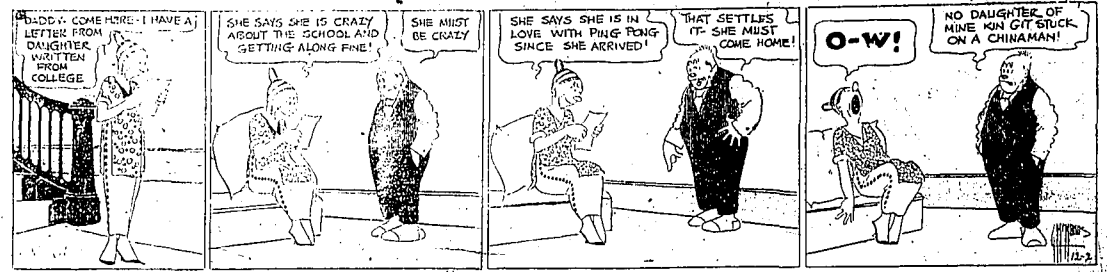

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—With enough first champions scheduled to swing into action within a week, boxing fans today crowded all other sports from the spotlight.

It was expected by them that there would be decrease of production during the first two days of this week because of the refusal of many of the miners who have been working to continue at their employment, on learning that an increase of only fourteen per cent of wages had been conceded to them. It is believed that many of these miners are returning to work today, or will do so tomorrow. The operators of the Christmas holidays, and the fact that many of the miners have not earned pay since November 1, is expected by the operators to cause many of them to return to the work without further delay.

Both fuel administration officials are leading every effort to have coal from the producing mines in eastern states into the central and western shipping points.

The end of the present week is expected to show definite indications of what may be expected. The department of justice is planning to make further court action upon what evidence it has to show that there is a plan on the part of some miners to curtail coal production and these operators who are reported to have assumed an attitude of indifference will probably find themselves entangled in legal processes.

Despite reaching here today of threats of a strike in the anthracite field brought contemplation. Should the anthracite miners leave their work it would create a national crisis such as the country has never seen. The department of justice is prepared for quick action to check any such movement.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The American war machine, which has been moving at top speed toward its goal of victory has reversed its gears and with the same speed traveled toward the goal of peace conditions.

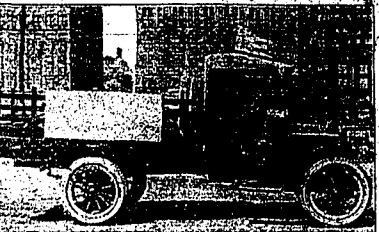
