



# DE HAVILAND 4 GOOD MACHINE

### Flying Parson Tells "Smelling" Committee It Was Equal to Any of Similar Type

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The American-built De Haviland 4 airplane was the equal of any other similar type on the western battle front of Europe. That is the opinion of Lieut. H. W. Maynard, the "flying parson" winner of the recent Pulitzer prize from New York to San Francisco and return. In that contest he used an American De Haviland 4.

The life testimony before the aviation sub-committee of the house committee that has been "smelling" America's military expenditures for the past few months, the aviation pilot told of his wide experience abroad. He was the official tester of airplanes at Honorary France, the point from which all American military planes were assembled and distributed, and where foreign-built planes owned by the United States were sent for military repairs. The airplane shops at this place employed 18,000 men.

Maynard flew 12 different types of airplanes in France, and delivered lectures to the Army and Navy. He delivered 25 American De Haviland 4s and found them all that could be asked for, he said. The American model, Lieut. Maynard said, was far superior to the British, and the best he had seen. It was the best at the front, and, in addition, carried from 500 to 1000 pounds of bombs. The initial shipment of De Haviland 4s from the United States was of structural defects which were repaired in France and corrected in subsequent shipments at the American base.

The "flying parson" had talked with most of the American flyers who had used the De Haviland, and said that those who had flown it long enough to become accustomed to it carried it with a confidence that was almost beyond criticism. The Liberty engine was highly rated by Lieut. Maynard, and he had flown it 700 hours at the front, and that it always had carried him safely and demonstrated its worth.

Representative F. H. L. Garrison of New York, who had indulged in many criticisms of the United States airplane, who accused by Lieut. Maynard of talking about the airplane as if he knew nothing about it, said that the man in Europe, knowing Lieut. Maynard's record, conceded that the De Haviland was the best airplane he had seen, and that he was not regarded as having any worth as a flyer, though decorated by the Italian government, and that the whole committee had been used a great deal as authoritative matter by Representative James A. Fear and Walter V. Massie, the Republican members of the subcommittee.

### ARMY SALES HERE AND AROUND \$1,225,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Announcement is made by the War Department that the sales of surplus army property in the United States and Europe reported to November 8, amounted to \$1,192,328,000. Sales in the United States alone amounted to \$67,000,000, which is 5 1/2 per cent greater than the total sales in Europe.

The total for the United States covers sales of real estate and improvements.

### RENTING BELGIUM

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Dec. 3.—In Belgium since April, machinery valued at the equivalent of more than a half million dollars has been recovered from Germany, says the minister of economic affairs; the re-emption of the coal mines has not reached 85 per cent of the 1914 output and in 230 factories visited, 97,137 men are at work out of 45,299 employed in 1914. Of the 400,000 unemployed at the time of the armistice, 200,000 only are still registered.

## GROSVENOR ON STAND TRIAL MAY END TODAY

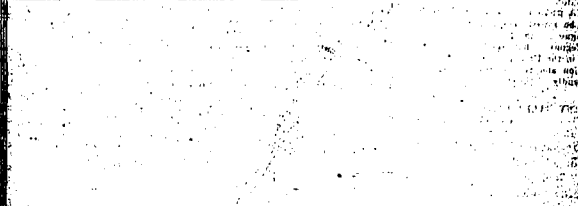

# BRITISH BUY AMERICAN FLAG FOR CONFERENCE

### Republican Partisans Evidently Attempt to Snub Nations of World at Labor Meeting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(Special) content with carrying on the conference to the limit in every phase and activity of its special session, the Republican congress has some outside the limit of its strictly national character, as it embarrases the United States through what seems to have been a "liberal" attempt to snub the nations represented in the Republican Labor Conference, under the auspices of the League of Nations. After authorizing the president to call the conference and placing the United States in the position of host to the civilized nations of the world, congress then proceeded to snub every nation in the world of civilization.

# OUT TO GET BAN'S SCALP

### American League Factionists Will Be Satisfied, However, If They Can Clip His Wings

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—The factional fight in the American league is fast approaching a showdown. Well posted baseball men here have expressed the belief that when the managers get together, differences will be patched up and concessions made by both sides. Meanwhile arguments in the information office of the "management" will be heard here today.

It is understood to the effect that the opposing factions are trying to internalize the issue, all will be well. However, it is very doubtful if the American league will remain united.

Admiral J. T. Hulton, who, with Messrs. Huppert, Cuskey and Pizer, is conducting the campaign to "clip the wings" of President Johnson, made this prediction today. Colonel Hulton said:

"All we aim to do is to put an end to arbitrary power in our league. I have a definite idea how to do it. I can say, however, that unless I can win a battle that will make the Federal league war look like a skirmish."

Asked regarding reports that the faction to which he belongs had been approached by peace makers, the colonel replied:

"We have heard indirectly that the sense of a majority of the club owners that the matter should and can be amicably patched up, but we do not believe that those who put out feelers do so without an ulterior motive."

"It is surely the club owners will permit the league to be split up," was suggested. "The financial interests involved are the great thing. You never can tell what will happen in baseball, the coldest of all sports."

Frank Nave, president of the Detroit club, is in town on a "business" trip. The owner of the Tigers says he has no feeling of animosity toward any of the other clubs, and does not believe the present situation in the league.

"Though they are unwilling to admit anything, the writer has found a significant source for the 'insurgent directors' probably will be perfectly satisfied if the so-called 'arbitrary power' of President Johnson are removed. In the event that the five clubs now lined up with him will concede some points the organized 'factionaries' will cut off their ears. At the outset, they were out to 'get Johnson's scalp'."

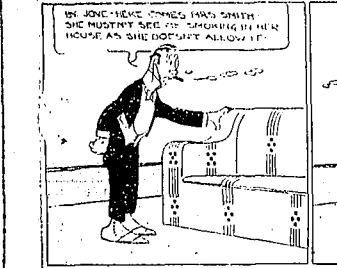
PLAN MISSOURI VALLEY TENNIS ASSOCIATION

### Missouri Will Run "Strip" Coal Mines

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 4.—Put forward an all day conference with W. W. Watkins, president of the Southwestern Coal Operators Association, and state officials, Governor Gardner announced last night, it became known early today, that the state will seize and operate the coal fields of Barton county.

The miners, according to the governor's announcement, will be given an opportunity to resume work at wages received prior to the coal strike plus the fourteen per cent increase authorized by the Federal Coal Commission, but in case of a refusal volunteer miners will be organized to operate Missouri's "strip" mines, which it is estimated to produce 1,000 tons of coal daily.

By nightfall, it is understood, the First battalion of the Seventh regiment, N. G. M., will be on duty in the Barton county coal field.
